**Chiang To Delay War Move Until U.S. Gives Okay**

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP) — Future Nationalist military operations against the Red China mainland probably will be fitted into the broad aims of American strategy. U. S. strategy is centered mainly on getting the Chinese Reds to call it quits in Korea.

Although no official statement has been made, there is every reason to believe the Chinese Nationalists are willing to co-operate fully with the United States and will not undertake any military actions without approval in Washington.

For example, there probably will be no Nationalist air raids on Red China unless the U. S. says okay. And it is generally assumed in Taipei the Nationalists are not going to take any action deliberately calculated to embroil the U. S. Seventh Fleet with the Chinese Reds.

A world-wide impression seems to have grown up in the wake of President Eisenhower's de-neutralization order that Formosa is poised to strike at the mainland. The idea also seems to have developed that big raids are forming, that blockades are tightening and that ships will be seized if they venture into this zone.

It isn't so, and it isn't likely to be so for months and maybe years.

**Alternatives Listed**

In the absence of any official indications as to what might happen, developments affecting Formosa are likely to be:

1. A stepped-up flow of U. S. military aid, including jet planes. The Nationalist Air Force has no jets.
2. Strengthening of the Military Assistance Advisory Group under Maj. Gen. William C. Chase. He has about 800 officers and men but would like to double that figure.
3. Special courses in the United States for more Nationalist officers.
4. Continued economic aid to free China through the Mutual Security Agency, which is spending some 200 million dollars a year in Formosa.

The Nationalists probably will intensify their efforts to weld guerrilla forces on the mainland into an effective threat to the Reds through better organization.

Also probable are better-planned raids from Nationalist-held island bases near Red China, in which regulars trained in Formosa would be employed and tested.

**Alaska Complains Of Hardships On Own Development**

PORTLAND (AP) — Hardships which the present military construction boom has brought to Alaska were outlined Monday by Terris Moore, University of Alaska president.

Moore, speaking at the second annual Alaska Day dinner sponsored by the Portland Chamber of Commerce, said military construction had absorbed most of the territory's labor force. This has slowed development of civilian industry, he said.

Most of the millions of dollars poured into the construction projects have found their way back to the States—in the pockets of transient workers, he added.

But Alaskan resources remain boundless and are awaiting development, he said, adding that the area's growth in the past decade has been greater than that of any other area in the United States and that the population has increased 77 per cent.

In addition, he said, the climate is warming up—the growing season in the Fairbanks region has increased from 87 1/2 days in 1905 to 116 days.

He repeated his belief that Alaska was ready for statehood. Another ceremony relating to Alaskan commerce was held in Portland Monday.

The \$400,000 towboat Yukon, built by the Albina Engine and Machine Works of Portland for the Alaska Railroad was launched.

Mrs. J. P. Johnson, wife of the general manager of the railroad, christened the new vessel which will be used to tow fuel barges on Alaskan rivers.

The railroad has ordered \$1,100,000 worth of ships from the Portland firm. Two barges already have been delivered and another towboat is 50 per cent complete.

**Four Operating Unions End Strike; 2 Continue**

CHICAGO (AP) — Four operating unions Tuesday ended their strike against the Chicago Great Western Railway. But two other unions representing switchmen and yardmasters continued the walkout.

A spokesman for the operating employees said he understood the switchmen and yardmasters would end their strike Tuesday night. The walkout began Jan. 28.
