

3-Cent Postage Needed On Yule Message Cards

Christmas cards with written messages on them must carry three-cent postage, reported Acting Postmaster Clyde Carstens today.

Christmas cards not carrying a written message may be posted for two cents, if unsealed.

These statements were stressed today by Carstens after a word had been dropped from a News-Review story Saturday. The story reported cards with written messages could be posted for two cents. This is not true, Carstens said. With written messages, the cards must carry three-cent postage.

He again asked the careful preparation of packages and greeting cards to make delivery easier.

He advised the public to buy postage stamps for greeting cards well in advance of the Christmas rush period. He also asked persons mailing many cards to face the envelopes with stamps one way. It helps if the envelopes are tied in a package. The packages may be handed to the clerk at the postoffice window.

He also asked that careful attention be given to packing, wrapping and addressing parcels. He said that strong containers such as grocery cartons, should be used. Pack articles on all sides with excelsior or crumpled newspapers and use plenty of packing. Carstens said. He also advised wrapping packages with strong paper and cord.

He said if parcels are sealed, they must bear a notation allowing them to be opened for postal inspection. Small parcels containing watches or jewelry should be registered, he said.

muda determined to press for quick acceptance of Russia's bid for an East-West meeting in Berlin.

Churchill, Foreign Secretary Eden and their retinue of advisers will make the flight in the same Strato-Cruiser, Canopus, which last week carried Queen Elizabeth II across the Atlantic on the first leg of her Commonwealth tour.

French Premier Joseph Laniel and his party are scheduled to arrive on the Atlantic holiday island Thursday and President Eisenhower Friday.

Eden made it clear in the House of Commons Monday that in spite of American doubts of Soviet sincerity, Britain wants to get Big Four talks under way as soon as reasonably possible.

It was believed that Churchill and Eden would urge Laniel and Eisenhower to join in accepting Berlin as the site and proposing mid-January as the date.

Churchill is still thought to regard the proposed conference of Big Foreign Ministers as a possible prelude to his cherished hope of a face-to-face meeting of the top Big Three leaders with Soviet Premier George Malenkov.

the South Korean police had committed atrocities in their drive to round up Reds. He cited Western press accounts of the drive to press his point.

The Soviet bloc, counting on the neutral nations to stay out of the debate and abstain from voting, apparently is determined to fight tooth and nail the whole atrocity issue.

India already has serviced notice that as head of the Neutral Nations Repatriation Commission in Korea, she will neither speak nor vote. Other neutrals, especially members of the Arab-Asian bloc, also are expected to keep silent.

There was little evidence, however, that the Soviet bloc would receive any over support in the debate.

St. Louis Police Question Hall

ST. LOUIS (AP)—St. Louis police officials today began checking a signed death row statement by kidnaper Carl Austin Hall to see if any new leads could be found to the missing \$303,720 Greenleaf ransom money.

After Hall and his partner in crime, Bonnie Brown Heady, were quizzed for more than four hours in their state prison cells yesterday, St. Louis Circuit Atty. Edward L. Dowd said their statements might prove to be the basis for future prosecution in the case.

Dowd and Police Chief Jeremiah O'Connell conducted the questioning at Jefferson City with the permission of federal authorities.

"The interviews," Dowd said, "were well worth the time" and could be used if the state decides later someone should be prosecuted in the mystery of the missing money.

New Earthquake Strikes Greece; Buildings Fall

ATHENS, Greece (AP)—A new earthquake terrorized Greece last night, collapsing 90 houses and damaging 300 others in the south-central part of the country. Press accounts made no mention of casualties.

The quake also rocked the nation's west coast and was felt in the Ionian Islands, where thousands were killed or left homeless last summer by the worst such disaster in modern Greek history.

December 1952 Traffic Deaths Convey Warning

Sometime during the next two weeks, 20 people may die and 784 may be injured in Oregon. Some of the injured will recover; others will go through life crippled and scarred as the result of a few brief moments of inattention, discourtesy, impatience and other attitudes which lead to highway slaughter.

These unpleasant thoughts came from the Secretary of State's traffic safety division as it prepared to launch its usual pre-holiday safety warnings to pedestrians and drivers.

Last December, the division said, there were more than 8,000 traffic collisions in Oregon. Approximately 4,000 of these occurred in the first two weeks of the month. While most early December mishaps occurred in Oregon cities, rural roadways again proved most lethal with 13 deaths recorded outside incorporated areas as compared with seven on city streets. Safety men credited comparatively higher rates of speed in rural areas as making the difference between a fatal and a non-fatal smash-up.

Officials said their prediction that last December's highway carnage would be repeated this year would be proven wrong only "if the people decide they have had enough, and insist on same driving by themselves, their friends and associates."

"Reduction of traffic losses can be achieved only when every individual who drives or walks makes up his mind that safety begins with him," the division concluded.

Too-Slow Driver Menaces Traffic

Pleasure driving isn't pleasant when you hold up the normal flow of traffic by driving too slowly.

In fact it's unlawful. The Secretary of State's traffic safety division points out, Oregon motor vehicle law says it is a violation for "any person to drive at such a slow speed as to impede or block the normal and reasonable movement of traffic." Exceptions are trucks and trailers or other vehicles that cannot go any faster.

Safety men say the traffic poke makes for trouble by irritating following drivers into passing when there is not enough clearance to do so safely. Your clue that you may be out of bounds comes when you find yourself at the head of a long parade of traffic and the man behind is edging out to the centerline waiting for a chance to pass.

A savvy driver in such a 'spot' pulls off on the shoulder at the first opportunity to let the rest of the parade feed by, the office advised.

Hospitalization Program Revised

Veterans Administration has revised procedures for veterans seeking hospitalization for non-service-connected ailments, requiring a financial statement be filed with each application for hospital care.

The new plan, VA said, is designed to protect applicants and veterans generally from charges of "chiselings" on the Government by signing false statements of inability to defray the necessary expense of hospitalization or domiciliary care. It requires answers to five questions regarding the financial worth of applicants.

Questions to be answered are:

1. What is the current value of your property, both real and personal?
2. What is the current amount of your ready assets, in the form of cash, bank deposits, savings bonds, etc.?
3. If you own real property, what is the approximate amount of the unpaid mortgage or other indebtedness owed thereon?
4. What are your average monthly expenditures, including your mortgage payments and all other personal expenses including your expenses for dependents?
5. What was your average monthly income for the last six months from all sources?
