To chronic intestinal indigestion, the food, after leaving the stomach two or three hours after the last meal, does not properly digest in the intestines. Instead, it begins to ferment and form gas. This distends the intestines and causes distress by pressure upon the neighboring parts.

This condition varies from a feeling of slight fullness and discomfort to intense pain in the pit of the stomach or elsewhere in the abdomen. It is relieved only by belching air from the stomach or passing it from the bowels. Palpitation and pain about the heart are also common symptoms. The pain is owing to pressure of the distended stomach, which interferes with the heart action.

In this condition the skin usually loses its clear appearance and takes on a dull color; eruptions are common. The whites of the eyes and inner surface of the eyelids often present a yellowish appearance, and the tongue often has a brownish coating, and is marked on the edges by imprints of the teeth.

Constipation is rather the rule, although diarrhea with mucus is also common; these conditions of



ten alternate. The toxins generated by the decomposition of food material in the bowels, escape from the system into the urine, and in so doing irritate the urinary organs. Frequent passage of urine often occurs. In their effect upon the nervous system, these toxins cause insomnia, depression, and symptoms of nervous prostration.

It is believed that chronic intestinal indigestion, with constant absorption of poisons from the decomposing contents of the bowels, leads to such irritation of the heart, kidneys and other organs that chronic diseases may result. Many "chronic invaders" or hypochondriacs are much by reason of this disorder.

Intestinal indigestion is to be distinguished from stomach indigestion by the fact that although pain may occur in the region of the stomach, it does not come on until some time after eating, and there are no stomach symptoms, such as nausea or vomiting. The general distention of the abdomen at wall, passage of intestinal gas, and slight yellow appearance of the eyes, are also characteristic of intestinal indigestion. (Pd. Adv.)

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Americans Bought Record Amount Of Food At Prices 2 Per Cent Below '52 Cost

NEW YORK — Americans bought a record amount of food in 1953 at prices about two per cent below those of the year before. The prospect is that they'll buy just as much in 1954 and pay about the same amount for it.

That's the word from government agencies and men in the food trade, taking stock as the new year arrives.

The Department of Agriculture food prices in 1954 will average close to the 1953 levels. It also sees food supplies about as large as in 1953.

Paul Willis, president of the Grocery Manufacturers of America Inc., estimates the total value of food consumption in 1953 at about 67 billion dollars, up from 64 billions in 1952.

"With a large 1953 harvest, good food supplies, a growing and prosperous population and much food industry research on new products," Willis adds, "this total should be maintained or exceeded in 1954."

Getting down to particulars, the Department of Agriculture makes these forecasts for 1954:

Beef — Consumer supplies of high quality beef will be smaller than in 1953, but total supplies of beef are expected to be almost as large as 1953's indicated record. Thus top quality cuts may be higher priced.

Lamb — There will be less lamb, both choice cuts and regular grade on the meat counters during the spring season. That means prices may go up if demand continues strong.

Pork — The 1954 spring pig crop is expected to be about five per cent larger than it was in 1953, but until mid-summer, supplies will be below the low level of 1953 and prices will be high. A decline is expected in autumn.

Eggs and Poultry — Productions of eggs and broilers may hit new highs in 1954. Egg prices should dip slightly while broilers are expected to stay close to the 1953 price level.

Vegetables — Demand and prices will stay about 1953 levels. Potato prices probably will continue depressed.

One of the notable price developments of 1953 was the prolonged slide in beef prices. Heavy production sent prices down in spring and early summer, and then a slow rise got under way. Meanwhile, D. C. after Congress adjourned, tried to dissuade Budget officials from this attitude, even passing up a trip to Africa with the Atomic Energy Committee in order to present a full case for his bill from the long legal history of the OGC lands.

But as Congress returns to convene in the 1954 session, the Bureau's attitude is unchanged. Hence Cordon's appointment with the President.

Ike Is Question Mark
If President Eisenhower rejects Cordon's appeal and backs up the Budget Bureau, Congress is not likely to approve Cordon's bill without also taking a long look at the OGC act of 1937 under which the counties get their 75 per cent share. Such action would probably be delayed another year or more due to the crowded calendar of vital national legislation facing this session of Congress.

But if Eisenhower backs Cordon, the Budget Bureau can be counted upon to send Congress a favorable report on the Ellsworth bill now in the House, which in all probability would pass the measure.

In short, President Eisenhower's answer to Cordon's appeal appears now the controlling factor in whether the controversial OGC lands issue is settled in 1954 by Congress or brushed aside once again for future consideration.

River. Will be ready for oil this year North Umpqua Road from Lone Rock to Bureau of Public Roads access at Rock Creek paved with asphaltic concrete. South of Roseburg, the Roberts Creek and Clarks Branch Roads re-aligned and widened. Part of this road will be ready for oil in 1954. New concrete deck bridge constructed at Green replacing old wooden one.

Myrtle Creek Area — North Myrtle Creek Road oiled for 3.8 miles. On South Myrtle, survey completed with a cattle pass installed at the Trask place. Road is a major project for grading and surfacing in 1954.

Riddle Area — Yocum road near Riddle widened and oiled. Days Creek Road regraded for three miles. Will probably be ready for oil in 1954.

Glendale Area — 180-foot steel deck bridge with concrete deck approaches installed over Cow Creek at Glendale replacing old, unsafe steel bridge. Road from Glendale to Glendale Junction paved with asphaltic concrete for 3.5 miles.

Others — Old Coos Bay Wagon Road being rebuilt from top of Coast Range to Coos County line. One new bridge will be built. Job closed by weather, but to be finished in early 1954. Road east of Tilton to forest boundary regraded and oiled.

Commenting on two jobs, Metzger said oiling on the Yoncalla-Elkhead Road was deferred due to the State Highway construction in that area. A low bridge is also contemplated to replace culverts which are too small to carry flood waters of Poodle Creek.

has been set, but Dr. Anderson reports the cost of operation and administration of the two possible preventatives have been pushed up 50 per cent from last year. Last year, Douglas County racked up a new record of \$38,000.

Dr. Anderson stated that the extra 50 per cent will demand the efforts of everyone including labor, management, social and civic groups.

In launching the campaign in Roseburg, Chairman Mrs. Walter Britt said: "The celebrated miniature iron lung collector is no more. Now we have a test tube. It symbolizes the new turn in the fight against infantile paralysis. This test tube shows science and research have made conquest through its prevention of the hope that polio will be won."

Franklin Voss, treasurer of the Douglas County chapter, called the crucial vaccine field trials the "fourth front in the war on polio." aid to patients needing it, support of scientific research and the first three he listed as financial scholarships to qualified students to do research in polio treatment. "Now we are ready to try the polio vaccine developed by Dr. Jonas Falk."

Douglas County is being considered as one of the sites for the mass vaccine tests in Oregon.

NEW ORLEANS — Foundation President Basil O'Connor in a nationwide broadcast inaugurating the 1954 March of Dimes campaign last night, said thousands of children in Pittsburgh, Pa., would be the first inoculated with a new polio vaccine.

Inoculations in February are to cover "every state in the nation" as part of the program.

O'Connor said the program would cost 75 million dollars but that the development of the serum brought the fight against polio to "the verge of victory."

The serum is to be tested on between 500,000 and one million second grade school children.

Residents may leave their Christmas trees along the curbs of any street running north and south. Members of the Junior Chamber will pick them up for the bonfire Sunday afternoon. The bonfire is scheduled at 6 p.m. at the intersection of Melrose and Lowglass Roads. Schroeder requested the trees be left along the curbs before noon Sunday.

Freighters Collide Off North California Coast

SAN FRANCISCO — The ore ship Permanente Silverbow limped toward San Francisco under Coast Guard escort today after two collisions with a freighter off the northern California coast.

The 7,628-ton ore carrier, southbound from Portland, Ore., with 40-45 crewmen, collided late Friday night with the Manila-bound 7,500-ton freighter Colorado, about 145 miles north of San Francisco. The Colorado's forepeak was flooded but she reported no danger.

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KRRR Will Air Year-End Report Of CBS Staff

"Years of Crisis: 1953 Year of Change," hour-long, year-end report by CBS Radio news correspondents, will be broadcast by Station KRRR Sunday, from 10:15 to 11:15 p.m. For the fifth successive year the noted reporters fly in from their posts around the world to participate in this round-table discussion and appraisal of the year just ended, and the shape of the one ahead.

This year's broadcast, subtitled "1953 Year of Change," will assess the great global changes and world-wide effects of atomic development during 1953, to be followed by an exploration of the possible approaches to a more stable world situation in 1954. Such pivotal events as the Bermuda conference, President Eisenhower's United Nations address and the projected "Big Four" meeting in Berlin will come in for detailed discussion.

Edward R. Murrow will again act as chairman and host for the broadcast. Participating will be Howard K. Smith, chief of CBS Radio's European news staff. Paris is correspondent David Schenbrun; Vienna correspondent Alexander Kendrick; Bonn, Germany, correspondent Richard C. Hottelet; chief Washington correspondent, Eric Sevareid; and White House correspondent George Herman, until recently an Eastern correspondent for CBS Radio News.

"Years of Crisis: 1953 — Year of Change" will be produced under the supervision of Wells Church, CBS Radio director of news.

Property Damage Claim Bases \$14,672 Suit

A suit for \$14,672.50 has been filed in circuit court against Stomacher Lumber Co. involving alleged destruction of property on some timber land in the Tiller area.
