

All-Americans Prepare Guns For Saturday Senior Bowl

MOBILE, Ala. (AP)—If spectators at the Senior Bowl football game Saturday can take their eyes off the star-studded backfields, they should see some slam-bang action on the line.

The first three All-America teams are represented on the North squad, while the Southerners have two first string All-America guards.

North Coach Paul Brown has chosen All-America Don Dohoney

for defensive work. The big end was largely responsible for the great Paul Giel being held to a net gain of only 22 yards by Michigan State in its game with Minnesota.

Also on the defending team are center Jerry Hilgenberg, Iowa's second string All-America, and tackle George Jacoby, third string All-America from Ohio State.

They'll run up against the South's two All-Americans, Crawford Mims of Mississippi and J.D. Roberts of Oklahoma Mims, also on the All-Southeastern Conference honorary squad, was named the outstanding player in the Miami North South game.

Dykes Pounds Joey Giambra

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Bobby Dykes, the lanky Texas fighter who was considered "washed up" a few months ago, jumped back into the headlines today as a contender for Bobo Olson's middleweight title.

Dykes, a 21 underdog, returned from the ranks of almost forgotten boxers last night when he chopped out a unanimous decision over promising Joey Giambra in a nationally televised 10-round bout.

Two years ago this month, in Miami Stadium, Dykes came close to the welterweight throne when he held Kid Gavilan to a split decision. A month later, he followed up with a victory over Gil Turner.

Then the stringbean Texan who now calls Miami home lost four fights in a row and his friends figured he was through. But after a long layoff, Dykes began a serious comeback as a middleweight.

Last night, before a crowd of 3,556 in the Miami Beach Auditorium, where he has never been beaten, Dykes was a superb boxer and counterpuncher as he slashed his way to a one-sided decision over Giambra, the fifth-ranking middleweight contender.

U. S. Skiing Team Gains 4 Members

LAKE PLACID, N.Y. (AP)—The ski team that will carry the United States banner into world-championship competition in Sweden next month had four members Thursday.

Crosby Perry-Smith of Leadville, Colo., Marvin Crawford of the University of Denver and George Hovland of Duluth, Minn., finished in that order in the combined jumping and cross-country tryouts.

Nine skiers competed in the combined event. The jumping had been completed Sunday at nearby Paul Smiths, where tryouts have been going on for the last two weeks.

A New Englander, Robert P. Lack of Rumford, Me., was also placed on the team by the National Ski Assn.

Garbarino said the Beavers also are buying Gene Tanselli, the WIL's leading shortstop last season, from the Senators.

ADELAIDE, Australia (AP)—Tony Trabert, U.S. Davis Cup star from Cincinnati, crushed Australia's Ken Rosewall in straight sets Thursday 6-3, 6-3, 6-2 to enter the final of the South Australian Tennis Championship.

Trabert's victory set the stage for another struggle between him and Lewis Hoad, 19-year-old Aussie star. Hoad outlasted Trabert in a thrilling five-set key match in the recent Davis Cup challenge round.

Hoad put on a great rally to defeat titleholder Rex Hartwig 4-6, 4-6, 7-5, 6-1, 6-2 in the other semi-final Thursday. He and Trabert play for the championship on Saturday.
