making all preparations and will be ready to go. We don't want to do anything to hold up negotiations.

Of 132,000 Chinese and North Korean prisoners in U. N. stockades, only about 81,000 have said they want to go home. The Communists have listed 3,198 American prisoners, all of whom presumably would want to leave North Korea, and about 9,000 other prisoners, mostly South Koreans.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States was reported today as determined to stand firm, in any truce talks which develop in Korea, on the principle that prisoners of war shall not forcibly be returned home.

Officials puzzling over a Korean armistice plan broadcast by Chinese Communist Premier Chou En-lai and distributed among the United Nations asserted there can be no compromise on this point and no acceptance of any complicated formula which would have the effect of compromising it.

Chou's statement indicated the Reds might be prepared to accept voluntary repatriation of prisoners, but whether that is their real intention remains to be spelled out in further exchanges and almost certainly in renewed negotiations at Panmunjom.

Youth Confesses Five Slayings

DUBUQUE, Ia. (AP)—The father of an 18-year-old Marine was flying to Dubuque today "to see for myself" that it is his son who Dubuque County authorities say has admitted slaying five people in four days.

Authorities from three states also were en route here to question Fred E. McManus of Valley Stream, N. Y.

Dubuque County Sheriff, Leo J. Martin said McManus in a signed statement had admitted double slayings in Minnesota and Illinois and the fatal shooting in New York state of a Hobart College student whose body has not yet been found.

Mose McManus, father of the young Marine, told newsmen in Valley Stream last night he would fly here on the first plane he could get because he "can't believe it's my son" involved in the slayings.

Young McManus was picked up with a 16-year-old Summerville, N. Y., girl he said was his wife, and another man in a stolen red-and-black convertible near here late yesterday.

NARCOTICS PEDDLER

NEW YORK (AP)—A snappily dressed young man was accused by detectives Monday night of wholesaling narcotics by leaving the drugs in dime subway lockers and then peddling the locker keys for \$500 each.

Police said the man identified as Joseph Durso, 25, netted about \$30,000 a week.

Message To Alert Teams If Portland Is Bombed

If Portland is bombed, a seven word message to county civil defense directors throughout Oregon will result in immediate mobilization and dispatch of some 26,000 persons attached to four types of mobile medical teams.

Instructions to activate "Medical Plan A" will draw a maximum number of mobile teams and supplies, said Dr. Harold M. Erickson, head of the Medical Service for the Oregon Civil Defense Agency. It is flexible and can be used in modified form for emergencies occurring in other parts of the state.

Each county has received a project sheet listing number of teams to furnish, quantity of blood, assembly points, and highway routes. Douglas County, according to suggested quotas released by the Oregon CD agency last year, has been asked to organize 10 mobile first-aid teams, 14 mobile medical-hospital teams, public health personnel, and be able to furnish 1206 pints of type 'O' blood.

dens said: "We do not hesitate to state that the degradation, lack of control and general confusion in the Oregon State Penitentiary is without parallel in our experience."

They said that control of the prison "has almost completely left the hands of authorities and passed to those of the inmates."

Numerous cases of convicts attacking guards and receiving little or no punishment were cited. The convicts were "cursed by the guards, carry tools to their cells, possess knives and liquor, engage in homosexual practices, dig tunnels, and forge passes—all without fear of punishment the report said."

The Board of Control, made up of Gov. Patterson, State Treasurer Sig Unanue and Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry, said that despite O'Malley's dismissal, the prison's new rehabilitation program will continue.

RC DRIVE EXTENDED

Second Class Mailing Rates Go Up 10 Percent

WASHINGTON (AP)—Second class mailing rates go up another 10 per cent Wednesday in another of the series of staggered rate increases authorized by Congress in 1951.

The second class postal service handles newspapers, magazines and similar periodicals.

The basic charge for such matter went up 10 per cent on April 1, 1952, adding—according to Post Office officials—between four and 4½ million dollars a year to department revenues. The second similar increase becoming effective Wednesday, and also calculated on the basic charges as of March 31, 1952, will add a like amount. A third 10 per cent increase is due April 1, 1954.

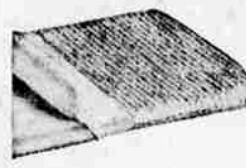

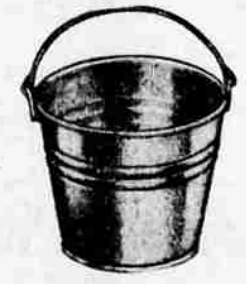
