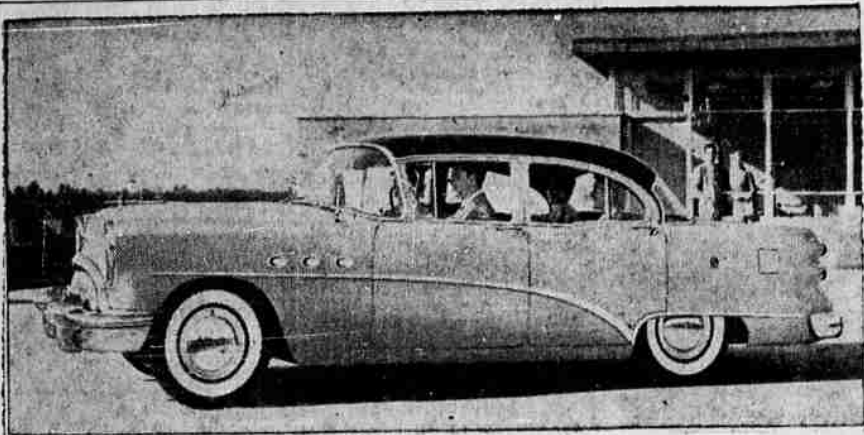

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### Vatican Will Elevate Late Pope To Sainthood

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The Vatican announced Tuesday that the late Pope Pius X will be elevated to sainthood, the Roman Catholic Church's highest honor, at a great outdoor ceremony May 29 in St. Peter's Square.

He will be the first Pope canonized in 241 years. The honor will come to him less than 40 years after his death on Aug. 20, 1914.

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### Explosion Halts Musical Career

ST. CATHERINES, Ont. (AP)—Two construction workers faced 15-day jail terms today for a Christmas Eve fireworks prank that ruined the career of an aspiring refugee concert pianist.

The court which sentenced Vasil Wosilenko, 24, and Frank Zagar, 23, here yesterday was told they made firecrackers out of explosive detonators and tossed them on the steps of a but at the Queenston hydroelectric project, where they work.

Another worker, John Kusiks, 35, picked up one of the explosives. It went off, shattering his right hand and injuring it permanently, a witness testified.

Kusiks had studied piano in his native Latvia for 16 years. He was working on the hydro project to learn English and save enough money to resume his musical career in Canada.

### Utahan, 96, Beneficiary Of Self, Collects Policy

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—A 96-year-old Salt Lake City man yesterday became the beneficiary of his own life insurance policy.

The man, Sereno B. Tuttle, took out the policy in 1884. His premium payments ended in 1899. The Mutual Life Insurance Co. of New York said Tuttle had outlived the life span covered by mortality tables.

The insurance firm said he named himself as beneficiary of the \$1,500 policy when he took it out 69 years ago.

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
