rest that Kelly was dead. When Parlin was identified by Mrs. Kelly as her husband's assailant, he was charged with the death. He said he thought he was being arrested on an assault charge, state police said.

An autopsy was performed by Coroner Powers and the cause of death was determined as a brain hemorrhage. A fresh hemorrhage was found at the base of the skull. Blood tests were sent to Portland from both the victim and Parlin to determine if any drinking was involved.

Kelly was a mill foreman at the Roseburg Lumber Co. plywood department. He was born March 22, 1914, in Olympia, Wash., and came to Oregon two years ago. He was a member of Kelso Lodge 94, AP and AM, Kelso, Wash.

Surviving are his wife, Elsie; two daughters, Janice and Leone of Roseburg; his mother, Mrs. Stella Kelly, Olympia and two brothers, Robert and Phillip, both of Olympia.

The body will be taken from the Roseburg Funeral Home to Olympia for burial.

## Progress Marks Start Of POW Swap Talks

wounded captured personnel of both sides at Panmunjom.

2. The exchange would begin within seven days after the procedure is agreed upon.

3. The U. N. would deliver 500 captured personnel daily at Panmunjom until the exchange is completed.

4. The captured personnel to be exchanged would be divided into groups of 25 each, registered by nationality, name, rank and serial number.

5. A representative of the receiving side would sign a receipt for each group accepted.

6. Motor and rail convoys would be guaranteed freedom from air attacks while moving toward Panmunjom. (A) Motor convoys would be limited to 10 vehicles each and move in daylight. (B) Each vehicle would be clearly marked. (C) Bivouac areas and stopovers would be reported in advance.

7. Liaison groups would have free access to the Panmunjom area, but would be limited to 300 personnel on each side, including the prisoners being delivered.

8. Officers would be appointed to arrange for administrative procedure.

9. A termination date for the exchange would be set when the head of each liaison group signs the agreement.

Armistice May Re-open

If the agreed upon exchange of sick and wounded POWs is completed to the satisfaction of U. N. Commander Gen. Mark Clark, he has indicated he will agree to a reopening of the full-scale armistice negotiations as suggested March 30 by Red China's Premier, Chou En-lai.

The U. N. holds 132,000 Red POWs. About 51,000 have said they don't want to go back to Communist territory. The Reds said last Dec. 18 they hold 2,198 Americans, about 1,000 British and Commonwealth soldiers, and some 9,000 South Koreans.

New Glendale High School Cost Itemized

Glendale Superintendent James Pate reports that the new Glendale High School should be completed for occupancy by Oct. 20 of this year.

In listing the breakdown of costs on the new school, he reported construction would cost a total \$284,091. He pointed out that this leaves \$45,909 for landscaping and an athletic field. The biggest item of construction listed by him was the building itself, which will cost \$223,529.

The construction contract was signed with Wiley Construction Co. of Ashland March 23. Bulldozing and leveling of the site of the new school was begun the same day. The first cement will be poured within two weeks, according to Pate.

The annual crusade of the Oregon division, American Cancer Society, will be held in Douglas County and the rest of the state during the month of April, which has been designated cancer control month by the U. S. Congress.

The campaign in Douglas county will be under the direction of Mrs. Erika Graham, of Roseburg. The crusade has a two-fold purpose, according to Mrs. Graham: to raise funds to support the various research, education and service programs of the society and to acquaint persons with the facts about cancer, the nation's No. 2 killer.

ly membership or ties have invoked the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution, which says nobody can be required to testify against himself.

Although members of the two committees concede it is no admission of guilt for anyone to seek the protection of the Fifth Amendment, they obviously look with suspicion on an individual who uses it.

Numerous schools, moreover, are dismissing or suspending faculty members who refuse to answer questions about communism. Firing is automatic in New York City under a provision of the City Charter.

Many of those who invoked the Fifth Amendment were named as Communists or at least one-time Communists by witnesses who said they themselves had been Reds but broke with the party. A number denied being Communists at the time they were questioned but declined to say whether they had been Reds in the past.

In addition to invoking the Fifth Amendment, various witnesses have contended the investigating committees have no right to get into educational affairs and are jeopardizing academic freedom.

Former Communists have taken a different approach to that, siding in many instances with committee members who say they are guarding academic freedom because communism destroys it. The committees insist, furthermore, that they aren't investigating education or educational institutions as such but are turning the glare of publicity on individuals.
