Mrs. Walter Fisher Gives Interesting Program Talk

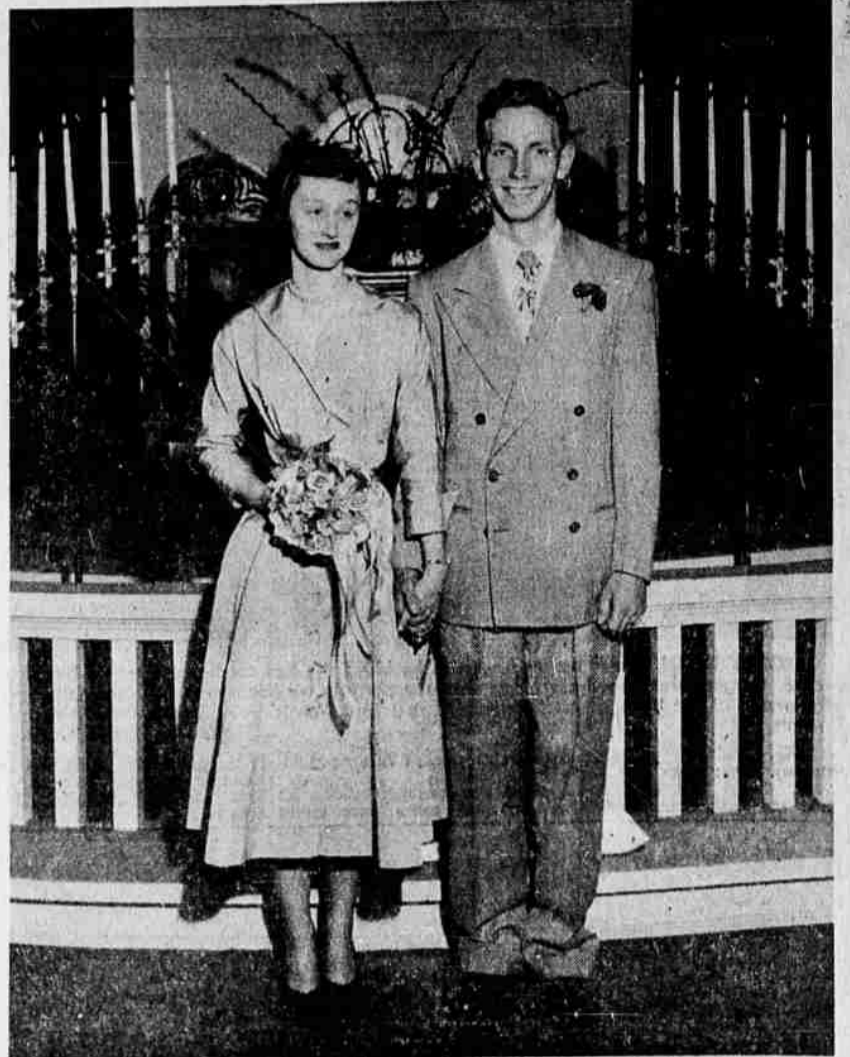
