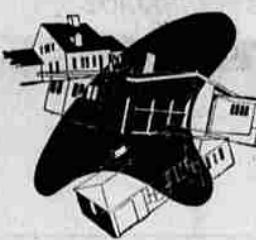
The ladies worked on a quilt during the afternoon. Articles for the box for the Children's Home were on display.
