## Jennie Tourel, Concert Singer Due Wednesday

Jennie Tourel, celebrated concert and opera singer, will be heard on the stage of the Junior High School Auditorium Wednesday, Mar. 25, at 8:15 p. m. This is the third in a series of Community Concert Association presentations of the winter season.

Mrs. Tourel can justly be described as one of the most loved and appreciated artists now before the public, advance notices state. With supreme dedication to her art and blessed with a multitude of gifts, she has made a place for herself in the world of music virtually without equal for the speed of ascendancy and solidity of fame.

It is now ten years since Miss Tourel first burst upon the U. S. music scene with an impact of such proportions that it would not be an exaggeration to say that the reverberations are echoing still. The sensation she created when she made her American concert debut with the New York Philharmonic under Arturo Toscanini in October 1942 has never had a chance to subside. Rather, her fame and reputation have grown and deepened with each passing season. Now, in a little over ten years, Miss Tourel, in keeping with her spectacular ascendancy, is hailed everywhere as one of the greatest concert singers of all time. Having been given all out acclaim in South America, Europe, the U. S., Canada and Israel, Miss Tourel is a living example of a Golden Age of Singing in our own day. Virgil Thomson, one of the first to acclaim this fact, vividly summed up her up in one paragraph:

"She moves around in each tongue as if it were a whole new landscape and climate, untranslatable, untranslatable and unique. Miss Tourel is, I believe, unequalled among living singers for the high concentration in one artist of vocal mastery, sound musicianship and stylistic flexibility."

And Time Magazine, in an article devoted to the Tourel success story, said: "One of the four top vocalists singing in the U. S. today and probably the most versatile."

Currently on her eighth consecutive trans-continental tour of the U. S. and Canada, Miss Tourel has also made six post-war tours of Europe, two of South America and

## Bavaria Afraid She'll Lose Valuable Paintings

MUNICH, Germany (AP)—Bavaria's State Parliament has voted not to send a valuable collection of 83 great oil paintings to the United States for exhibit. The Bavarians are afraid they won't get them back, or that they might be damaged.

The pictures, from the Bavarian Art Gallery, were to be shown in New York, Boston, Philadelphia, San Francisco and Washington. The West German Foreign Office at Bonn said earlier the property of Bavaria State is not protected by law from confiscation outside Germany.

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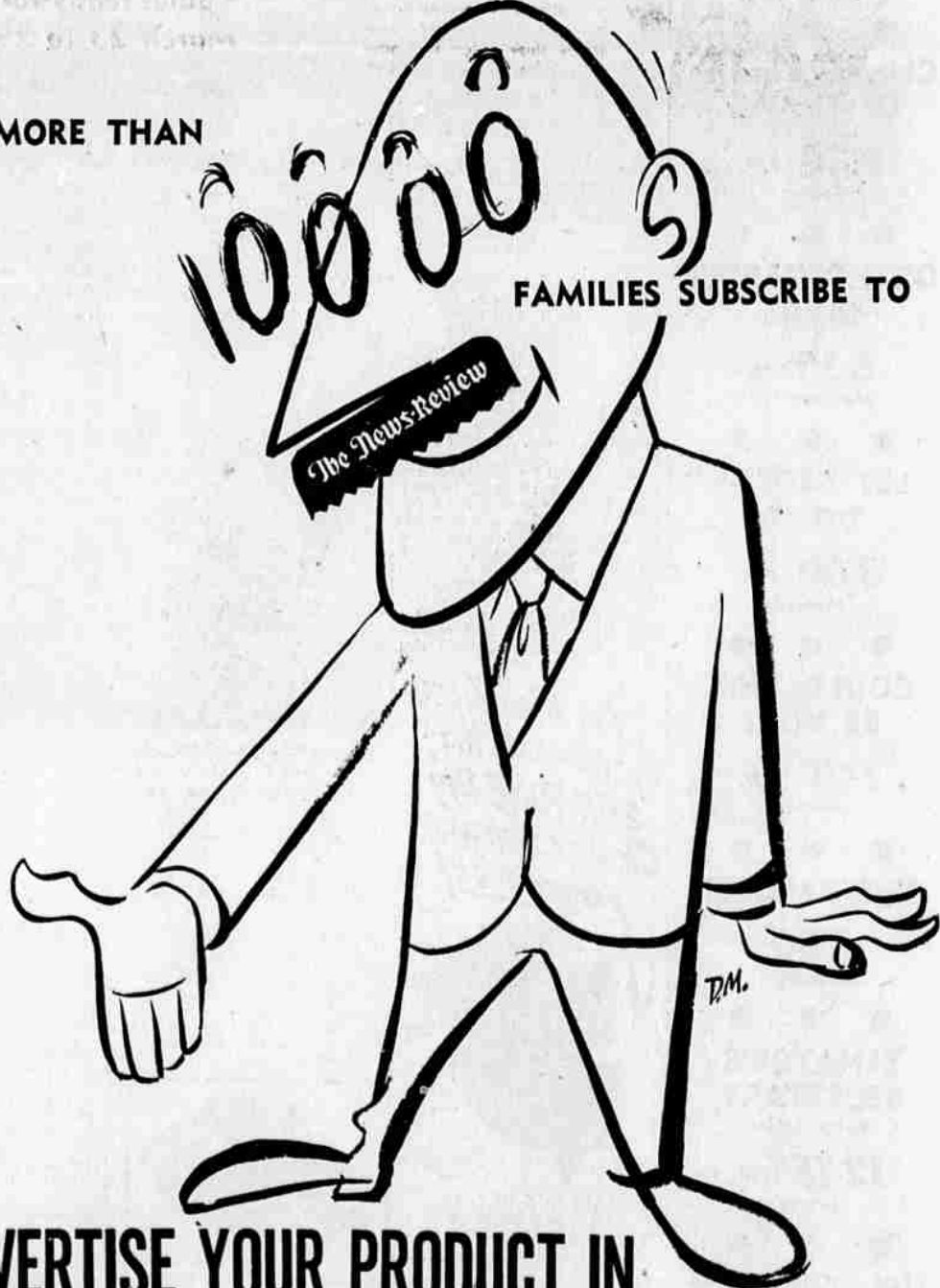
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
