

Building Grid Machine Is Uphill Grind, Says George

Roseburg High School football Coach Bob George says there's no reason to "get panicky" over Roseburg's 55-5 loss Saturday night at Coos Bay. "We're going to do all right yet."

It will take time to build Roseburg as a football power, he reminded Chamber of Commerce forum listeners Monday noon. It can't be done "in a day or year," maybe not in two or three years.

Offering no alibi for his team's performance against the Marshfield Pirates, George enumerated to his audience some factors which he believes contributed to the defeat of the Indians.

Get 'Stadiumitis'
He said his boys did a good job and that the score does not indicate the true difference between the teams. But, Marshfield's power was too much. The Indian mentor said some of his charges got "stadiumitis" when facing the perennially powerful Pirates in their home lair.

The coach pointed out that Coos Bay has 23 returning lettermen. Roseburg has six. For the Pirate varsity, 78 turned out; for the junior varsity, 57 turned out. Roseburg, which has a bigger attendance body, has only 40 out for both units. "They're way ahead of us," George said. "We can't knock them over in one year."

Coach George pointed to indications that Roseburg's fate is on the way up, however. Three new grade school fields are under construction; the staff and personnel for coaching the teams are increased.

He told his listeners at the Hotel Uphill that Roseburg is "on the uphill grind, but it will take a little

while" to match the status of Coos Bay and Grants Pass.

Expressing appreciation for the good attitude the people of Roseburg have toward building a grid machine, George reminded that "everybody must help." The coaches, school administration and a few enthusiastic townspeople can't do it alone, he said.

Prior to his remarks about Saturday's contest, the coach showed movies of the Coquille-Roseburg clash, which Roseburg won, 19-14.

George was introduced by inimitable Al Fiegl, sparkplug of the Roseburg Quarterback Club, sponsor of the Chamber program. Fiegl revealed that next Friday morning's meeting of the club will probably be without the usual game movie because the Coos Bay school refused to allow picture taking by Roseburg. Obviously irritated by the action, Fiegl said the club is attempting to buy a copy of the film taken by Marshfield. Reason for the action in prohibiting movie-taking was not explained, Fiegl said.

The former mayor noted that the Quarterback Club has no membership dues, that anyone interested can attend the Friday morning sessions at the Hotel Umpqua. He said the booster organization was not founded for the purpose of telling the coach how others how to run the football program, but to create interest in Roseburg football.

Fiegl was introduced by Chamber President Don Metzger.

Irish Reserves Tip Hornets, 32-6

Riddle's six-man reserve team scored in every quarter of a game played Monday afternoon at Riddle to defeat the Camas Valley Hornets 32-6.

In the first period, Jim Endicott scored the first touchdown on a 3-yard plunge. Stan Dong passed 10 yards to Bob Harrell in the second period, and Endicott ran the conversion to put the Irish in front 13-0 at the half.

Endicott tallied again in the third period on an eight-yard end sweep to make it 19-0. Camas Valley made it a 19-6 ball game in the final period as Gary Spencer completed a 7-yard pass to Allen Parret. The Irish, however, scored twice more in the last quarter when Endicott completed a pass to Harrell which covered 20 yards, and Harrell ran the remaining 25 yards across; and on the last play of the game Long combined with Laverne Newcomb on 29 yard pass play to score. Dennis Vaughn ran the extra point after the fourth Irish score.

Suit Opens Wednesday To Stop St. Louis Move

ST. LOUIS — Trial of an injunction suit filed to keep the St. Louis Browns from moving to Baltimore will open Wednesday. Five of the seven minority stockholders withdrew as plaintiffs in the case Monday.

Jerome Duggan, attorney for the minority stockholders, filed the withdrawals with Circuit Judge William B. Flynn.

The American League has approved the transfer of the Browns to Baltimore, but the deal has not been formally completed.

The attorney for the club and Bill Veeck, former president of the Browns, has said the stockholders would be held responsible if their suit resulted in club bankruptcy and losses to Veeck and his associates.

Shoemaker Closes Gap On Riding Records

SALEM, N. H. — Jockey Tony DeSpirito's national record of 330 winners is doomed to be beaten by Willie Shoemaker. But he isn't letting that stop him from turning in his best riding of 1953. DeSpirito has won 11 of 18 starts in the last two racing days.

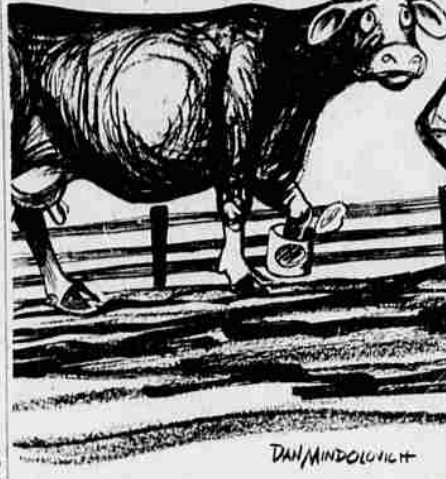

Big Chet Noe Goes Semi-Pro

SEATTLE — Chet Noe, star University of Oregon basketball center last season, and two former University of Washington standouts will join the independent Buchanan Bakers in the semipro Northwest League this winter, it was announced Monday.

Bill Morris, Washington freshman coach who also directs activities of the Bakers, said Noe and ex-Huskies Slippery Joe Cipriano and Chuck Koon will form the nucleus of the Bakers' squad. Morris said there also is the possibility that Mike McCatchen and Doug McClary, who had a big hand in Washington's drive to third place in the NCAA playoffs last spring, also will join the team.

The Bakers will compete in the Northwest League and also make an eastern tour in November and December. Two games are scheduled with the Phillips Bankers, one with the Denver Bankers and three with the Ada Oilers, another top Southwest independent. Games with the Ada Oilers will be played in Seattle, Bellingham and Wenatchee.

Baseball Sneaks Up On Toreadors

MADRID — Bullfighting here is not what it used to be. Soccer out-clashes it 4 to 1 in popularity. Even American baseball and basketball are catching up at last.

The bullfight arena has a job filling its 25,000 seats each Sunday during the March through October season. But 60,000 to 80,000 cheering fans show up every Sunday the Royal Madrid soccer teams play.

Hoop Game Draws
International basketball matches like the one a few months ago with Italy, drew nearly 20,000.

Baseball is not so far advanced to widespread popularity and understanding. But as many as 5,000 have shown up for recent games between Madrid and American service teams from Germany or Britain.

Ring Deserted
Desertion of the bullfight began during the ill-fated republic. The republic frowned on the spectacle. After the Civil War there was a magnificent matador, Manolete, killed in 1947. Then a revolution to blood sports was felt along with lack of spotlight toreadors or boxers, high prices and poor bulls. Most important, bullfighting is not a participation sport. Kids can't get much of a kick any more out of passing an imaginary bull with a flannel rag the way their fathers and grandfathers did. They're out now with a ball, any size, or even balled up paper if no ball is available, kicking it around at every opportunity.

Baseball is also modeled along American lines. There are 12 teams in the National League and seven regional leagues of about 50 teams plus numerous juvenile teams. Luis Barrios, czar of Spanish baseball, is concentrating on the youth for the future.

Now Barrios is forming a European League with British, French, Dutch, Belgian, German and Italian teams.

Archie Moore Must Battle

WASHINGTON — Archie Moore, the aging St. Louis veteran, was under instructions from the National Boxing Assn. today to defend his light-heavyweight championship within the next few months or lose it by default.

In its fall ratings issued last night, the NBA pointedly contended it was responsible for Moore's chance to win the championship in the first place. It said he should feel obligated to risk his title in a bout with Harold Johnson of Philadelphia, logical contender in that division.

Turner's Poor Showing Hurts

PHILADELPHIA — Because Gil Turner is losing his girlish figure, the 23-year-old fighter's aspirations to the welterweight crown of Kid Gavilan may be scrapped forever.

Still ranked as a leading contender for Gavilan's title, Turner nevertheless tipped the beam at 156 while plodding to a 10-round decision over Italo Scorticini at Detroit last Wednesday night. And he's doubtful whether he can ever make the 147-pound welterweight limit again.

"As we won't try to find out until it's necessary," said Manager George Katz yesterday. Katz, noting that Gil is working to make 155 pounds for his 10-rounder with Johnny Bernardo at the arena here Thursday night, said he doesn't expect another welterweight title shot before next summer anyway.

Minor Fouling Rule Shucked

ST. LOUIS — A decision by basketball officials to turn their backs on minor fouls yesterday was termed "the greatest shot in the arm intercollegiate basketball has received since the elimination of the center jump."

That was the way E. L. Romney, commissioner of the Mountain States Conference, felt about the officials' action at their annual two-day basketball clinic here. The National Association of Collegiate Commissioners approved the bypassing of "fringe fouls and borderline violations in the back court" that have little effect on the "continuity of play" during the 1953-54 season.

Baseball Monopoly Trial In Supreme Court Today

WASHINGTON — Organized baseball goes before the Supreme Court today in what is perhaps the most significant legal contest in the history of the national sport.

The court has been asked to decide whether baseball is an illegal monopoly in restraint of trade. If it decides that it is, the ruling could mean the end of big league baseball as it is now played.

But this is an extreme possibility. Even if the court were to rule against baseball, there are possible out, Congress, for instance, could pass a special law, or there might evolve a sort of gentlemen's agreement among baseball players.

Arguments on three appeals the high court agreed to hear was set down to begin late today, but it was possible that start of the three-hour argument would be deferred until tomorrow.

The question whether baseball violates the nation's anti-trust laws has been before the Supreme Court before. In 1922 the court decided that baseball wasn't a business, and that as a sport it was not subject to federal antitrust laws.

The three appeals now before the high court were filed by minor leaguers George Toole and Walter Kowalski and a minor league clubowner, Joe Corbett.

All three maintain that the 1922 decision no longer applies. They contend the game has been greatly changed since then by such developments as intricate farm systems and radio and television coverage.

In addition, the appeals maintain, baseball amounts to something resembling slavery since the players are tied to their club owners under the controversial reserve clause, which gives the owners absolute control over baseball activities of the players.

Replying to the suits, organized baseball said in its briefs that the antitrust charges are without basis, that the specific questions raised in the three actions have nothing to do with interstate commerce.

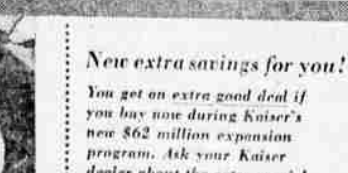
