### Guest-Day Tea Large Affair Of Thursday

A very lovely guest-day tea was given by the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the First Methodist Church in the social hall of the church Thursday. A study group meeting was held in the morning in charge of Mrs. J. M. Boyles. The afternoon's program was presented on the topic, "Feeding the Modern Multitudes. As a setting for the program, a spotlight was placed on a picture of Christ feeding the multitude and over the table holding a loaf of bread. Mrs. A. J. Geddes had charge of the devotions. A panel discussion on Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations was presented by Mrs. H. D. Scott, panel leader, Mrs. H. A. Canaday, Mrs. A. J. Ellison, Mrs. C. E. Brittain and Mrs. Bruce Melis. Mrs. Scott opened the panel with the statement of two purposes of discussion, "To show how the FAO of the United Nations will give us the opportunity for sharing acquired skills with others," and 2, "To show the value of many nations joining physical and mental resources in dedicated stewardship. She introduced Mrs. Canaday, who told of the organization of FAO in 1945 and stated that the head of the organization is a former Oregon farmer, N. E. Dodd. Her talk brought out the fact that hunger is the number one problem of the world and that more than a billion human beings awaken each day ill fed and hungry. Helping to grow and distribute food to nations of the world is the prime purpose of FAO. Mrs. Ellison told of FAO work in Afghanistan, where it is experimenting in the growing of cotton. Natives have no tools with which to work, but are learning how to improvise them. They are asking for tools and to be shown how to use them. Mrs. Melis explained the work of FAO in Ethiopia and how that country is conquering disease of cattle and livestock. A laboratory has been built, vaccine developed and people taught how to use it. Field workers have sometimes met with violence as natives are not used to new methods and are afraid of them. Mrs. Brittain surveyed the whole work of FAO on how it has held training schools and helped countries to solve their own problems. The organization has developed fishing in various countries, has given breakfasts to children of Greece and has brought countries together for cooperative action and study of food problems. FAO stands for "Let There Be Bread," and in the Far East for "Let There Be Rice." Mrs. Scott closed the panel discussion with the remark that "we cannot perform miracles as Jesus did, but we can at least lend a helping hand." Mrs. A. B. Taylor sang a solo, "Thanks Be To God," accompanied by Mrs. Ellison. The program was followed by a recognition service for new members Mrs. A. S. Feller, president, conducted the business session. A silver tea followed and the proceeds went to the Methodist Home in Salem. Circle No. 3 was in charge of the tea with Mrs. William Hoelt, Mrs. W. E. Buell, Mrs. D. A. Kier, Mrs. John Sinsley and Mrs. H. A. Martin on the committee. The tea table was beautifully appointed and was arranged by Mrs. George L. Singleton and Mrs. Harrie W. Booth.
