WASHINGTON (AP) — A British move to tighten controls on strategic shipments to Communist China was reported shaping up Friday at the Anglo-American conference on cold war policy.

The House also sent to the governor a bill to pay 40 per cent of basic school money to districts on August 1 of each year, 30 per cent December 1, and the rest April 15. Half the money now is paid October 15, and half April 15.

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ROK Soldiers Beat Attackers

SEOUL (AP) — Determined South Korean soldiers today beat off five bloody Communist counterattacks and held grimly to a newly won, shell-scarred knob on Sniper Ridge on the Korean Central Front.

Chinese Red assaults, supported by stinging artillery and mortar fire, forced the South Koreans off the outpost briefly, but they later stormed back in a bitter hand-to-hand battle.

Allied soldiers made no effort to hide the fact that the death of Russian Premier Joseph Stalin—like the death of any Communist—was good news to them. But few thought it would have any effect on life in the bunkers of the bleak battlefield.

In the air, eight U. S. B-29 Superforts rode out scattered Red anti-aircraft fire and dumped 80 tons of bombs on Communist troop and supply centers along the battlefield. Crewmen reported good results.

ACTIVATE DIVISIONS

TOKYO (AP) — Gen. Mark Clark's Far East headquarters disclosed Friday the formal activation of two new South Korean infantry divisions, the 20th and 21st.

This brings to 14 the number of Republic of Korea divisions, with a strength of approximately 200,000 men.

In describing the system, he compared it to a stone dropped in a still lake. The circles (signals) go out with strengths decreasing with the distance of origination.

However, Roelle has proved to himself and others that a booster unit would intensify the signals enough to make television feasible for this area.

The request for the franchise mentions that first installation on the system must begin within 12 months of granting of the franchise, and the system must be in first operation within 18 months.

Depends Upon Franchise

"However, the whole thing depends on whether or not we get the franchise," pointed out J. F. (Si) Dillard, who with Roelle and nine others form United Radio Television, Inc. Roelle added, however, that vital equipment needed for basic installation is on tentative order.

Dillard would not estimate possible cost of installation of the system.

"The cost and the fee assessed the subscribers, naturally would be determined by the extent of the system and cost and availability of materials," he said.

Dillard also explained that the system might be made for other populated parts of the county. Transmission by means other than coaxial cable to other parts of the county would be virtually impossible because of the mountainous terrain.

"The system is the best possibility for TV here," he said. Roelle said that the system probably would be exposed in Roseburg—the cable would be strung from poles rather than buried in the streets.

The system would not be the first in the Northwest. A Mr. Parsons in Astoria pioneered it, and since, Bellingham and Pakeo, Wash., have been served by the method.

Besides Roseburg, at least one other town in Oregon—Albany—has been considered for introducing systems similar to Roelle's, he said.

Sergeant Wilcoxen comes to Roseburg from Eugene, where he served in the recruiting office. He is a veteran of the Korean War, having served overseas there for 18 months until April, 1952.

Wilcoxen is a 12-year veteran of Army service in the transportation corps. He originally is from Phoenix, Ariz.

During World War II, he served in the Caribbean and European theaters, and has a total of 77 months of overseas service, including his tour of duty in Korea. He brings his wife and a daughter, Grace Ellen, 5. The family is looking for housing, and Sgt. Wilcoxen says they prefer a partially furnished two-bedroom home.

MME CHAING TO ARRIVE
WASHINGTON (AP) — Mme. Chiang Kai-shek, wife of the Chinese Nationalist President, is expected here next week for a visit of several days. She has been visiting in New York following medical treatment in San Francisco.

At this stage there is no prospect of any change in the policies Stalin pursued.

Friday afternoon a motor hearse left the St. Spassky gate in the Kremlin. While thousands assembled on Red Square to see it, the hearse moved slowly from the Kremlin to the Hall of Columns, bearing Stalin's coffin.

Immense heaps of flowers and wreaths surrounded the Russians began filing past to gaze for the last time at the man who led them to victory over Nazi Germany. Thousands were in line when the doors opened.

The processions for those wishing to say "Svidaniya" (goodbye) will continue day and night until the funeral, a commission headed by Nikita S. Khrushchev now is working on funeral plans. No date has been announced for the final services nor has there been any word where Stalin is to be buried.

The Hall of Columns is only a few hundred yards from the great mausoleum in Red square where V. I. Lenin, Stalin's predecessor and the father of Russian Communism, lies enshrined in a glass coffin.

Moscow was cold, windy and unpleasant Friday, but life went on about as usual. Hundreds still were filing into churches to place candles before icons. There were tears in the eyes of some, some had grim, set faces, many crossed themselves repeatedly.

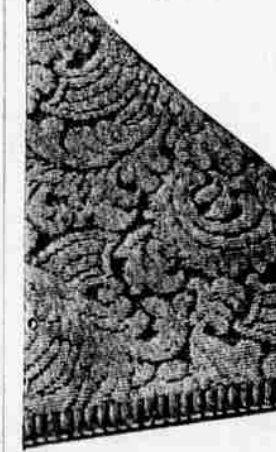
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
