William Adelbert Morian, 67, retired Southern Pacific Railway conductor, and life-long resident of this community, died at his home Saturday following a prolonged illness.

He was born at Oakland May 5, 1885, the son of Alexander and Mattie Dodge Morian, Douglas County pioneers. He was married at Portland, May 17, 1917, to Alyda George. Morian was employed by the Southern Pacific Company for about 38 years before retiring as a conductor in 1948.

Oh yes, don't forget to station the state treasurer behind the pitcher to keep an eye on all proceedings and be sure everything is on the up and up.

"Play ball!" stirred an assortment of feelings in the hearts of the rather scattered spectators at Waters Field in Salem, Thursday. There was some good-natured jibing at the heterogeneous uniforms hastily gathered together and largely held together with safety pins, etc. Nothing added such a professional touch to a fairly decent uniform as to have it completed with a pair of dress shoes and short silk socks.
