Green Giant Cannery At Ellensburg Folds

ELLENSBURG (AP) — The Green Giant Co. announced Monday that it is discontinuing the operation of its Ellensburg corn cannery.

The shutdown means the loss of an industry that has paid a total of more than half a million a year to farmers and workers.

A company statement attributed the decision to two reasons:

(1) Growing and soil conditions which make the Kittitas Valley corn too variable for the firm's whole kernel pack; (2) Freight costs are too high to the markets to which cream style corn is shipped.

For the past two years the firm's pack here has been about half of each type.

Strike Lays Off 3,000 Garment Shipping Clerks

NEW YORK (AP) — An organizational strike by more than 3,000 shipping clerks began Tuesday in New York's huge garment making industry, the city's biggest trade.

A union spokesman said that noisy, jostling picket lines thrown around three buildings in the heart of the midtown dressmaking section had the immediate effect of keeping another 25,000 workers off their jobs.

The strike, called by Local 60A of the AFL International Ladies' Garment Workers Union, was aimed at five employer groups that carried the additional threat that the entire industry would be shut down unless the unit won recognition as bargaining agent for workers who wrap packages and push dress carts from manufacturers to distributors.

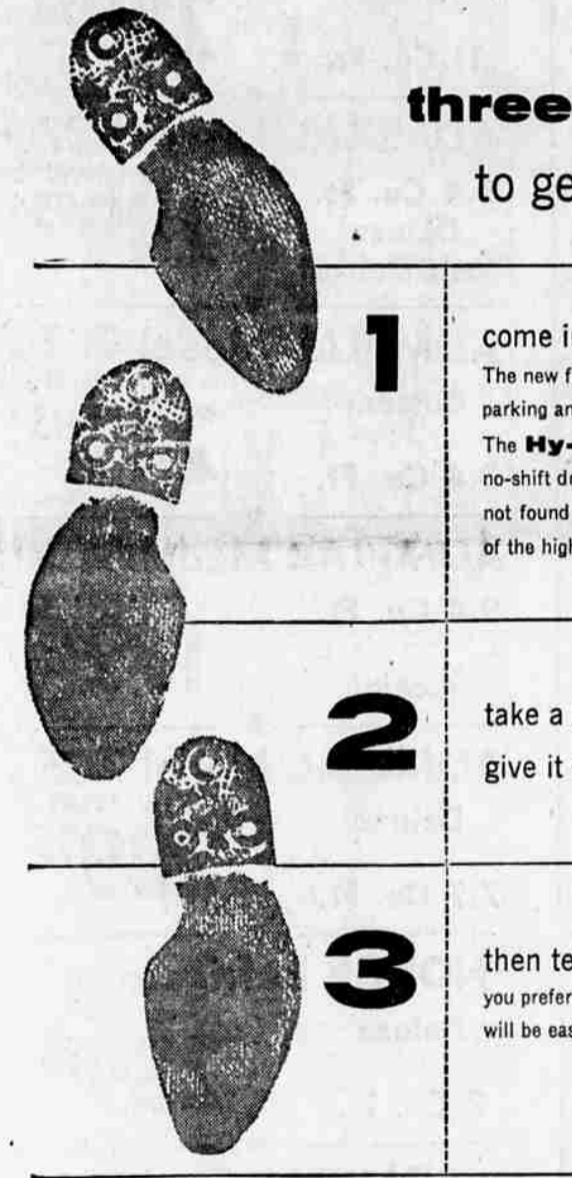

Senator Frowns On 3 Measures

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Morse of Oregon Monday made his views known on three pieces of legislation which are to come before Congress.

He disapproved of all of them.

Of President Eisenhower's farm program, Morse said:

"The President's recommendations on agriculture make it clear that we must now regard our surplus food production as a liability rather than a great national asset. He apparently referred to the Eisenhower plan of withholding certain surpluses from normal trade channels.

On the administration's proposed revision of the Taft-Hartley law, Morse said:

"The present law is a straitjacket. The President apparently proposes to loosen the top button only." Morse said he plans to offer a bill providing "a more flexible system which would induce unions and employers to bargain rather than subject themselves to government intervention."

Morse described a proposed pay increase for congressmen as "an affront to the American people." He said he was at a loss to understand how congressmen, with a salary of \$15,000 a year, could seriously consider a pay raise when there are "beginning signs of an economic recession."
