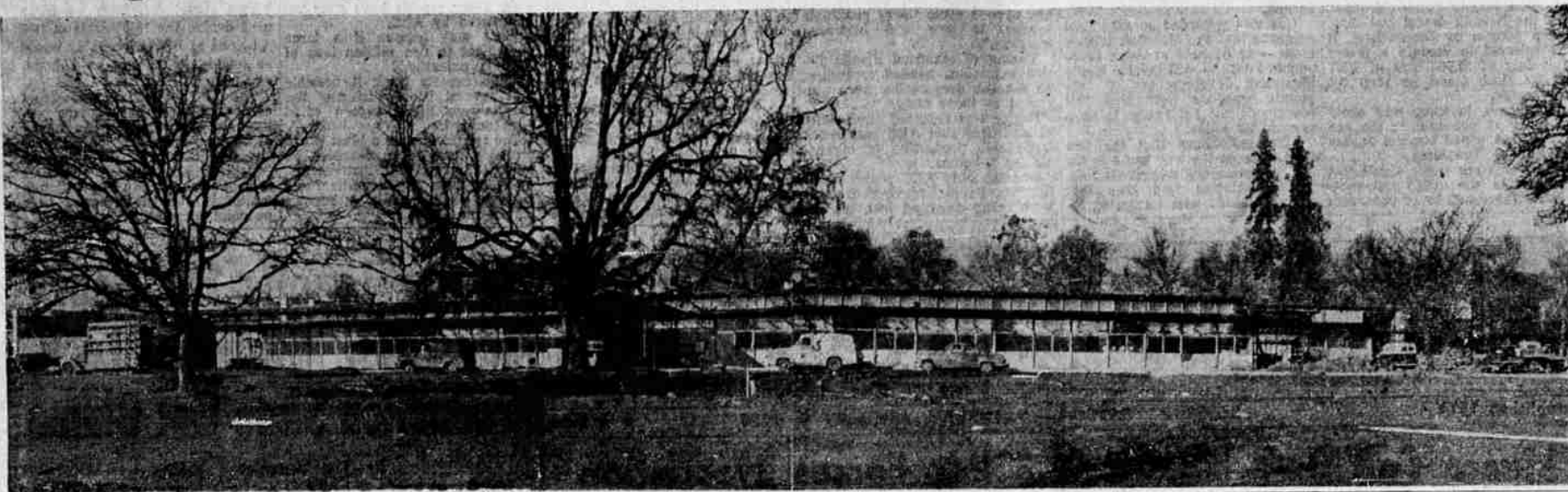


Douglas High School Set For First Classes Monday



Room for 350 high school students will be taken up in the new consolidated Dillard School District Monday when the doors of Douglas High School, Brockway, open.

The high school has been functioning as such since the start of the school year — but students have been housed in Lookingglass School. The elementary students there had to attend classes at Dillard to make way.

William Bromley, superintendent, said more space at the school will be made available near the end of February when more classrooms and manual arts quarters are finished by contractors. Initially, students will occupy about half of the classrooms eventually planned.

The school is built on the campus plan. Covered walkways lead between two large buildings. The buildings, themselves, are among the most modern in architecture in the state.

The student body at the school already has organized, but contains no juniors or seniors this year. They attend Roseburg High School, and will until next fall when more space is ready at Brockway.

The student body contains seventh and eighth graders, for the

junior high school in the district will share quarters with the high school.

Athletic teams have been organized under Russ Hawk and Roy Harrington, and interschool games have been played in football and basketball. A new gymnasium is being built at the site, but under separate contract. It will not be used this year.

The school now is in an A-2 classification, as set by the Oregon Scholastic Activities Assn. and will be a member of the Umpqua Valley League next year.

The league includes, besides athletics, a plan for interschool activities in speech, drama, P.E., home economics and other fields. Other members are Myrtle Creek, Glendale, Sutherlin and Oakland.

Opening of the school brings to 15 the number of high schools now in the county.

Two Roseburg writers have recently received national recognition for their efforts in the literary field.

Mrs. Lena Geier, a member of the Roseburg Writer's Club, has been notified of acceptance and publication of her article, "Up and Over," in The Link Magazine.

The story concerns the first flight made by man over the Continental Divide from the United States into Canada, and return. Non-stop. Two days later the young man, who held one of the earliest pilot's licenses issued, was killed in a flight over the West Coast.

The article is particularly timely, since this year marks the 50th anniversary of the Wright Brothers' first airplane flight.

Another Roseburg writer receiving recognition for his work is James R. Daugherty, who heard two original poems, "A Prayer For Mother," and "The Old Home," read over a coast to coast network broadcast of the Rev. Lynn Hodges "The Way of Life." Daugherty is an engineer and a resident of Roseburg. He, too, is a member of the Roseburg Writer's Club.

The general conception is that an individual is hysterical when he or she screams, tosses themselves about, has fits of weeping, or fainting spells.

Much of this may only be a tantrum, a display of bad temper, as is often seen in children, who will throw themselves upon the floor, kicking and screaming.

In pronounced hysteria, there is usually a history of peculiar, different kinds of symptoms. There are nervous tendencies, headaches, weakness and a general nerve instability.

The mentality of hysterical individuals is very susceptible to any kind of suggestion. Any kind of excitement, overwork, or unusual happenings may bring on an attack. Impressions will develop into fixed conceptions and obsessions, and nothing can at this time sway the hysteric. Reasoning is largely ineffective in calming the attack.

On the contrary, the individual appears subconsciously to use the attack as a means of avoiding the need to face certain aspects of

life that are unpleasant to them, highlight their feelings of inadequacy, or injure their ego in some manner. There is evidence in many cases, that we are dealing with a phase of psychoneurosis.

Hysterical attacks must be differentiated from epilepsy which is a chronic nervous disease where there are periodic seizures of convulsions with disturbance of consciousness.

When hysterical attacks are mild, they usually pass away after a short while. In serious cases, which recur again and again, only special, specific treatment can accomplish any results.

Hysteria is often due to worry, overwork, irregular habits and great emotional excitement. Heredity may also be a factor in hysteria. Though formerly regarded as of little consequence it often takes the form of severe illness.

Hypnosis and, in some severe cases, shock treatments are effective in overcoming the disorder. (Pd. Adv.)

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Legless Lady Editor Rallies, Plans More Safety Writing

WILLIAMSPORT, Pa. — One week after the tragic accident in which she lost both legs, Rebecca Gross made plans from a hospital wheel chair today towards resuming her active newspaper career.

Already the 48-year-old editor of the Lock Haven (Pa.) Express is looking forward to learning to walk with the aid of artificial limbs as the first step in her return to full-time duty at the paper.

What will she write about? The smiling, brunette woman known to editors across the nation as "Becky" has ready answer for that question:

"I'm going to write a lot about

highway safety," she told a reporter.

The grim statistics of highway safety will not be a new topic for Becky. The Express of last Thursday published her lead editorial titled "How Not To Start A New Year."

"No one needs to be one of those New Year accident victims," she wrote. "Who wants to start the New Year in a hospital, or a morgue?"

At 5:15 that afternoon, while the newspaper was being delivered in her north-central Pennsylvania home town area, Miss Gross was driving to Williamsport Airport to meet her sister. At an intersection, her car and another collided. She was thrown to the street, pinned against a pole.

At the hospital, told that amputation of the right leg below the knee and the left leg above the knee was unavoidable, Becky asked that a radio, typewriter and fountain pen be sent to her room.

With them she began the rehabilitation that is her unwavering aim today.

"A little later I expect to write again for the paper, perhaps on an irregular schedule at first. When I have learned to walk again I expect to go back to the Express on a full-time permanent basis."

Miss Gross joined the Express staff as a reporter in 1925. She was one of the first two U.S. newspaper women selected for the Nieman Fellowship at Harvard. Last year she was one of seven U.S. newspaper editors who made an unprecedented trip to Russia, and later reported extensively on the trip for the Associated Press.

Job Outlook Poor In Portland Area

PORTLAND — Job prospects in the Portland metropolitan area will continue poor for the next two months, James H. Bagan of the Oregon State Employment Service reported Friday.

He announced that in mid-November there were 19,000 without work in Multnomah, Clackamas, Washington and Columbia counties. That is a 49.6 per cent increase over the previous month and 45 per cent more than at the same time in 1952.

About 32 per cent of those without work are women. Logging and lumber jobs were down 6.5 per cent from mid-October and 17.9 per cent from a year ago.

He said that seasonal declines were responsible for much of the increased unemployment but he added that there were indications of weakening economic conditions.

"Opportunities will start to improve with the usual employment upswing about next March," Bagan predicted.
