2 Big League Teams Begin Action Today

NEW YORK (AP) — Washington and Cincinnati, noted for their early starts and lagging finishes, beat the gun again today as they inaugurate another major league season.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rain forced postponement Monday of a Washington-New York game which was to have opened the American League baseball season.

season that promises to provide special interest for the nation's baseball fans.

The World Champion New York Yankees and Defending National League Champion Brooklyn Dodgers, the choice of the experts and betting commissioners alike, ruled heavy favorites to repeat. Cleveland and Chicago in the American, and New York, Philadelphia and St. Louis in the National, were given outside chances to pull upsets.

Changes Noted
Although the Yankees and Dodgers will have little or no change in their lineups, teams in general have undergone tremendous re-vamping with only 44 per cent of last year's starting lineups back. The batting orders present 22 freshman faces, excluding the pitchers.

In today's only American League game, Washington was scheduled to engage the Yankees at the nation's capital, where Vice President Nixon subs for President Eisenhower in throwing out the first ball.

A capacity crowd of some 30,000 was scheduled for Cincinnati's Crosley Field to welcome the Milwaukee Braves back into the big leagues. Milwaukee, in an astonishing franchise shift from Boston, returns after an absence of 50 years. It was a member of the American League in 1901 only to relinquish its franchise to the St. Louis Browns the following year.

Surkint Starts
Manager Charley Grimm of the Braves planned to pitch right-hander Max Surkint 12-13 against Cincinnati while Rogers Hornsby of the Redjacks opened on Clarence Bud Podbielniak 5-5. Each pitcher saved his star outpour for tomorrow's games. Hornsby wants Kenney Ruffenberger 17-18 to oppose his Chicago Cub cousins and Grimm held out Warren Spahn 14-19 for the predominantly left-handed hitting St. Louis Cardinals in Milwaukee's first home game tomorrow.

All teams swing into action tomorrow when eight games are expected to attract some 231,000 spectators, and bring the total attendance up to 201,000 for the 10 openers. The record opening day attendance was set in the lush 1948 days when 331,783 watched 10 inaugurations. Last year, eight openers drew 172,322 fans.

Pirates, Sox Baa 'Pennant' In Grapefruit

NEW YORK (AP) — It will be the Pittsburgh Pirates and the Chicago White Sox in the 1953 World Series — if the final standings of the Grapefruit League can be used as an indicator.

Come what may in October Pittsburgh can claim the title as the winningest major club in pre-season competition with 12 victories in 19 starts for a .632 percentage. Chicago was close behind at .611 on a 22-14 record against all opponents.

There's a catch, of course. The lowly Cubs, who wound up 5 1/2 games behind the champion Brooklyn Dodgers in the National League cellar last year, played only five games against major league teams during the exhibition tour for a 3-2 record. The Pirates' final effort was an 8-5 victory over the Washington Senators in Pittsburgh Sunday.

The White Sox considered a definite American League pennant contender, finished brushing up for the eagerly-awaited campaign with their ninth consecutive win and second in a row over the cross-town Cubs, 4-3.

Ben Hogan Hopes To Win Masters Again Next Year

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — When Ben Hogan, the little perfectionist from Texas, stepped up to accept the \$4,000 check for his record-shattering victory in the 17th Masters Golf Tournament, he said he hoped to return next year and shoot the same caliber of golf.

Byron Nelson, a fellow Texan who has acted as host player since Bob Jones retired, replied: "If Ben Hogan comes back and shoots the same caliber of golf he shot this year, he'll be out there playing all by himself."

After the way the "retired" Hogan tamed the tough, 6,900-yard Augusta National Club course, his tournament mates probably wish he'd waited until today and played with President Eisenhower during his golfing vacation instead of beating them out of the biggest chunk of prize money.

The 40-year-old 1951 Masters champion made the beautiful, spacious course look easy with his almost faultless performance. His iron shots and putting were particularly effective.

Not only did he slice 14 strokes off par but he also bettered the previous tournament record by five strokes. And his 70-69-66-69-274 was the third time in Masters history that anyone has managed four sub-par rounds. Par is 36-36-72.

Ed Porky Oliver of Palm Springs, Calif., shot a 70 yesterday to match the old record of 279 and finish second.

Oliver pocketed \$2,500 and Mangrum \$1,700 when prize money in the \$10,000 tournament was doled out the way down the line. The total was approximately \$26,000 when you count the \$200 grant to every pro who finished out of the top 24 "money" places.

Bob Hamilton of Evansville, Ind., was fourth with 283, good for \$1,400. Chick Harbert of Detroit and Tommy Bolt of Maplewood, N. J., tied for fifth with 285, \$900 each, and Ted Kroll of Hartford, N. Y., had 286 for seventh and \$700. Harvie Ward Jr. of Atlanta and Frank Stranahan of Toledo tied for low amateur honors with 291s.

Defending Champion Sam Snead of White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., had a 292 total and a tie for 16th.

Boxing Crowns Taken By Idaho State Sluggers

POCATELLO, Idaho (AP) — Idaho State College boxers slugged their way to three individual titles Saturday night as the Bengals won the National Intercollegiate boxing championship.

The three wins in the final round gave the host Idaho State team 25 points. Defending champion Wisconsin claimed two titles and second place with 19 points. Louisiana State was third with 16.

Michigan State, North Carolina A&T and San Jose State each notched 10 points. Other team scores: Penn State 8; Washington State 5; California, South Carolina and Virginia, 4 each; Maryland 3, and California Poly, Idaho, Minnesota and Syracuse, 1 each.

Idaho State's crowns were won by Olympic boxer Ellsworth (Spider) Webb, 156 pounds; Vic Kobe, 119 pounds, and Paddy Garver, 132 pounds.

Ray Zale, 176 - pounder, and Pat Sreenan, 147 - pounder, won Championships for Wisconsin.

Zale was awarded the John S. Larowe Trophy which goes annually to the boxer whose "Sportsmanship, skill and conduct perpetuates the finest attribute in college boxing."

Zale is a nephew of Tony Zale, the former world middleweight champion. Both live in Gary, Ind.
