The three arraigned were Charles William Clemmer, 22, of Central Point; Henry Eugene Seelen, 25, Salem; and Edward E. Smithers, 23, Coos Bay.

The cases are expected to be carried to the U. S. Supreme Court.

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Clear, Cool Weather Prevails Over East

Clear and cool weather prevailed over wide areas in the eastern half of the country Wednesday but rain continued along the eastern coast and in New England.

Temperatures dropped into the 20s and 30s over most of the Great Lakes region, but some warming was on the way.

It was warmer in the Rocky Mountain region and far Southwest. Southern California's early October heat wave appeared breaking with cooler weather forecast.

Temperatures, however, hit record highs for the date again Tuesday in many cities, including 96 at Los Angeles 101 in North Hollywood and 104 in Glendale.

One of the lowest readings Wednesday morning was 23 in Houghton, Mich., while in contrast Yuma, Ariz., reported 87.

Old Wagon Road Being Improved

The cutting down of a steep, narrow grade on the Coos Bay Wagon Road this side of the Coos County line may open up a new timber area to Roseburg mills.

The Douglas County Court Tuesday revealed that it has hired the Stanley Bros. Logging Co. to start work on the road for about 1 1/2 miles inside Douglas County.

The road improvement also may bring more trade into this area from residents of Brewster Valley.

The road now is steep, narrow and crooked, the court said, but when finished will be good enough for passenger cars. Work being done on Coos County on the road will permit a gravel road between the Coos Bay area and Roseburg.

Site of the project is only 10 miles west of Tenmile.

Price Of Plywood Takes Another Drop In State

PORTLAND (AP)—The price of plywood has dropped again, the second cut in a month putting it close to the post-war low established three years ago, the Oregon Journal said Tuesday.

U. S. Plywood in notices to the trade listed the price of quarter-inch Douglas fir good one side, at \$76 a thousand square feet, at the mill, the newspaper said. This is \$4 less than the price set a month ago and \$14 less than the price current since last winter. It is \$1 above the post-war low.

Cascade Plywood, was quoted as confirming the drop.

However, other plywood firms here would not say, for publication, that the market was slipping. The Journal said that most of them have given a second 5 per cent discount to jobbers instead of revising the price list.

His body was found in the woods 18 miles southeast of Klamath Falls where he had been hunting. The widow and two children survive.

Television Seen, But Still Far From Use Here

Reports of reception of Portland's new KOIN-TV in Roseburg were increasing, but it was apparently still a long hurdle from commercial use of television.

The patterns were clearer in some parts of the city, according to reports. Both Kluger Radio and Kent Radio shops reported reception Tuesday on the present five kilowatt power from Portland.

But the best reception was reported from the home of Mrs. Lucie Harris at the end of Calkins Road.

Using an eight element Yagi antenna, the impression on the screen was clear enough to take a picture with a camera. The impression was best with two boosters, Mrs. Robert Kent, who took the picture, reported the reproductions were "almost perfect."

In town, noise interfered with reception.

Radio Repairman Edward Peterson of Kluger Radio reported that the Portland station would boost its power to 35 kilowatts near the middle of the month and reception would probably be better. Eventually, the power is expected to be boosted to 100 kilowatts.

Donald L. Addis Hurt On Job At New School

Donald LeRoy Addis, 18, of P. O. Box 567, Riddle, is in Forest Glen Hospital in Canyonville today after another close brush with death at the new Douglas High School construction.

The Harris Plumbing Co. employs, who injured early Tuesday afternoon when he plunged 20 feet to the basement floor and barely missed being crushed under a 200-pound valve. According to Dr. Frederick Bracker of the Winston Emergency Hospital, Addis stepped on a scaffolding holding the valve which was ready to be installed on a boiler. The added weight when Addis walked on the scaffolding was apparently too much and it broke. The boiler valve just missed Addis directly, but apparently hit him a glancing blow.

He suffered a broken finger and severe lacerations of the leg, Dr. Bracker reports. A report from the Forest Glen Hospital states his condition as all right today.

It was the second scrape with death for Addis. He was in the excavation with Paul Caskey when the latter was killed in a cave-in in August. Addis ran when the shoring in the excavation broke. He escaped, but Caskey was buried.

Log Shortage, Hunting Season Causes Clousures

CORVALLIS (AP)—Some Lane County mills shut down late last week for deer hunting. Others did it because they were short of logs.

The Oregon State College review of the farm forest products market said that Tuesday, and added that prices were steady, demand ranged from fair to good, but the supply was light.

The price at Willamette Valley mills for No. 2 second growth Douglas fir sawlogs was mostly \$34 to \$36 a thousand with the outside limits \$32 to \$38.

In the Roseburg area, second growth logs over 24 feet were camp-run priced at \$24 to \$30 a thousand. Short lengths were \$2 less.

On the Portland market, maple burls of quality were in demand with the delivered price 5 cents a pound.

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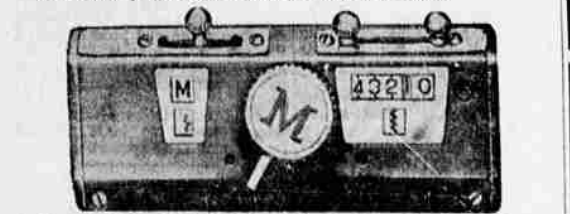
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
