

Executive Order Hits Deferments From Draft

WASHINGTON (AP) — Selective service officials said Thursday an executive order is under consideration designed to make it impossible for any young man to get what amounts to a permanent draft deferment by marrying and becoming a father while temporarily deferred.

The manpower committee of the Office of Defense Mobilization has agreed that changes to bar this possibility should be made in the draft regulations, these officials said.

Selective service officials said ap-

proval of the changes would lead to early induction of about 20,000 fathers who were deferred originally as students, and are now deferred because they have dependents.

House Moving To Plug Hole In Severance Pay

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House appropriations subcommittee promised Thursday to plug a legal loophole through which its chairman contends \$709,538 leaked to high officials and employees of the Truman administration.

In all, a subcommittee statement claimed, 215 officials and employees—including eight cabinet officers—drew that total for unused leave or vacation time between Nov. 1, 1952, and Feb. 15, 1953.

However, civil service officials—as well as a number of those named as receiving the payments—defended them as justified. A statement by civil service administrators cited Public Law 525, enacted in 1944, and said it allows an employee leaving government service to be paid in a lump sum for all his accumulated annual vacation leave.

The statement said there was no record of any commission ruling on such lump sum payments.

Subcommittee Chairman Phillips (R-Calif.) had told newsmen it appeared the cabinet officers were paid under a civil service commission ruling.

"There was nothing illegal about it, although some aspects of it seem to be at least unusual," Phillips commented.

Phillips said the subcommittee would question officials of the Civil Service Commission, the General Accounting Office and Chairman Rees (R-Kan.) of the House Civil Service Committee.

Washington Legislature Meets In Special Session

OLYMPIA (AP) — Gov. Langlie revealed Thursday he will call the 33rd Legislature back into special session in the near future to complete action on unfinished business.

He announced his decision after a lengthy conference with Republican leaders from both House and Senate.

The chief executive said the time for the special session had not yet been decided but "I think it will be in the near future."

He told reporters that several urgent bills sponsored by the administration had failed to come up for final action.

Church Council Opposes Senate Investigation

NEW YORK (AP) — The National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U. S. A. says freedom is endangered by "certain methods" of congressional Communist investigations affecting educational institutions.

Congress has no business encroaching on local control of schools, the council contends, and local trustees and boards of education can deal responsibly with the "occasional subversive" in the institutions.

Hearings Will Be Held On Portland College

SALEM (AP) — The House Education Committee decided to hold a hearing Thursday morning to give the State Board of Higher Education a chance to object to making Portland State College a four-year school.

The committee voted 5 to 3 for the bill last week. Then it withdrew its recommendation in order to let the board give its views.

The committee also recommended approval of a resolution for an interim committee to make a two-year study of educational television. The committee would have \$10,000 to spend.

Trappist Monks Announce Plans For Monastery

McMINNVILLE (AP) — The order of Trappist monks announced plans Thursday to establish a monastery on a 1,200-acre site in the rich Willamette Valley near here.

It will be the first Trappist Abbey on the West Coast.

An announcement from the Abbey of Our Lady of Guadalupe at Pecos, N. M., said the community there would be transferred to the site here.

Temporary buildings will go up soon, and a small group of monks will begin building for eventual transfer of the others, the announcement said.

The purchase of the land recently was completed by the Rt. Rev. Don M. Columban Hawkins, O. C. S. O., abbot of the Abbey at Pecos, and his procurator, the Rev. M. Christopher, O. C. S. O.

The site is three miles north of Lafayette, the bulk of the property purchased from Harry Kuehne of Carlton. Others selling land were C. E. Terry, Otto Wiechmann, J. L. Hewitt and M. Z. Jones, James B. Rogers, and Frank Jones.

Back Leave Pay Schedule Is Explained By Official

WASHINGTON (AP) — A State Department official explained Thursday how a foreign service career officer collected \$12,540.12 in annual leave pay on his retirement.

The career officer was Walter J. Donnelly, high commissioner to Germany, who quit on Dec. 31, 1952, after spending 35 years in the foreign service.

A House Appropriations Subcommittee reported Wednesday that high government officials, including cabinet officers, collected \$709,538 in this way.

Since Donnelly received the most paid any State Department employee, a reporter asked if figures could be given to show how the leave pay was calculated.

Ernest Colantonio, chief of the technical services section, said Donnelly ran up his backlog of time owed him simply by going year after year without taking a vacation.

In the war years, for example, from 1942 through 1945 Donnelly took only two days of annual leave. Yet, as a foreign officer, he was entitled to 60 calendar days' leave each year. As a result, he had 240 days coming to him, theoretically, but took only two.

Actually, there's a limit to how much back time any employee can stack up. In this case, the total was 180 days. Any time Donnelly had coming to him in excess of that, he forfeited.

Colantonio said the figures show that from 1940 through 1951, when Donnelly was entitled to 60 days leave each year, he never once took the full amount. The nearest he came was in 1941, when he took 55. In five years, he took no leave at all. In two other years, he took only two days leave.

As a result, Colantonio said, Don-

nely forfeited more than 500 days he had coming to him.

Even so, he still had the maximum allowed, 180 days, coming to him when he retired.

This is approximately a half year, and that is approximately what he collected—a half year's pay on his \$25,000 a year salary.

Colantonio said this is routine procedure and has been followed ever since 1944.

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
