Oklahoma To Vote On Toll Highways

OKLAHOMA CITY — Oklahomaans will decide in a special election Jan. 26 whether to authorize construction of three new toll roads. Gov. Johnston Murray, chief booster of the expressways in Oklahoma, called the election on proposed roads from Tulsa to Joplin, Mo.; Oklahoma City north near Wichita, Kan.; and Oklahoma City southwest near Wichita Falls, Tex. The state's first pay-as-you-drive four-lane superhighway, the Turner Turnpike from Oklahoma City to Tulsa, was opened last May 16.

Murray has hailed the 88-mile turnpike, built only after a bitter political battle and law suits which reached the U. S. Supreme Court, as successful even beyond expectations.

Opponents, however, primarily businessmen and legislators along the toll route — have deemed it as a burden to citizens and a drain on businesses because small towns are bypassed.
