Salvation Army Kicks Out Couple For Kissing Act

DENVER (AP) — A former state welterweight boxing champion was counted out by the Salvation Army Monday.

Maj. Frank Capon permanently suspended Eddie Anderson and Jane Weathers after the betrothed pair exchanged a kiss at work. Anderson, who held the Colorado welterweight title from 1931 to 1935, was employed at the Salvation Army's 23rd street store. Miss Weathers has worked for the Salvation Army "off and on since 1925."

"I just walked in this morning and gave her a little kiss," Anderson explained. "I was fired at noon." "He just walked in and gave me a little kiss," Miss Weathers explained. "The major asked me why. I was fired at 5 p.m."

"I don't think it's necessary to go into this," the major said.

Watchmen Were Needed To Watch Watchmen

HONG KONG (AP) — Maybe they should have had watchmen to watch the watchmen who were watching the watchmen.

The British Army hired Chinese guards to watch over some tarpaulins in a compound. It then assigned two privates — John Henderson, 20, of North Ireland, and Peter Downs, 19, of Glasgow, Scotland — to watch the watchmen. The privates sent the Chinese off on a fake errand. When the Chinese returned, 27 tarpaulins were gone. One of the Chinese spotted a truck leaving the compound. Tracing of the truck led to the conviction of the two privates in court Tuesday. They were sentenced to six months at hard labor.

Portland Council To Ban Parking During Rush

Portland (AP) — The Portland City Council Monday decided to ban parking on five downtown streets during evening rush hours. Expected to go in effect early next month, the ordinance will forbid parking on key streets between 4 p. m. and 6 p. m.

The council also decided not to hold a special election in December on civic improvement issues. Instead, measures authorizing an \$8 million dollar sports center, an 18 million dollar dock improvement program and a \$3,800,000 zoo are to appear on a special ballot at the May 21 primary election next year.

Better Business Relations Conference Is Begun

GEARHART, Ore. (AP) — A three-day Better Business Relations Conference sponsored by the Western division of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce opened here Monday. Some 90 delegates from Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho and Utah were told that business should "humanize all its activities." Paul H. Good of Washington, D. C., manager of the chamber's education department, also said that employees are more interested in opportunity advance, in security, in recognition of worth of a job, and in a feeling of participation in the business, than in high wages. The conference will end Wednesday.

BERLIN (AP) — The East German interior ministry announced Tuesday that 5,374 German war prisoners held for minor war crimes, including 11 generals, have been released by the Russians between Sept. 25 and Oct. 8.

Coast Guard Entrance Examinations Feb. 23

The entrance examinations for the U. S. Coast Guard Academy have been scheduled for Feb. 23 and 24, 1954. Coast Guard headquarters announced today. All applications must be postmarked before Jan. 15. Eligibility is based on a competitive examination which will be conducted in 109 major cities. There are no Congressional appointments or geographical quotas. An applicant must be between the ages of 17 and 22, a high school senior or graduate with 15 units to his credit by June 30, 1954. The 15 units must include three in English, two in algebra and one each in plane geometry and physics.
