CIO Wins Bargaining Right At Winchester

PORTLAND, Ore. — The CIO International Woodworkers will be bargaining representatives for the employees at the Evans Products Company's Winchester plywood plant, the National Labor Relations Board office here reported Tuesday.

The IWA got 90 votes in an April 2 election, the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers got 36 votes and 3 votes were cast for no union. Eight eligible voters did not cast ballots.

Anti-Mosquito Plan Discussed At Myrtle Creek

The Myrtle Creek City Council Tuesday night made plans to participate in the county-wide mosquito control program, and may expend \$300 as its part in the control.

County Sanitarian LaVerne Miller outlined the program for the benefit of the Council.

The Council also passed on the last reading of the city's sidewalk ordinance, authorizing construction of sidewalks through several areas of the city.

Final engineer's estimates on the blacktop surfacing of Division Street were accepted by the Council. The job will cost the city in the neighborhood of \$6000, and provide a surface to the street beyond the school.

An application for a liquor by the drink license was approved for the Loggers' Cafe. It was the second submitted, Chap's Cafe previously having made application.

The city will be allowed one liquor by the drink establishment by the Oregon Liquor Control Commission.

Aboard the plane were Forrest A. Wright, his sister, Mrs. Roy Wilhelm, and her two children, Leonard, 2, and Katharine, seven weeks. All are from Kalispell, Mont.

State police were reported to be making a ground check of a report from the Lapine district south of Bend that a plane had been heard Saturday morning. Aerial search from Medford was reported hampered by low-hanging clouds.

Reds Ready To Return 600 Allied Prisoners

U. N. and Korean prisoners the Reds have said they hold. Both sides named lower-level staff officers to work out administrative details of the exchange. The U. N. Command appointed Col. William B. Carlock of Galveston, Tex.; Air Force Col. Douglas Cairns of Riverside, Calif.; and South Korean Col. Lee Soo Yung. The Communists named North Korean Col. Lee Pyong Il and Chinese Col. Wang Ching.

Session Starts

The staff officers went into session immediately after the liaison groups adjourned for the day.

Daniel asked the Communists for a complete revised text of the whole draft agreement on transfer of sick and wounded so the U. N. Command could consider any changes "in one package and arrive speedily to the items which are controversial." The Communists have agreed to the main points of Daniel's plan, and said they will submit their versions of the rest.

The Allied protest on the Communist offer was the stiffest statement yet made in the three-day-old conference. It was the first note of discord in the otherwise smooth negotiations which Tuesday resulted in agreement in principle to exchange disabled POWs.

Future Controversial

North Korean Maj. Gen. Lee Sang Cho told Daniel, "We have offered the figures of sick and injured prisoners of war only after we have checked the matter in detail. Accordingly, I cannot find any reason why the figures are incredibly small."

Daniel told newsmen the figure is "controversial."

"It depends on what category you put them in," he said. "In other words, how sick is a man?"

Of the 600 ailing prisoners the Communists offered to return, 450 would be South Koreans. The rest would be Americans, British, French, or other U. N. soldiers.

Architect Claims Taxpayers Getting More For Money

Taxpayers are getting more for their money than they were 20 years ago in the construction of new schools, Architect Sid Hayslip told the Roseburg Kiwanis Club Tuesday noon at the weekly luncheon at the Hotel Umpqua.

Hayslip said that school construction is twice as good as it was two decades ago. During that time building materials prices have gone up three times what they were in 1933. School construction cost an average of \$4 a square foot then, and are \$9 to \$11 a square foot now.

Hayslip reviewed the Roseburg school building program started in 1947, and said that since 1950, the local program has developed in speed and smoothness unmatched elsewhere in Oregon and Southwestern Washington.

About \$1,900,000 has been spent for new schools in School District No. 4 since 1947.

Hayslip is a partner in the firm of Freeman, Hayslip and Tuft, Portland, which has designed Roseburg schools and also many other schools in Douglas County since the war. The firm, he said, can be considered local, since it maintains an office in Roseburg.
