Skywriting Pilot's Plane Crashes Home

HAWTHORNE, Calif. (AP)—The pilot of a skywriting plane was killed, a house was set afire and two housewives required medical treatment as the craft crashed shortly after it had taken off Thursday for San Francisco.

The dead flier was Joseph Scott Stocker, 31, Hammond, Ind., a former captain in the 1st Marine Air Wing and veteran of World War II and Korea.

The impact of the crash demolished the plane and most of the one-story house of Mrs. Betty Shepherd, 35, who suffered leg cuts. A neighbor, Mrs. Betty Klock, 30, became hysterical after the crash and also was hospitalized.

Eisenhower Sets New Pattern At Press Conference

WASHINGTON (AP)—When it comes to holding news conferences, President Eisenhower showed Tuesday he is a man of more than a few words. And the words were strictly of his own choosing.

He was pleasant. He didn't take refuge once in "no comment."

But Eisenhower himself decided what he would say, said it at some length, entertained a comparatively small number of questions, and then bade correspondents a cordial farewell—at a time he selected himself.

That's what happened when he held his first news conference since he moved into the White House.

The general reaction among newsmen was that he left no doubt he was master of the situation from start to finish.

Some reporters appeared to like the change. Others voiced doubts.

In any event, the President himself said it need not serve as a fixed pattern for the future, that he is apt to change habits at any time and welcomed suggestions.

Douglas County Given Defense Bonds Quota

Douglas County has been assigned 2.34 percent of the state's quota for the 1953 sale of defense bonds, according to E. C. Sammons, state chairman of the Oregon Defense Bonds Committee.

The total quota is \$1,037,500, broken down as follows: Series E, \$687,863; H bonds, \$183,637, and series J and K, \$166,000. Douglas County ranks seventh in quota among the state's 36 counties.

Douglas County's average bond sales for 1951 and 1952 amounted to \$659,000, the committee said.

The Treasury Department hopes this year to sell \$5,850,000 worth of E, H, J and K bonds. Oregon's share was recently announced as being \$46,300,000 against sales last year of approximately \$34 million dollars. To reach the quota, sales in the state must be increased almost 60 per cent.
