The Reedsport Braves copped the Sub-District 5 basketball title Friday night with a 54-39 win over the Sutherlin Bulldogs at Sutherlin.

The Braves and the Roseburg Indians will enter a two-out-of-three playoff next Friday at Reedsport. The second game will be here on Saturday night, Feb. 28.

Reedsport led most of the way in their last game of the regular season. The Bulldogs, playing their finale in this year's hoop season, jumped to a 12-9 lead in the first period, but the Braves drove back to a 15-12 margin. By halftime the Braves led 29-19 and they were never threatened again. Bill Earls sparked the second period push with eight points.

Earls and teammate Jerry Ross tied for top scoring honors. Each snared 13 points. Lee Leisenger was high for Sutherlin with 11 points.

## Huskies Surge To 84-67 Win Over Oregon To Capture Title

Washington's Huskies sewed up their third straight Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division basketball championship Friday night against Oregon, 84-67, but only after a nip-and-tuck fight for three quarters of the way.

The Huskies, third ranked nationally, will meet the winner of the Southern Division in a best-of-three series in Seattle March 6-7, and if needed, for the conference crown and a berth in the NCAA Western Regionals at Corvallis, March 13-14.

Right on the heels of the conference title series, the Seattle University Chiefsains go up against Idaho State in Seattle March 10 for the right to enter the NCAA regionals as one of the 11 teams.

While pointing for the conference playoffs, Washington still has another goal — that of becoming the first team in Northern Division history to go through a 16-game season undefeated. The Huskies now have won 13 in a row.

"They'll try to make it 14 on their home floor Saturday night, while across the state at Pullman the Washington State Cougars will run for their third league win in the close-out of their two-game series with Oregon State. The Cougars kept their faint hopes of climbing out of the cellar alive Friday night with a 56-50 victory over the Beavers.

Second place Oregon found Friday night there was nothing to the rumor that "hold down Bob Houbregs and you whip the Huskies."

**Big Bob Houbregs** (8-foot-7 center who has broken nearly every division scoring record in the books, had one of his poorest nights of the season as Oregon's Chet Noe put on a light camp.

**Cardinals Sold To Beer Concern For \$3,750,000**

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The St. Louis Cardinals, close to being transferred to Milwaukee a week ago, counted themselves as one of the "money clubs" today with solid financial backing in the old home town.

Anheuser-Busch, Inc., one of the nation's largest breweries, bought the club yesterday for the announced purpose of keeping the Cardinals in St. Louis.

That puts the Cardinals in the class of such ball clubs as the Boston Red Sox of Tom Yawkey, the New York Yankees of Dan Topping, the Detroit Tigers of Walter O. Briggs, and the Chicago Cubs of Phil Wrigley.

August A. Busch Jr., 53-year-old president of the multimillion-dollar brewery who will become president of the Cardinals, said the sale was a \$3 1/2 million dollar transaction.

Of that amount, 2 1/2 million was paid to Fred Saigh, whose career as a club owner was cut short by a 15-month prison sentence for federal income tax evasion. Busch said that in addition to the sum paid Saigh "we assumed an indebtedness of 1 1/2 million dollars."

Busch, who planned an inspection trip today to the Cardinal offices at Sportsman's Park, said he will take an active part in management of the far-flung Cardinal organization.

William Walsingham Jr., remaining as vice president, will be the operating head of the organization which operates nine farm clubs and has working agreements with six others.

Backen was high-scoring for the Indians with 19 points. Beamer got 16.

Defensively and offensively, the locals looked much improved and there was plenty of fight in all of the hoopers.

William will host the Willamette Wolverines in another non-league game tonight. The Jayvee opener will start at 6:30. It will be the last season game for Roseburg. The Indians will vie with Reedsport in the Sub-District 5 playoff next weekend.

The Dalles, the state's only major undefeated team, swamped West Eas, 33-48, for its 19th consecutive victory. The Indians are heavy favorites to retain their District 2 title.

Marshfield, which will play Reedsport or Roseburg for the District 5 crown, overwhelmed Myrtle Point, 78-38. It was the 21st win in 23 games for Marshfield, ranked No. 2 in the poll.

Medford, rated third, cinched the Southern Oregon Conference championship by crushing Grants Pass, 57-39. Medford, with a 17-2 record, will play Crater of Central Point for the District 4 title.

Hillsboro, No. 4 in the poll and favorite in the coming District 9 play-off, shaded Tizard, 46-44, for its 13th consecutive victory and its 17th in 22 games.

Fifth-rated Eugene, the District 6 favorite, was idle. But Oakridge, which will be one of its chief play-off rivals, won its 19th in 21 games, downing St. Francis of Eugene, 74-62.
