The regular monthly meeting of the E. Douglas Farm Bureau was held at the South Deer Creek Grange hall on Monday evening.

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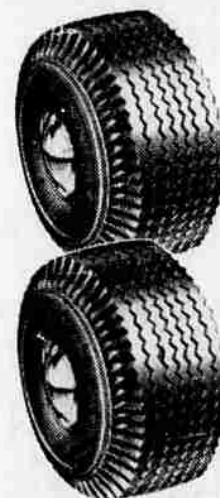
