

Lillie Copeland Of Oakland Dies

Lillie Copeland, 86, of Oakland died Friday after an extended illness.

She was the daughter of John and Kansas Jones, early Douglas County pioneers. She was born in Wilbur June 14, 1866, and was married to Thomas Benton Copeland Oct. 31, 1886. In her early married life, she and her husband ran a grocery store in Oakland and were later in stock raising. Her husband preceded her in death 34 years ago.

Her reminiscences show she was 16 when the town of Oakland was moved from the old town, about a mile northeast of the present town. This move was made in 1870. She has lived in Oakland and vicinity all her life.

Survivors are five sons: Alva, Arthur and Kenneth of Oakland, Bud of Wilbur and Joe of Arden, Calif.; two daughters: Sadie Baker of Roseburg and Marguerite Wegner of Whittier, Calif.; 19 grandchildren, great grandchildren and great-great grandchildren.

Services will be held Monday at 2 p.m. in the Christian Church in Oakland with Rev. J. M. Grant officiating. Interment will be in the family plot of the IOOF Cemetery in Oakland. Stearns Mortuary is in charge of arrangements.

James Albert Wade Dies After Illness

James Albert Wade, 75, a resident of Roseburg for many years, died Friday at Mercy Hospital following a short illness. He was born on March 29, 1877, in Menasha County, Neb., and was a member of the Christian Church.

Cough is almost always present in disorders of the lungs and bronchi (bronchial tubes); also, in some heart and blood vessel diseases. It is a protective reflex symptom, usually induced by changes in the mucous membrane of the trachea or windpipe and bronchial tubes, or caused by the presence of foreign matter or excess mucus.

The most common causes of hemorrhage or spilling up of blood are tuberculosis of the lungs, certain heart conditions, bronchial diseases and cancer of the lungs. It may occur in many other constitutional and lung disorders.

Severe coughing from choking or strangling may bring up blood-tinged sputum. This type of cough results when food particles get lodged beneath the epiglottis. The epiglottis is the covering of the larynx or voice box. It protects the windpipe from food particles, except on occasion when the swallowing of a mouthful of food is accompanied by a deep breath.

The nature of the lung disease can usually be determined by the amount of the sputum, by its nature, color, consistency, bacteria, and foreign matter. Rarely, fatal lung diseases may be present without expectoration or cough.

Emaciation and weakness are symptoms of a great many lung diseases, but particularly of tuberculosis. It generally also oc-

cumulating on skid roads, placement of new logging and forest roads and churning of the soil on winter logging shows.

He pointed up the danger by citing siltation samples on the South Umpqua River near Brockway Bridge. Every year, Hayes said, 181,000 tons of silt—60 acre-feet—were carried in suspension down the river past that point.

Damages Fish Life—Damage of wildlife and fish follows, according to Bill Pitney, Roseburg, fisheries agent for the Game Commission. In stream beds, silt settles to the bottom of pools, destroying fish food there. And when logging debris is added to other impurities in the water, spawning beds may be destroyed.

This happens when logging trash partially fills the river, slowing velocity. Silt then settles on gravelly riffles where migratory fish normally spawn.

Bill Huber, wildlife manager for the U. S. Forest Service in Portland, added that major damage to wildlife happens near logging camps. When the forest canopy is opened, natural browse takes hold, and deer, in particular, tend to stay near the open spaces. Poaching near the logging camps is commonplace, Huber stated, and enforcement of game laws is difficult.

Opening of the forest cover provides good browse for big game animals, but he warned that over-browsing can hurt tree reproduction.

Ominous Note—John McKean, chief of game management for the Oregon Game Commission, entered an ominous note into the discussion. He charged that livestock associations are trying to get public lands turned over to the states and thus break federal "protective devices" imposed on grazing regulations on the national forests and Department of Interior lands. This may follow Congressional decision to turn over tidelands oil lands to the states, he claimed. He prophesied that livestock interests would claim that public lands fall under the same classification as the tidelands.

Bob Auderheide, supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest, offered a three-point program for the better management of watersheds and resultant water and soil conservation. It was:

1. Better practice in locating forest roads, keeping them away from stream beds as nearly as possible to neutralize erosion.

2. Better grading practice on forest roads, where water often runs down the roads, carrying soil with it.

3. Drainage on woods road construction.

He also recommended a program of education to make the public aware of damage caused by poor practices.

Glide District Bonds Approved By Attorneys—An architect, representing the firm of Freeman, Haystack and Tuft of Portland reports that the Portland bonding attorneys have approved the bond issue of Glide School District 12. Bids on the construction of the four new grade school classrooms will open March 24.

The announcement was made at a meeting of the school board Tuesday.

At the same meeting, the board ordered the purchase of a new school bus to relieve the crowded conditions on the existing buses. This will bring the total number of Glide School buses to 12. The new bus is the pusher type (engine in the rear) similar to Greyhound buses, with a seating capacity of 76 passengers. Delivery will be made March 1.

A cigarette manufacturers' price increase forced the raise in retail price, according to one local retailer.

Cartons now are selling for \$1.73, with single packages 18 cents and more. The move followed price increases in Portland and Eugene.

Condition Of Injured Men Reported Improved

Doctors treating the two men who were burned in a Martin Box Co. dust explosion Friday could not be reached for a statement on the condition of the men, but a hospital report describes them as "improved."

Cecil Stevens, 34, of Oakland and Robert H. Sample, 28, of Sutherlin were burned critically in the early morning hours at Oakland Friday when a spark from a burner set off a dust blast at the Martin Box Co. plant.

The third man, plywood operator A. third man, Albert A. Vogt, 28, of Sutherlin died in the hospital as a result of the burns 12 hours after the accident.

Second Complaint Filed In Court On Accident—Damages of \$20,000 are asked by Naomi Slaughter of Portland in a suit filed in Circuit Court Thursday. She also asks \$349.80 special damages.

Miss Slaughter charges negligence resulting in an automobile accident in which she was injured as a passenger.

The complaint states that Ryder was driver of the car, which overtook 37 miles north of Grants Pass on July 10, 1952. This is the second suit filed against Ryder on the accident. In the first, Joan Smith asked \$20,000 damages.

Congressmen Call New York Police In Investigation—NEW YORK—Police Commissioner George P. Monaghan was called today before congressmen seeking to determine whether New York City police had improperly exempted from FBI scrutiny of alleged brutality.

Conrad H. Rothengast, the force's top line officer, was listed as witnesses as a House Judiciary subcommittee prepared to resume public hearings.

The subcommittee is investigating reports that New York police and the U. S. Justice Department had an agreement last year, sparing local police questioning by the FBI in complaints of brutality. Federal civil rights procedure provides that the FBI probe such cases.

Since reports of an agreement were first aired publicly about two weeks ago, Monaghan has repeatedly said the police had no such agreement with the Justice Department.

However, the first witness to appear before the subcommittee at its opening session yesterday said Monaghan had told him personally last Nov. 12 that former Asst. U. S. Atty. Gen. James McInerney had agreed to let New York police make their own investigations of brutality charges.

Three Children Perish In Apartment Blaze—PORTLAND—Three children died in an apartment house fire here early Saturday.

They were identified as Leon Douglas, 8, Michael Paul, 3, and Sheila Joyce, 18 months, the children of Mrs. Thekla Odessa Granville, 35.

Another son, Roy Leslie, 9, leaped to safety from a second story window. Firemen got the younger children out but efforts to revive them failed. The body of Leon, a polio victim, was not found until the fire was put out.

Despondent Woman Kills Husband, Burns Self—FT. PIERCE, Fla.—A 70-year-old woman, despondent and distrustful of her husband, drenched her clothing with kerosene Friday and then set it ablaze. In this way, Mrs. Katherine Barney, a native of England, committed suicide.
