

## Senators Morse, Wiley Get Into Explosive Row Over Blocking Actions

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wiley (R-Wis.) and Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore) got into an explosive row on the Senate floor Thursday over Morse's blocking Senate action on a State Department appointment.

Wiley accused Morse of being "the champion filibuster of the Senate" who liked to "put on a show" to get headlines.

Morse commented acidly that Wiley had become chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee because of seniority and said he believed the Senate could do better by electing its chairman without regard to seniority.

"Any time he wants to take me on in an exchange of mutual respect, I'm ready," Morse declared.

The row started after Morse had forced a delay in Senate confirmation of an assistant secretary of state, former Rep. Thurston B. Morton (R-Ky). It was two hours before Morton was confirmed, on a voice vote.

When the name was called up, Morse demanded to know where the committee report on him was.

Majority Leader Taft (R-Ohio) replied that it was not customary to have printed reports except in unusual cases.

"It's quite immaterial to me whether it's customary or not," Morse asserted. Then he demanded that Wiley, as chairman of Foreign Relations, give an oral report on Morton.

Wiley proceeded to do so. But he touched off the angry debate early in his remarks with the comment: "I realize that the senator from Oregon should be on the Foreign Relations Committee and every other committee."

Morse tried to interrupt but Wiley refused to yield the floor to

him. Morse thereupon accused Wiley of indulging in hit-and-run tactics.

Morse is particularly tender about the committee situation since the Republicans threw him off his two major committee assignments after he quit the party.

Morse accused Wiley of using personal sarcasm, of violating a Senate rule which forbids a senator to impute to another senator "any conduct or motive unworthy or unbecoming a senator."

The Wisconsin senator said he would reply to Morse by talking about veteran Sen. George (D-Ga) who was 75 years old Thursday.

George, Wiley said, "is a man with judgment who sits in committee and gives us the benefits of his considered, wise judgment, who has the respect of everyone, who knows that no one man is big enough to do the job of the whole Senate."

Wiley finally said he was sorry "if I have said anything unseemly about an associate," and added: "I apologize."

Morse retorted: "All an apology is, is a little conscience salve by the apologizer."

## Who Will Head Reclamation Is Big Question

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — One of the most interesting things to come up at the meeting of the Missouri Basin Inter-Agency Committee (MBIAC) meeting here Wednesday was speculation on who will be the next commissioner of the Bureau of Reclamation.

Next to getting funds for Army Engineer and bureau projects the policy-making inter-agency group is interested in who will direct that Interior Department setup under President Eisenhower.

Best bet was that it would be someone recognized for his engineering and professional ability, instead of political prowess.

There was considerable speculation that the choice may come from the ranks of civil service employees, which would leave the political activities at a higher level, probably with an under secretary of interior.

That was the policy, according to some, prior to the early 1940's. Officials of the bureau and interior department were "mum" on any speculation. They attempted to stay aloof from the headaches of entering politics.

## Park Trespass, Vandalism Told In Report

Trespass and vandalism are listed in the monthly report of Charles S. Collins, supervisor for the Douglas County Parks Department.

Outing activities for the month of December, Collins reports that a logger was found in trespass at Ziolkowski Beach Park at Winchester Bay. Following warning that he was in trespass, the logger agreed to remove equipment stored on the property and to repair damage caused to the road.

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sible this year. Both the state and county health departments have assured Winston that they'll aid in immediate construction when either the area incorporates or a sanitary district is established.

2. Street paving. Local government could improve streets with the aid of state and government funds available to corporations.

3. Storm drainage. This is part of the paving problem and local authority could handle it.

4. Street lighting. This would be simpler to secure if boundaries are established and the power to franchise granted.

5. Police protection. A system of officers on call immediately could be established.

6. Zoning restrictions. These could be formulated to protect investments and ban poor construction.

7. Traffic control. The "wide place in the road" treatment would be ended, with speeding controlled and fines imposed.

8. New business. As soon as health authorities remove existing bans new firms would spring up.

9. More homes. These would be possible when FHA and GI loans were available to builders.

10. Property value increase. The official status of an incorporated community would bring this about.

11. State, highway and government funds. These are available to corporations in proportion to population.

12. Insurance rate decrease. (See map showing proposed boundaries on page 11.)

## American Jets Down Bomber

SEOUL (AP) — U. S. Sabre jets shot down a twin-engine Russian bomber off North Korea's west coast today and capped their patrols by destroying one MIG jet fighter and damaging another.

The Fifth Air Force said it was the second time in the Korean War that Allied fighters had clashed with Red bombers. Pilots reported it was a lone TU2.

Sabre jets destroyed seven TU2s off the west coast Nov. 30, 1951. The TU2 has a wing span of about 60 feet, a cruising speed of about 300 miles an hour and became operational in 1944.

On the ground, Allied and Communist patrols clashed sporadically in bitter cold — the temperature dropping to the lowest of the season on the Western Front, 16 degrees below zero.

## Riddle To Vote On Extra Budget

Riddle citizens will vote on a supplemental budget of \$10,700 March 2 to augment the original 1952-53 budget.

Budget committee member D. W. Clark reported at a City Council meeting Monday that the requested amount was on deposit in the bank. In his report, he states that the voters are just asked to release the money. It is not a bond issue.

Of the requested amount, \$2,000 is earmarked for preliminary survey and cost estimates for improvement of the existing water supply lines and distribution system.

Clark points out that it is of utmost importance to pass the supplemental budget in order to keep the city government operating. Should this budget fail, Clark says, the city of Riddle would find itself in the unique position of being without paid personnel and without funds to meet regular operational expenses.

Clark relates that the original 1952-53 budget has proved inadequate. Therefore, the supplemental money is needed in addition to expected water revenues for the balance of the fiscal year ending June 30.

## Herman France Dies At 87 In Roseburg

Herman France, 87, died suddenly in Roseburg this morning. France was born Nov. 26, 1865, in Cleveland, Ohio. He came to Oregon in 1928. He lived eight years in Cottage Grove before coming to Roseburg 2½ months ago.

Surviving are three sons: Frank L., Roseburg; Jesse J., San Anselmo, Calif.; Garry L., Palmyra, Mo. and 12 grandchildren.

The remains will be taken to Eugene. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

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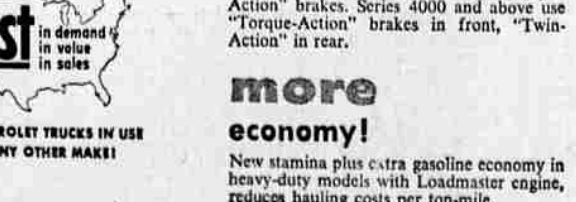
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
