

## Five Sentenced In Local Court

Five men Monday were sentenced to varying penalties on charges of drunken driving, and a sixth pleaded innocent in District Court, according to Judge A. J. Geddes.

William Henry Hoffman, 23, Brockway, and Tracy Osborne, 22, Myrtle Creek, each received \$500 fines, 30-day jail sentences and had their drivers' licenses suspended for a year.

Thomas Victor Manly, 47, 5 Urich Place, Roseburg, was fined \$400, and also received a 30-day jail term and a year's suspension of his driver's license.

Eugene Debs Smith, 59, Tenmile, was fined \$600 for drunken driving, and an additional fine of \$75 for driving with a revoked driver's license. He, too, was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail.

John Monroe Brahm, 29, Myrtle Creek, was fined \$500 and sentenced to 30 days in jail.

Pleading innocent to the charge was Benjamin Franklin Porter, and Judge Geddes set his hearing for April 13. He was freed on \$600 bail.

## Prisoner Exchange Agreement Reached

Both sides will present rosters giving name, rank and nationality when delivering prisoners, and sign receipts for those delivered.

**To Submit Changes** — The Reds said they would submit changes and additions to other points of the plan.

Adm. Daniel said he thought the Reds were not prepared to start the exchange immediately because "their staff work is not ready for them to make the exchange."

During the discussions, the Communists made only one reservation. Lee said:

"We reserve the right to ask for the accommodation in a neutral country of those prisoners of war in the custody of your side who will not be directly repatriated."

This puzzled Allied negotiators, since it already had been agreed to bypass Article 110 of the Geneva Convention, which assigns a neutral country to prisoners with minor wounds who might be able to fight again within a year.

**No Reference Made** — Lee made no reference to sick and wounded in the statement, and in this advance U.N. camp it was assumed he referred to an over-all exchange of prisoners that would follow a complete armistice. This would be in line with a recent proposal by Red Chinese Premier Chou En-lai for the over-all exchange of prisoners under Article 109 of the Geneva Convention.

Article 109 provides that sick and wounded prisoners need not be exchanged against their wishes during hostilities.

The Communists proposed March 30 that prisoners who do not want to return home be given to the custody of a neutral country until their fate is determined.

About 51,000 of the approximately 132,000 prisoners in Allied hands have indicated they do not want to go home.

**U.N. Accepts** — At Tuesday's liaison meeting at Panmunjom, Adm. Daniel told the Reds the U.N. accepted the sick and wounded repatriation plan.

The Reds immediately asked for a recess of 20 minutes, and extended it for another 20 minutes. Then Lee announced that the Reds would agree to the exchange.

He added, however, that the Reds would submit their versions of the following parts of the Daniel's plan:

1. Exchange to begin within seven days after details are settled.

2. Delivery of prisoners at the rate of 500 daily until exchange is completed.

3. Liaison groups would have free access to the Panmunjom area.

4. The number of persons in the Panmunjom area, including persons being exchanged, should not exceed 300 on each side at any one time.

Allied officers said they considered these minor points that readily could be worked out. They said they anticipated no trouble reaching swift settlement.

## Train Derailed In Desert Area

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — The Union Pacific's Los Angeles Limited hit a freight train at a siding 62 miles south of here Tuesday, derailling the lead diesel unit of the passenger train.

Two dining car waiters were bruised but there were no other injuries, the railroad said.

The spot where the crash occurred is at Moore, Calif., in isolated desert country just inside the California-Nevada line. The train was westbound with 300 passengers from Chicago to Los Angeles.

The railroad said the rest of the passenger train remained on the tracks. Most of the passengers were asleep when the mishap occurred at 5 a.m.

Several cars of the freight were knocked off the track but remained upright. The limited was returned to Las Vegas to await reopening of the line, expected about noon.

he had been carrying globes, maps and source books from room to room for two years and that his request for a home room might have been interpreted as a "poor attitude."

Guzzo said that being on probation next year would cost him \$360 since a scheduled raise in pay would be withheld.

**Changes Income** — Buss said his probational standing would make a difference of \$470 in his next year's pay, placing him, with ten years of teaching experience, on the same pay scale as a five-year teacher.

He said he thought his trouble resulted from an argument last fall over a basketball basketball court which he had tried to have built at Fullerton School.

Several non-union teachers who have been placed on probation for next year also aired their opinions, and two High School students rose to defend the teachers.

**Another On Probation** — Senior High Physical Education Teacher Paula Reff, not a member of the AFT, said she had been told she would be on probation next year minus her scheduled \$350 raise, and that Principal Harry Jacoby had told her she was not co-operative.

## Liquor License Bids Accepted

The Roseburg City Council Monday night accepted the applications of six establishments for liquor by the drink.

They are:

Wally's Pastime, 329 Cass St.

Hotel Umpqua, Oak and Jackson Sts.

Rose Room, 204 S. Stephens St.

The Shalimar, 122 S. Stephens St.

The Friendly Tavern, 535 S. Stephens St.

The Oriental Cafe, 503 N. Jackson St.

Among the six and others which may apply later, only five will finally receive licenses as the Oregon Legislature has set up the new liquor regulations. In addition, three lodges — Elks, Eagles and Moose — probably will receive licenses.

The Council has authority only for accepting applications and recommending establishments to the Oregon Liquor Control Commission, which has the final say in the disbursement of the licenses. Only Councilman George Luoma voted against the recommendations, presented all at once.

The state, as a whole, is seeing allowed 600-odd places where liquor will be served over the bar.

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
