Ike's Birthday Celebration Set For Hershey, Pa.

HERSHEY, Pa. (AP)—Pennsylvania Dutch farmers rubbed elbows with governors and cabinet officers in a gay circuslike atmosphere today as thousands of Republicans poured into this central Pennsylvania "chocolate town" for a unique celebration of President Eisenhower's 63rd birthday.

Nearly 30,000 were expected to be on hand to greet the President and the first lady for their scheduled arrival late in the afternoon.

More than 6,000 paid \$100 a plate for a roast beef buffet supper to be served in the "big top," a mammoth tent borrowed from Ringling Brothers-Barnum and Bailey Circus.

The rest of the crowd brought picnics.

Mr. and Mrs. Eisenhower will go first to the Hershey Stadium to partake of their own box lunches with the throng. Then they will move over to the colorfully decorated tent 100 yards away to have coffee with the butler diners.

Tonight, in the 6,400-seat indoor sports arena, the Eisenhowers will join in "a real old-fashioned birthday party." The program includes such parlor games as "pin the tail on the donkey."

A huge five-tiered platform, designed to resemble a birthday cake was erected in the center of the "big top." It was loaded today with more than four tons of Pennsylvania fruits and vegetables.

In the arena, handclappers, Fred Waring ran through a last-minute rehearsal of a gigantic pageant to be presented in honor of the President. Hundreds of high school and college students donned costumes of pilgrims, colonial pioneers and pilgrims for the show.

Dozens of professional showmen and sports stars will provide the entertainment.

Kidnapers Returned To Kansas City

Pair Is Kept Under Guard For Journey

KANSAS CITY (AP)—The confessed kidnapers of Bobby Greenlease today were returned under heavy guard to Kansas City, where the abduction of the 6-year-old boy took place just 15 days ago.

Drug addict Carl Austin Hall and his woman friend, Mrs. Bonnie Greenlease, were brought here from St. Louis. They had been held in St. Louis since their arrest a week ago.

The pair's departure from St. Louis was kept secret. They were brought here by automobile in custody of U. S. Marshal Omar Schnatmeier. Both were manacled.

Officers who made the trip here with them said Hall still insisted he doesn't know what happened to the missing \$300,000 of the \$600,000 ransom paid.

They quoted him as saying he hoped the Greenlease family "gets back all the money."

Hall admitted yesterday he fired a pistol bullet into the boy's head after driving him across the Missouri-Kansas state line from Kansas City shortly after the kidnapping.

The government filed charges here under the Lindbergh kidnaping law immediately after the couple signed confessions. A federal grand jury will be convened to hear the evidence.

The admissions cleared the missing Thomas John Marsh, 37, ex-convict named earlier by Hall as Bobby's killer.

The FBI said Hall and his woman friend admitted they dug Bobby's shallow grave behind Mrs. Heady's St. Joseph, Mo., home before the kidnapping.

More than \$200,000 of the ransom money, in \$10 and \$20 bills, was in the apartment-house room where Hall was seized. Hall claims he doesn't know what happened to the rest of the \$600,000 ransom.

Bobby's station wagon after the couple had driven him to a point near U. S. Highway 49 in Kansas 12 miles from Kansas City.

A bullet found lodged in the bullet-stained car was shown by ballistic tests to have been fired from a .38-caliber revolver taken from Hall upon his arrest here.

One of the deputy marshals who guarded Hall on the trip and who refused to permit use of his name, said the balding ex-convict expressed belief that Mrs. Heady had disposed of the missing \$300,000 of the record \$600,000 ransom paid by multimillionaire Robert C. Greenlease to the abductors of his son.

The officer said Hall expressed a desire to plead guilty to the federal kidnap charge filed against him and seemed to be resigned to his fate.

BPR Advertises Bids For Another Smith River Job

Another 17.7 miles of road construction on the Smith River access road is to be advertised for bids, according to the Bureau of Public Roads, Portland.

A preliminary notice to prospective bidders has been issued by BPR, which has not set date of bid opening.

The project will be the sixth in the area under construction by BPR, for the Bureau of Land Management to provide access to heavy beetle infestations of timber in the heretofore inaccessible reaches of the area.

Three projects, two on the main Smith River and another on the west fork, are under construction, and two others have been advertised.

The newest project will begin about 35 miles east of Gardiner at the junction of Twin Sisters Creek and the main fork of Smith River. One branch of the road will extend five miles up North Sister Creek, while the other will reach up South Sister Creek for 12.7 miles.

Two bridges on South Sister Creek are to be constructed under a separate contract.

Advance notice of the construction was made so that prospective bidders might inspect site of the project before wet weather comes. Transportation may be arranged by contacting the BPR regional office, Portland, beginning Oct. 19.

Group Is Named To Make Study Of Parking Plan

As the result of a recent Roseburg businessmen's meeting called by Mayor Percy Croft, the Chamber of Commerce has taken an initial step toward solving the parking problem.

The businessmen formed the problem of cluttered Roseburg parking facilities to the Chamber at the meeting. A Chamber committee was appointed at the request of the City Planning Committee with Dr. E. H. Stewart as chairman.

Members of the committee are: Emil Ramberg, Gordon Smith, Alan Knudsen, Chester Thompson, Rudy Ritzman, Charles Clark, Ken Bushey and Gordon Carlson.

Chamber President Don Metzger has urged immediate organization of the committee with special assignments to committee members.

George Luoma, head of the City Council's Offstreet Parking Committee, will work with the Chamber committee in an advisory capacity.

Metzger outlined the duties of the committee as follows: (1) To make further studies, (2) to coordinate studies and recommendations prior to creation of this committee, (3) to make other recommendations toward solution of the problem, (4) to cooperate in making effective such programs as may be approved by all concerned.

British Troops Raid Leftist's Headquarters

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana (AP)—British troops and police raided the headquarters of the leftist Peoples Progressive Party and homes of its leaders Tuesday as a strike spread through this British colony's major sugar industry.

The raiders apparently sought documents to support Britain's charges that the PPP had been plotting to set up a Communist state in British Guiana.

There was no immediate indication that the government planned to arrest the PPP leader, ex-Premier Cheddi Jagan, and five other cabinet ministers fired with him last week in the British crackdown.

Jagan said on the telephone from his home: "They're here now, I supposed they are still looking for that plot."

Jagan and the PPP have denied the charges and called the strike against what they called an "invasion by foreign troops. Though the without increased in the sugar industry Tuesday, there were no signs of any strikes in other fields.

In addition to Jagan's home, those of his brother Sirpaal and of Rory Westman, described by the British as a ringleader in the alleged Red plot, were among those raided.

Troops mounted machineguns in trucks blocking off some streets, including those leading to the party headquarters.

Observers figured the PPP-called strike would halt at least 50 per cent of British Guiana's sugar industry in a few days. It got off to a slow start Monday because of the Pan-American Day holiday.

High Bids Taken In Timber Sale

The Vern Johnston Log Co., Medford, won nearly \$40,000 over the appraised price Monday when it purchased 9,800,000 board feet of timber from the Umpqua National Forest in a timber sale at the Postoffice Building.

The firm paid \$171,967.50 for the timber, which was appraised at \$132,600. The tract is located about 15 miles south of Tiller.

Purchase price included \$19.50 a thousand for Douglas fir, \$33.00 for sugar pine and \$2.55 for white fir and other species.

Four other firms also entered bids at the auction. They were Fir Manufacturing Co., Myrtle Creek; Veneer Products Co., Medford; Dollar and Patterson Co., Inc., Glendale; and Harbor Plywood Corp. of Oregon, Riddle.

Weather Bureau Says More Rain For Week
More rain through the remainder of the week is seen by the U. S. Weather Bureau, which released its five-day weather outlook Tuesday morning.

The outlook is for recurring rains, with the precipitation totaling between one-fourth and three-fourths of an inch.

Laurence Wright Is New Deputy At Canyonville

Laurence M. Wright, 49, has been named resident deputy sheriff at Canyonville replacing Paris Williams, Sheriff Cal Baird reports.

Williams has resigned, effective Oct. 15, because of illness in his family. The Williamses plan to move to Utah. Williams has been deputy at Canyonville about two months.

Sheriff Baird lauded Williams for doing a fine job, even for a short time, and expressed regret at his leaving.

Baird pointed out, however, that the replacement is well-qualified for the post. Wright, an Oregon resident for 25 years, has spent 16 years in law enforcement work. He was a deputy sheriff in Marion County for 10 years, two of which were as chief criminal deputy. He has put in six years as a city police officer, and was formerly chief at Stayton.

Wright is married and has two children. He is presently seeking a residence in the Canyonville area.

Four Teenagers Fined; 2 Sought

Four teenagers, charged with illegal possession of liquor, Monday were released from the county jail after they had paid fines meted out by District Judge A. J. Geddes.

Roger Gordon Eckle, Roseburg, and Dennis Russell Harris, 19, Winston, have been cited into court, but warrants were issued when they failed to appear.

State police report they made the arrest while the sextet was parked in a car at an auto court in Winston Saturday night.

Reds Are Ready To Begin Talks With Prisoners

PANMUNJOM (AP)—The Korean repatriation commission today asked the U.N. Command and the Communists to start Thursday in their attempts to persuade war prisoners to return home.

The commission request came shortly after the UNO announced it would complete by midnight tonight a permanent center for the Reds to use in interviewing 22,300 North Korean and Chinese POWs.

There was no immediate answer either from the Reds or the Allied command.

The Allied announcement opened the way for the long delayed and potentially explosive explanations to start rolling.

The Reds had steadfastly refused to meet with the POWs until the UNO completed new facilities. The explanations originally were scheduled to begin Sept. 26 but both sides rejected existing sites as inadequate.

The Communists, who want to interview the 7,800 Koreans and 14,500 Chinese POWs individually, presumably will begin the explanations by Thursday.

The UNO, however, has said it was in no hurry to start meetings with the 23 Americans, 1 Briton and 335 South Koreans who have refused repatriation.

The UNO announcement that the Red "explanation" center would be completed so quickly came as a surprise. Only 24 hours earlier the Allied command had set a target date of Oct. 21 for completing the 32 explanation booths the Communists demanded.

The brief Allied announcement said the UNO did not disclose the center was so near completion because "there was no way of determining what difficulties might be encountered in the construction work."

Sheriff's Posse Reorganization Planned At Meet

Plans to reorganize the Douglas County Sheriff's Posse are under way, and a meeting will be held in the near future to work out a new constitution and by-laws, according to Sheriff Calvin Baird.

The sheriff said he has received a letter from officers and directors of the organization requesting reorganization. The letter claims there has been a loss of interest in the posse in recent months and that action to counteract it is necessary.

Baird, with the assistance of the posse, will work toward reorganizing the group to maintain its record of service to the community, the sheriff said.

"Continued fine service" by the group will be assured, the sheriff claimed, and the group will continue to stage the annual rodeo here. After reorganization, Baird said, an attempt will be made to put the posse to more active use in service to the county.

Thomson To Stand Trial For Attempted Murder

TOLEDO, Ore. (AP)—Richard Thomson, 25, accused of attempting to kill his business partner, is to be tried here Nov. 3 before Circuit Judge Fred McHenry of Corvallis.

Thomson earlier admitted he knocked out James Mueller just before their car veered over an ocean side cliff. Both men were thrown out of the car.

Later he repudiated the statement and changed his plea to innocent.

Mueller, who was hospitalized after the wreck, has recovered.

Active Club To Sell Beef As PAL Club Aid

Soviets Say Peace Treaty Is Violated

U. S. Gives No Hint Of Backing Down; Trieste Remains Quiet

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)—A tense and angry Yugoslavia today awaited Western reaction to President Tito's threat and notes designed to halt the transfer of northern Trieste to Italy.

Washington, at least, so far, showed no signs of backing down from the British-American decision to pull out of Zone A of the strategic territory.

The Russians put in their card last night, on the heels of Tito's bid for direct talks with the Western Powers over the explosive issue and his complaint to the United Nations that the Anglo-American plans are a threat to peace.

In identical notes to Britain and the United States, the Kremlin declared the plan to give Italy the S. S. Information Service Directorate port of Trieste "a grave violation" of the Italian Peace Treaty.

Although announcement of the British-American decision brought angry demonstrations in Yugoslavia, including the slugging of the U. S. Information Service Director in Belgrade yesterday, Trieste itself remained calm.

One fracas, however, was reported from the city of Gorizia, on the Italian-Yugoslav border north of Trieste. Italian frontier guards there said a crowd of Yugoslav youths had them Monday. No injuries were reported.

The predominantly Italian population of Zone A was obviously worried, however, over Tito's (Continued on Page Two)

Dulles To Meet With British, French Ministers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles will meet with the British and French foreign ministers in London Friday for conferences on Trieste, Korea, Russian relations and other world problems.

A joint announcement of arrangements for the conference was made Tuesday in Washington, London, and Paris.

Dulles will leave here Wednesday night. Two advisers, Douglas MacArthur III, State Department counselor, and Robert Bowie, chief of department policy planning, will accompany him.

Dulles expects to remain in London until Sunday.

State Department officials said this was not an emergency session, and that there was no one overriding problem which made it necessary.

The official announcement said: "This meeting is in keeping with the practice of the three ministers to consult together at frequent intervals in one of the three capitals."

There was a session in Washington last July, attended by French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault and the acting British Foreign secretary, Lord Salisbury.

The timing of the new meeting was explained by State Department officials in terms of British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden's return to his post after a long illness.

Heart Seizure Takes Life Of Canyonville Man
BURNS (AP)—A heart seizure claimed another deer hunter's life Monday. Henry H. Graham, 65, of Canyonville, collapsed just after leaving camp in the morning to hunt in the upper Silver Creek Valley, 30 miles northwest of Burns.

A companion, Orville McGee, also of Canyonville, notified Coroner Harold Olson, Canyonville, after leaving camp in the morning to hunt in the upper Silver Creek Valley, 30 miles northwest of Burns.

He was the tenth Oregon hunter to die of a heart attack this season. Henry Harrison Graham was born at Days Creek on May 25, 1888. He was a veteran of World War I.

He was at a hunting camp with Orville McGee of Canyonville in Upper Silver Creek Valley about 50 miles northwest of Burns when he was stricken about 6 a.m. Monday.

Survivors include a brother, Herbert Graham, 825 Hoover St., Roseburg, and a sister, Mrs. Victor Shew of Medford, formerly of Canyonville. He was a member of the IOOF.

Funeral services will be held at Gen. Mortuary, Myrtle Creek, and burial at Canyonville. Times will be announced later.
