

# Beavers Grind Nebraska, 83-55, Schedule Indiana

Oregon State's rating as one of the nation's top basketball teams is at stake this week as Northern Division teams continue their tune up series preparatory to the opening of the Pacific Coast Conference season.

The Beavers, ranked No. 11 in the latest Associated Press poll, are booked for Monday-Tuesday meetings with top-rated Indiana, defending NCAA champion.

Easy winners over a strong Nebraska five in their fourth outing of the season Saturday night, the Beavers tackle the Hoosiers on a twin bill that also will bring together Oregon and Nebraska.

The intersectional meetings are slated at Corvallis Monday night and at Eugene Tuesday night. A crowd of 10,000 or more is expected for each of the double-headers.

The Indiana-OSC clash will feature two of the game's most publicized players—the Beavers 7-foot-3 inch center Wade (Swede) Balbrook, and Indiana's All American, 6-foot-10 Don Schlundt.

Halbrook, who broke most Oregon scoring records as a high school player, has averaged 26.7 points in the four games he has played at OSC this season. He dropped in 29 points in the Beavers' 83-55 win over Nebraska Saturday night.

Schlundt averaged 25.4 points a game as a sophomore at Indiana last season.

After the Indiana fracas, the Beavers will head east for Columbus, Ohio, and a scheduled game Saturday night with Ohio State. From there they will go to Raleigh, N. C., to play in the Dixie Classic

next Monday Tuesday and Wednesday.

Oregon, Washington and Idaho also will be on the road. Oregon plays UCLA at Los Angeles Saturday and Monday nights. Washington will compete in the Big Ten tourney at Kansas City next weekend, and Idaho goes to Missouri for games next Monday and Tuesday nights with Montana.

The Washington State Cougars, who dropped three straight on last week's trip to California, will be idle until Jan. 2 when they will be host to Eastern Washington College.

The California Bears made it two in a row over the Cougars with a 61-49 shellacking at Berkeley Saturday night. After a slow first half which ended with California leading 27-24, the Bears found the range and pulled easily away.

WSC's Ron Bennink took scoring honors with 24 points.

Washington lost its fourth game of the still young season, bowing 87-76 to Kansas State at Seattle. The Huskies, beaten 74-64 by the K-States Friday night, led through the first quarter Saturday night but faded in the second quarter and never again caught up with the rangy Wildcats.

Dean Parsons netted 28 points for the Huskies. Gene Stauffer led K-State scoring with 16.

Idaho came from behind to subdue Loyola of Los Angeles 74-48 at Moscow. The Vandals trailed by 12 points in the first quarter and were behind 30-26 at the intermission. They pulled even on Dwight Morrison's free throw early in the third quarter and ran wild in the final period, collecting 27 points to Loyola's 8.

# Cougars Seen As Certainty For Cellar Post

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — The Washington State Cougars are low on height, slow on speed and start Northern Division basketball as one of the most dead cinch also runs the league has seen since the war.

Coach Jack Friel may even have trouble improving much on the dismal 3-13 record of last year, but the season is likely to produce some kind of award for Ron Bennink, one of six returning lettermen.

Bennink, the handsome, crew cut 6-foot-1 junior from Lynden, shapes up as one of the best in the Pacific Coast Conference.

In the first five pre-season games, he held the team together and scored 120 points, almost as many as the 140 rung up by the next four Cougars combined.

Bennink played out front as a guard, as a sophomore but has been moved into the post now. He has learned to sink hook shots with either hand and has a nice jump shot. If they can get him the ball, the Cougars might be tough on occasions.

Any substantial help for Bennink inside will have to come from Howard McCants, the 6-8 senior football end who is by far the biggest man on the team.

McCants, who couldn't make his high school team back in River Rouge, Mich., has been coming along pretty well. He will have to improve his timing, though, to be tough on rebounds. He is good on defense but isn't much of a shot.

With McCants and Bennink in the post, the Cougars should have a non-scoring trio out front to be a title contender. They don't.

Capt. Bob Swanson, 6-3, Muelaps; Bob Klock, 6-1, Hoquiam; and Bill Rehder, 6-4, Livermore, Calif., maneuver the ball fairly well but aren't big scorers. They seem to lack the poise as well as the eye to hit regularly.

Swanson, one of only two seniors on the team, is a good floor leader, however, and might bring the squad along if he finds himself.

The crafty Friel, starting his 26th year here, will again use the

platoon system he introduced to basketball. His second unit, however may have to concentrate solely on ball control, keep the status quo until the regulars are rested. The reserves haven't been scoring and Friel said he may have to use them as a "possession platoon."

Al Perry, a 6-2 sophomore from Yakima, will be at center for the second five or take over on the first platoon if McCants doesn't pan out. Bert Underwood, 6-3 letterman from Davenport, is the third center.

Jim Bauer from Wapato, the speedster at 5-11, and 5-11 Jack Garton of Chelan will be the second platoon guards, with 6-2 Ron Aiken of Raymond and 6-2 Bob Lodge, Compton, Calif. Junior College transfer, the forwards.

Ron Foisy, 5-9, Seattle; Jerry Hanks, 5-10, Ellensburg; Bill Kiehn, 6-2, Pehastin; and Bob Morgan, 6-1, Clarkston, fill out the squad and are likely to wind up on either of the first two units before it's over.

WSC, fortunately, opens at home Jan. 8 against Washington, one team it might be able to beat. From there it looks like a long season. The spirit is high but the material is about as low as fifth place, no better than fourth.

**Red China Announces New Tibetan Government**  
TOKYO (AP) — Red China Sunday announced formation of a five-county "Tibetan autonomous government" in northwest China "under the leadership of the Communist party of China and the Peoples Government of a higher level."

Peiping Radio, as monitored here said the new government is in the Hainan region, of Chinghai Province, that most of the 100,000 inhabitants are herdsmen and 70 percent are Tibetan. The rest include Hans, Mongolians, Kazakhs and Salars. The region is just south of Chinghai Lake.

Peiping said a Tibetan, Tandoer, was elected chairman of the new

government, and that the delegates sent a pledge of loyalty to Red China's No. 1 man, chairman Mao Tse-Tung.
