

Vikings Roll Over Roseburg, 37-30

Bedlam reigned at the Roseburg gym from the beginning, and when the smoke had cleared, Myrtle Creek's Vikings wearily trudged off the floor with a hard-earned 37-30 decision over the Indians basketballers in the season's second meeting between the two clubs Tuesday night.

Strong-armed Wilson Barnes and Paul Hatcher toted the biggest weapons in the Viking arsenal as they manufactured 12 and 13 points, respectively, and Barnes turned in a superb backboard performance with 18 rebounds out of Myrtle Creek's 37 total for the game. On another seven or eight occasions, the terrific Barnes stole the ball away from befuddled Roseburg arms.

Tactics Pay Off

The clash was one of two extremes in type of play. Myrtle Creek's ball control tactics won out as the Viks took their shots and then dropped back quickly to blanket Roseburg's fast break.

Roseburg was rattled early by the maneuvers, and when there was a clear shot, it was generally misdirected by the harried shooter.

Although the Viks' style told the final story, in the early stages the

Indians deprived themselves of any chance to take the lead by missing eight of 12 foul shots. The Indians sank only three field goals in the first two periods, which ended 8-6 and 16-10 with the Vikings in command.

Myrtle Creek did not do much better with six field goals in the half, but the pattern was set in their favor for the first two periods anyway. Roseburg led 2-0 and then it was Myrtle Creek's ball game all the way until the Indians tied it at 21-21 in the third period.

The Indians started the third quarter by playing a tighter man-to-man up front. The strategy paid off for a while as the teams first matched scores, and then the Indians tied it up.

Jim Nas hit a free throw early to make it 17-21. Don Carter's 20 footer for Roseburg closed it to 17-21. Hatcher rebounded for the Indians for a 19-14 margin as action picked up.

Hatcher's one hander from 20 feet on the night made it 21-14 and then the Indians rallied for seven while holding the surprised visitors scoreless.

Big Jim Gilbert ached when he was fouled by Jim Musick.

Booth hit a 10 footer, and after Ron Kelley had intercepted a pass, Carter connected from eight feet on a bank. Gilbert rebounded for the Indians after a wild mid-floor exchange between the teams, but missed the bonus when he was fouled by Hatcher.

Thirty seconds later, with 1:30 left in the third canto, Hatcher canned a driving underhanded layin, and after the Vikings missed an assortment of shots, Barnes back-peddled a layup and Gordon LaVasseur shook free for five footer as the game ended the period with the Viks a shaky 27-21 leader.

Gilbert missed two foul shots early in the fourth, and at the six minute mark the Viks started holding the ball. LaVasseur hit a free shot, but Hatcher missed two to make it 28-21. With five minutes left, Carter converted for a 28-22 count.

Viks Gain

In the next two plays, Coach Bob Abrahamson's boys tried to put everything beyond recall but the Indians were still in it. Barnes rebounded nicely from six feet after Hatcher's free throw missed, and Musick drove into tally for a

32-22 measure with four minutes left.

Myrtle Creek couldn't hold the ball after two Hatcher interceptions and after Gary Crabb countered on a six foot goal and missed a free throw, substitute Erv Darling drove in to score with two minutes left to make it 32-26.

Dick Calkins, Roseburg sub, hit one of two free throws and the Indians applied a full court press. In the closing 30 seconds, Booth jumped shot for two points and converted for one, while LaVasseur cashed in on two free attempts. Carter fouled out for Roseburg with 1:30 remaining and Hatcher did the same for the Viks in the closing seconds.

Roseburg hit on 11 of 46 field goal attempts and on eight of 24 free throws. Myrtle Creek made 12 field goals and 11 of 21 free throws.
