Ex-Forest Chief OSC Lecturer

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — One of America's leading foresters, Col. William Buckhout Greeley, will be at Oregon State college Jan. 25 to Feb. 20 as a special lecturer in the school of forestry. Chief of the U. S. Forest Service from 1920 to 1928, Greeley is credited as being largely responsible for the tree farm movement in this country. His two recent books, "Forests and Men" and "Forest Policy," have gained wide attention. Since 1945, he has been vice president and trustee for the West Coast Lumbermen's Assn. and is chairman of the board for the American Forest Products Industries, Inc. Now retired, Greeley lives at Gamble Bay, Wash. Earlier this year, he presented a series of special lectures at Yale university. At OSC, he will schedule some public addresses in addition to the student and faculty lectures and seminars, according to Paul M. Dunn, dean of forestry, who arranged the lecture series.

Oregon Coast People See Flash On Horizon
NEWPORT, Ore. (AP) — A bright flash on the western horizon was reported Thursday night by coastal residents from Newport to Empire, 100 miles south of here. Coastguardsmen collected the reports and relayed them to Coast Guard headquarters at Seattle, where officials said the flash apparently was a meteor, traveling from east to west. All planes in the area were accounted for, and no ships were reported in trouble. The flash was seen about 5:30 p. m.

Oregon Farm Prices Up During December
PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon farmers got a little more money for their products in the month ended Dec. 15, but the level still was 10 per cent under that of the year previous. The Federal Crop Reporting Service said the index of prices went up 1 per cent in the 30-day period to a level of 230. Livestock prices advanced 2 per cent to lead the gain. Fed grains, wheat and seeds also increased, but potatoes, turnips and fruit decreased.

STOVEPIPE WELLS, Calif. (AP) — Death Valley Scotty, 81, was buried Thursday on a hill behind his Moorish castle overlooking an endless valley of sand, just as he wished. While brief funeral services were led by T.R. Goodwin, superintendent of Death Valley National Monument, in the music room of the famous castle, motor caravans jammed the roads to the tourist mecca. The desert prospector, whose real name was Walter E. Scott, died Tuesday of a gastro-intestinal hemorrhage. He was widely known for his stories of hidden gold mines and his wild spending adventures.

Dairies Study Promotion Plan

ONTARIO, Ore. (AP) — A 12-month assessment to raise \$200,000 annually for promotion of dairy products was proposed here Thursday by Wilbur Reiling, Klamath Falls, president of the Oregon Dairymen's Association. Speaking at the opening session of the two-day convention, Reiling told some 150 dairymen present that the industry needs to win over the public. That will be the theme of the session, with most action expected to bear on the problems of consumer resistance. The fund raising proposal was to put an assessment of a half cent a pound or 2 cents a hundred-weight against dairymen on a year-around basis instead of only two months a year as at present. Reiling said that the National Milk Producers Assn. had worked out a self-help program which was worthy of praise because it would eliminate much of the adverse public opinion stemming from government surplus purchases. The industry's surpluses, while putting dairymen "in the doghouse," actually are proportionately smaller than those in the wheat and cotton growing fields, he said. The group approved a program suggested by the Oregon Dairy Commission and outlined by Glenn Lay, executive secretary. Lay said it was intended to bring producer and distributor together on promotion, apply to Oregon the national program of the American Dairy Assn., and promote the industry both in direct messages to consumers and through trade channels. The session continues Friday.

Local Students Elected To Model UN Conclave

Fifteen Southern Oregon College students, including two from Roseburg, have been named as delegates and observers at the fourth annual Model United Nations Convention at the University of California at Los Angeles, March 25-27. Roseburg students chosen as delegates to the UCLA meeting are Norma John and Darrell Keene. Heading the delegations will be Pete Soderlund, student body president, the school reported. Three of the 15 will be observers. The group has been assigned the responsibility of acting as the Yugoslavian delegation to the meeting. Last year, as the Union of South Africa delegation, a group from the Ashland college was awarded second place for its work.

Youth For Christ Rally Gets Sheriff's Backing

He said the program is one of many activities needed to help reduce the great number of juvenile cases now handled by law enforcement officers.
