Myrtle Creek Fire Truck Is Tested

The representative for the fire underwriters failed to show up for the tests on the new Myrtle Creek fire truck last week as scheduled, but was to be on hand in Myrtle Creek Monday. According to Fire Chief Norton, the engineer from the La France branch office in San Francisco was here and completed tests on the truck.

Receives Two Calls

Meanwhile, the fire department received two calls last week, both located on North Myrtle Creek. The first was the residence of Mr. and Mrs. George Arrowood. Mr. Arrowood was working on the switch board when her son called in that the house was on fire. She left immediately for home and had the fire almost out when Norton and another fireman arrived with fire extinguishers. Some damage was done to the pine paneling in the kitchen but most of it was confined to the area in and around the flue.

Neighbors noticed that smoke was coming from the eaves of the Wayne Young residence about 3 miles out North Myrtle Road on Dec. 31. The Youngs were not at home at the time. Norton said that when they arrived with fire extinguishers, a neighbor, Dr. Fowler, had the fire pretty well under control with a small pyrene extinguisher. He said that the fire had apparently started in the vacuum cleaner that was stored in a small fruit closet. It burned the hose, wiring and part of a wood chest and some of the wall. The fire was confined to the closet, but caused a lot of smoke.
