Attend Game — Mr. and Mrs. Henry Halvorsen of Sutherlin attended the East-West game in San Francisco last Saturday.



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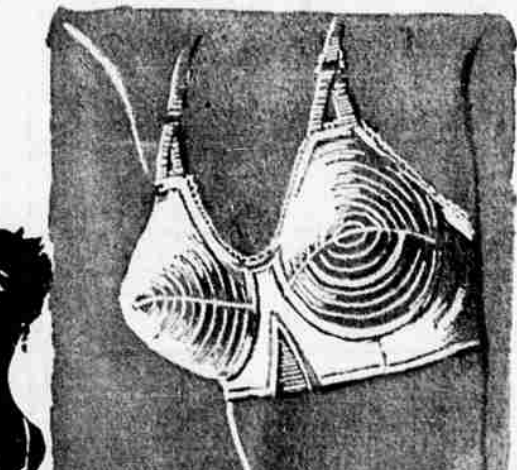
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
