

Roseburg-Reedsport Game Slated For Indian Court

Friday night's Roseburg-Reedsport basketball contest, originally scheduled for Reedsport's floor has been transferred to Roseburg's new gym, according to Roseburg athletic director Bob George.

The meeting will be the first between the two longtime rivals this year and will feature a Reedsport team which possesses one of the best early season records among class A schools in the state.

Last year's sub-district 5 champions have won five of six contests so far this season including victories over such highly touted teams as Marshfield and North Bend. Marshfield was last year's Class A state champion and was winner in two straight games over the Braves in the district playoff.

In games this season, Coach Norm Olson's Braves have defeated Marshfield 53-49, Coquille 52-43, North Bend 54-53, Myrtle Point 54-45, and Florence 54-43. Reedsport lost to North Bend in their first meeting, 65-50.

Three mutual opponents offer a basis for comparative records between Reedsport and the Indians. Coach Dick Ballantyne's home team in running up a 4-4 season record, has manhandled Coquille 57-37 and Myrtle Point 66-40. Against North Bend, the Indians were edged out 57-54.

Both teams possess experienced performers who engaged each other in play in last year's sub-district tourney and league race, both of which Reedsport won from Roseburg.

Associated Press Selects Ben Hogan Athlete Of Year

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. — Golf wizard Ben Hogan seemed to get a genuine glow of pleasure out of his selection as America's outstanding male athlete of 1953, and in discussing the events of last year, unloaded a surprise.

Advised that he had been named the athlete of the year in the 23rd annual Associated Press poll, the third golfer in history to win the award, Hogan exclaimed: "That's wonderful — that's the biggest."

Triple Winner

The 41-year-old Texan, as you know, scored a golden triple in '53 in capturing the Masters, the United States Open, for the fourth time, and the British Open.

Which gave him the biggest boot? "The U. S. Open," Ben replied, without hesitation.

Not the British crown, in his first attempt, and in view of his previous United States victories? "No," Hogan continued. "If I were to win the U. S. Open 50 times, I'd still get the biggest kick out of it."

"Understand, the British Open is a great tournament. But I just can't get it into my head that it is better than ours."

"The people over here think theirs is the best, and they should feel that way. Maybe I underestimate the world impact in winning the British Open. But we still think the U. S. Open is bigger."

Halbrook Paces NW Pointmakers

Hardly anybody can be surprised this week to look up—way up—and see the nation's tallest basketball player also measuring highest in the Northwest collegiate scoring race.

Of course, will be Wade (Suede) Halbrook of Oregon State—all 7 feet 3 inches and 237 pounds of him. Scoring totals for the Northwest through Saturday showed Halbrook with a comfortable bulge on Leon Keefe of Southern Oregon College, whose 216 counters in 11 games earned him second spot for the week.

Halbrook is somewhat off the pace so far last year by little Johnny O'Brien of Seattle University, whose 916 were high for the year in the area. Wade's average is 23.7, while Johnny's was 28.6.

Third place in the scoring scramble goes to a Settle U. player, tall Joe Pehaniak, who caged 211 points in 10 games. Gonzag's Jerry Vermillion runs fourth with 198, but he got them in only eight games and his average is one point better than Halbrook's.

Twenty players have scored 120 or more points this early in the season, none of them needing more than 13 games. All players in the top ten have made 150 or more, and eight schools are represented in the leading ten, Seattle U. and Oregon landing two spots each.

Multitude Sees Dorais Funeral

DETROIT — A multitude of his friends saw the beloved Gus Dorais to his rest Wednesday.

Mourners filled Gesu Church for funeral services for the former University of Detroit and Detroit Lions football coach who with Knute Rockne created the forward pass as it is known today.

Dorais, 62 years old, was the nation's most prominent coaches, died at 62 Sunday. He was then long retired as a coach.

Six high school coaches who played for Dorais in his 17-year span at U of D carried his casket. There was a solemn requiem high mass. Interment was at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

Holy Cross Wins 9th Consecutive Basketball Game

NEW YORK — Holy Cross, long a power in Eastern basketball, appears headed for one of its best seasons since the Crusaders won the NCAA title back in 1947.

Off to an all-winning start the Crusaders polished off their ninth victim last night—a 91-62 breeze over American International—in a triumphant return from the South where they won the Sugar Bowl tournament.

Their New Orleans' success shot the Massachusetts sharpshooters into seventh place in the Associated Press poll.

Togo Plazzi, a silky smooth operator from Union City, N. J., leads the Holy Cross attack and needs just over 100 more points to wind up his career as the second highest scorer in the school's history. He added 22 last night despite limited service.

The Crusaders still face a tough road. They meet Notre Dame in Boston next week and have future engagements with Niagara and unbeaten Connecticut, which won its 11th game last night, 104-48 over New Hampshire.

Among the other nationally ranking clubs, only Duke, No. 8, and Navy, No. 18, saw action last night and both won with ease. The Blue Devils from Durham, N. C., swamped Virginia Tech 82-45. Don Lange set a Naval Academy scoring record of 43 points as the Mid-dies overpowered Johns Hopkins 94-50.

Nine Men Start Baseball Study

NEW YORK — A nine-man committee set down with Commissioner Ford Frick Thursday to formulate legislation by which baseball hopes to keep itself clear of future charges that it operates in violation of certain federal regulations.

Last November the Supreme Court reaffirmed a 31-year-old decision that baseball is a sport, not a business, and therefore outside of the scope of laws restricting monopolies.

But at the same time there were warnings that unless baseball immediately set its house in order it could look for congressional action that might bring about results less pleasant.

As the result, Frick was empowered by the major and minor leagues to appoint a committee to make an exhaustive study of all phases of the sport and recommend legislation that would correct evils.

Almost certain to be considered is the draft of minor league players and the farm system. As the situation now stands, with the majors owning most of the players in the minors, the draft is pretty much a farce.

EUGENE, Ore. — Idaho put the stopper on Oregon's fast break Wednesday night, subduing the Webfoots 60-53 to gain a split in their inaugural Northern Division, Pacific Coast Conference, basketball series.

The Vandals, whipped 81-63 in the opening game Tuesday night, successfully bottled the Oregon attack and with Harlan Melton and Bob Garrison leading the way launched one of their own.

Melton and Garrison, connecting on push shots, contributed 15 points each while his teammates held Oregon's Ed Halberg, who dropped in 25 points Tuesday night to 12. Max Anderson got only 9, half his total of the previous night.

Idaho went out in front early in the second half, held an 8-point edge. But the Ducks closed in and the game was tied 9 times and the lead changed hands 16 times.

Tommy Flynn's one-handed with six minutes to go gave the Vandals a 50-48 lead and Oregon never caught up.

Idaho travels from here to Corvallis Thursday to play Oregon State, the nation's No. 10 team, in a two-game series starting Friday night.

Los Angeles Open To Start Friday

LOS ANGELES — All is ready for the start of the 1954 tournament campaign for the nation's finest golfers, leading off Friday with the 28th annual Los Angeles Open with a purse of \$20,000.

Lloyd Mangrum heads the line-up as the favorite to win the event for the fourth time and the second year in succession in a tournament that will be played in new surroundings for the first time since 1946.

Fox Hills Country Club in the rolling section of Southwest Los Angeles is the scene for the first time. Revamped and toughened for the Los Angeles Open, it measures 6,981 yards and has a par of 35-6-71.

Mangrum, whose 4-under par 280 won the 1953 event, said to "watch out" for Cary Middlecoff and Jack Burke Jr. The latter was runner-up for the big prize of \$2,750 last year, five strokes behind Mangrum.

Top money this year amounts to \$4,000 and second will be worth \$2,500.

Virtually every name professional, with the exception of the ailing Sam Snead, Ben Hogan, Freddie Haas and one or two others, is on deck.

IS THAT SO!

Although the contents of a mother's milk varies with every species, it is always an adequate diet for the young—in fact, milk comes closest to being the most nearly perfect food for each species' needs.

It contains every known vitamin, plus proteins, fats and carbohydrates in easily digested and balanced proportions, properly suited to each kind of mammal.

With the slight addition of a few minerals, such as iron, manganese and copper, milk alone could sustain human life, however dull, from birth to old age.

Richness of milk varies greatly with different animals and geography, too. Farther north, where summers are short and winters are long, milk tends to have a greater fat content. In seals, the milk is almost one-third butterfat and in reindeer, which give perhaps a half teaspoonful a day, the milk is extremely rich. I've found a half teaspoonful sufficient to whiten a cup of coffee.

A ewe's milk is over five times as rich in fat as a mare's, and about three times as rich as a



cow's, which is slightly richer than a human's.

During nursing, mammalian mothers instinctively adopt a proper diet, making whatever selection is necessary from their environment so that their milk will contain the necessary components to promote good health in their young. A rabbit, whose blood usually lacks iron, will quite suddenly eat much more green food.

Milk—perhaps the most complex of all foods—fills one with wonder if I find two of its many distinctive life-giving and life-saving qualities most striking: First, for the early nursings, each mother's milk will contain a laxative which purges the newborn whose intestines usually contain a certain amount of substances to be voided—otherwise it might die.

Second, all mammalian milk contains a unique sugar, called lactose, found in milk and in no other food. About one-sixth as sweet as ordinary sugar, it has the amazing quality of being able to pass right through the stomach unchanged and then as soon as it enters the intestine it promotes the growth of beneficial bacteria which keep the intestine wholesome — Otherwise lethal poisons would develop.

Can other foods compare with milk? Only one, an egg, and that runs a poor second.
