YOUR BODY

The tissues of the body, like all living tissues, must receive nutrition in order to perform their work. The circulatory system, consisting chiefly of the heart, blood vessels and blood, is the mechanism for carrying the necessary food materials to the various parts of the body as well as for carrying away waste materials from those areas.

The blood is the fluid in which these materials are carried. By means of the blood, the tissues receive oxygen from the lungs, nutritive material from the intestines, hormones from the glands and substances to counteract bacteria and poisons. The blood also conveys heat from and to all parts of the body. Waste materials thrown off by the tissues are carried by the blood to the kidneys and skin, and carbon dioxide is conveyed to the lungs, from which it is exhaled.

Circulation of the blood is achieved, actually by two systems: the pulmonary circulation, which conveys the blood through the tissues of the lungs, where it is purified; and the systemic circulation which carries the blood throughout the entire body.

The heart is the organ that propels the blood through both the pulmonary and the systemic circulation. The heart lies between the lungs in the anterior part of the chest cavity. It is a hollow muscular organ weighing on an average of eleven or twelve ounces.

The heart is divided into right and left halves, the left half sending the blood through the systemic circulation and the right half propelling it through the pulmonary circulation. Each of these halves consists of two chambers, the upper chambers known as auricles and the lower chambers known as ventricles.

ishment of a sanitary district would accomplish this with less cost and trouble than incorporation.

City Served Sooner

Daugherty agreed that a sanitary district could be established but pointed out that a city could get the needed facilities much sooner than a district.

Citizens present were worried about the cost of a sanitary system. Daugherty pointed out that under the critical defense housing act either a loan or grant could be secured to cover the difference between assessed valuation and cost of the system.

"But I think you should remember we have an economy-minded Congress," one man said. "I wouldn't count too much on getting Federal money." Daugherty replied that the fund was already established.

When talk turned to location of a sewage disposal plant, residents expressed fear that high water would cause the outflow from the plant to back up into yards. Daugherty assured that the plant would be located below the water supply and construction area, and that the discharge would be chlorinated and nearly pure.

One resident of an outlying area wondered if sewage outflow would contaminate wells and "we'd be forced to come in."

Fear Epidemic — "If we have an epidemic, who's going to pay for the hospital bill?" one citizen heatedly asked after listening to discussion against incorporation for the purpose of installing a sewage disposal system.

Residents of Winston section, who heard Daugherty said the sewage outfall line to the disposal plant might run through their property, though four feet underground, asked what would happen if they didn't want it. He pointed out that a sanitary district has the power to secure easements.

Many residents expressed fear that huge taxes would be heaped upon them just due to an incorporation. But others present pointed out that total cost of incorporation would be about \$400 and that any improvements would have to be voted upon by the people of the city.

Backers of the move emphasized that, with a sanitary system, residents could secure FIA and GI loans and that health permits could be secured, with no strings attached, from the State Board of Health by public businesses.

When talk turned to the area's street paving situation one man said, "We've been taking care of our own road for seven years and this is countered by the statement that many of the roads are in poor condition."

Advocates also pointed out that a city would have zoning powers, and control over traffic. Daugherty said, "We've been lucky up till now" that no children have been killed. He also pointed out that, with city police, traffic fines would go into the city treasury.

Myrtle Creek School Budget Is Presented

The public hearing on the \$579,500 Myrtle Creek District 19 school budget is scheduled Feb. 26 at the Grade School building.

Early this week, a joint session of the Myrtle Creek School Board and the Budget Board approved a budget, according to the Myrtle Creek Mail.

The budget includes \$45,000 to build four additional rooms on the High School. Other major items on the 1953-54 budget are cost of instruction, operation and maintenance, and transportation of pupils. The Mail states six more teachers will be needed next year.

Estimated receipts and available cash balances from such sources as the county school fund, basic school support and vocational and special education funds will amount to an estimated \$239,384. This means approximately \$320,000 will be needed to be raised from taxes in the district. With an expected increase in property valuation, the school millage for the coming year will be slightly over 60 mills.

Rated by taxation this year was \$268,457.02.

Social Security Representative To Visit Tuesday

A representative of the Eugene social security office will be in Roseburg at the City Hall Council Chambers on Tuesday, Feb. 3 between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and noon.

As part of their insurance protection, at least 3 million self-employed persons soon will be able to point with confidence to federal old-age and survivors insurance.

This statement was made today by Claude E. Dawson, manager of the Eugene social security office. Dawson said that these individuals have full credit for their self-employment earnings after 1950 and are fully insured for future payments as soon as they file their final 1952 income tax returns. To stay insured, they must continue to report their earnings and pay the social security tax once every year.

Among beneficiaries of social security now coming on the rolls, the average retirement payment to a man without dependent is \$65 a month; for an aged couple the average is about \$103 a month, and to a widow with two children, in the neighborhood of \$130 a month.

Dawson urged all self-employed to keep accurate records and to be sure that the correct social security number and occupation are shown on the tax return and attached Schedule C-a as submitted. This Schedule C-a should be attached to all income tax returns showing net profit from self-employment of at least \$400 in a year.

Dawson also pointed out that since social security credits are based on accurate tax returns, it is greatly to the self-employed person's own interest that the return be entirely correct.

Tax Cutting Measure May Be Pigeonholed — An income tax cutting bill being pushed by Rep. Reed (R-NY) appears headed for a *la crosse* pigeonhole at least for a few months.

Reed, chairman of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, is waging an all-out drive for House passage in February on his bill to cut income taxes 10 per cent starting June 30. This would rescind the 1951 tax increase of 11 per cent over the rates then existing.

Reds to continue the struggle there.

Secretary of State Dulles, who left with Mutual Security Director Harold Stassen yesterday for a 10-day inspection tour of Western Europe, put that goal into words in his televised speech last Tuesday.

Take Away Advantage — "The enemy thinks he's getting an advantage by continuing the war. I believe Gen. Eisenhower will find the ways and means to make the enemy change his mind in that respect so that they too will want peace."

Eisenhower's reported decision to go ahead with the plan apparently represents a new and much tougher attitude toward the Chinese Reds than any the Truman administration was willing to risk.

The assumption in Congress was that America's allies had been or were being consulted and their reaction will be studied closely.

There was no advance word from the White House as to why Eisenhower called fleet Adm. William D. Leahy to a conference today.

Leahy, like Gen. Douglas MacArthur, is on active duty without assignment. The admiral was World War II chief of staff to Presidents Roosevelt and Truman.

Davis Replaces Grady Mankins For Buildings

New superintendent of buildings and grounds for the Roseburg School District 4 will be Guy Davis, former superintendent for Oregon Technical Institute in Klamath Falls, M. C. Deller, city school superintendent, announced today.

Davis will replace Grady Mankins, who resigned to take a position with the Roseburg Paving Co.

The new man will begin his duties sometime in the middle of February, Deller said. He held the same type of job in the Medford public school for 15 years, then took the OTI job when that school was started. There he supervised 60 employees and 80 buildings, Deller said.

Davis has held custodial summer school throughout the state for several years, Deller reports, and says such a school is planned for this summer here.

Mankins has been with the school district for two years. As a reason for his resignation, he said, "I'd like to get back into private business," where he says he sees "a better future." He commented, however, that he's enjoyed working with school officials.

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Oregon Said Still Growing But Rate Is Decreasing; Douglas Population 62,563

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon is still growing, but the fast post-war population increase is slowing down. That's the estimate released Thursday by the state Board of Health.

In the year from July 1, 1951 to the same date in 1952, the population increased only 34,000, the board estimated. That was a 2.2 per cent gain compared with 3.1 the year before.

Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, said the board makes the population estimate from a complicated formula based largely on school population. It has been remarkably accurate in the past, he said.

Dr. Erickson said there had been a definite slow-down in migration into the state. The rate of births over deaths also has decreased, he said.

The estimate puts Portland's population at 387,246, an increase of 1.8 per cent in a year. Multnomah County population outside Portland on the other hand went up 3.9 per cent to 105,036. Lane County increased 3.8 to 139,167 and Marion County 1.5 per cent to 105,544.

Sherman County continued to drop in the population list—off 6.3 per cent in the estimate. That put its population last July 1 at 2,022.

poured into her engine room and swamped one side of her deck.

The master, James Ferguson of Stranraer, sent out an SOS and gave orders to abandon ship in the boiling seas. Many rescue ships rushed to the scene about 12 miles off Port Patrick.

But it was almost impossible to get life rafts off the steep decks. The weather was bitter cold. Visibility was poor and rescuers were forced to watch helplessly while benumbed survivors were washed off their tossing rafts.

Among 13 passengers were five children. The first rescue ships found bodies floating on the waves, with here and there survivors cling to rafts and spars.
