## New Psychology: Tell Patient If He Is To Die

LOS ANGELES (AP) — When a doc-  
tor discovers that a patient is fa-  
tally ill, should he tell him?  
Yes, says Dr. Philip J. Vogel,  
even if the patient is neurotic—a  
chronic worrier.  
"If you don't tell him," Vogel  
added, "He will develop an anx-  
iety which is worse than the fear  
of death."  
The present trend, Vogel said,  
is away from the policy of hiding  
the grim facts from victims of  
hopeless ailments. In nearly every  
case, he said, they will suspect  
that something is being withheld  
from them. As this suspicion  
grows, they will lose faith in the  
doctor and in all those around  
them who have been aiding the  
deception.  
Vogel, a Pasadena, Calif., neu-  
rologist, appeared yesterday on a  
panel discussing hopeless prognos-  
is at the alumni convention of the  
College of Medical Evange-  
lists. He is head of the college's  
department of neurosurgery.

The Choctaws go before the  
three-man Indian Claims Commis-  
sion in Meridian, Miss., Monday  
to give testimony about the raw  
deal they claim their ancestors got  
from the white man about 100  
years ago. The commission will  
report its findings later to Con-  
gress.  
The Choctaw band, most of them  
living in Mississippi, are placing

their faith in the hands of A. T.  
Weir, a 73-year-old Philadelphia,  
Miss., lawyer, who says his sum  
total of schooling amounts to four  
months and two days.

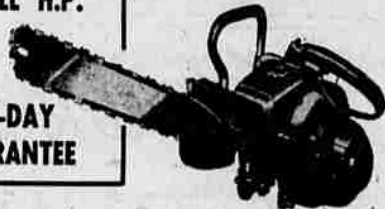

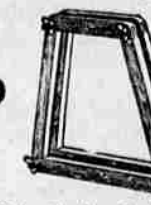
