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Babe Enters Tourney, Rules As Co-Favorite

SEA ISLAND, Ga. — A record-breaking tuneup round made Babe Zaharias a strong favorite in the first Sea Island Women's Open Golf Tournament, which began today.
Mrs. Zaharias, attempting a comeback after a serious operation sidelined her for a year, shot a 71 yesterday to break by 3 strokes the old course record held by Louise Suggs of Atlanta.
Although she was slightly ill with an upset stomach, Miss Suggs still rated as a favorite along with the Babe. The \$3,500 Sea Island tournament, which launches the 1954 Ladies' Professional Golfers Assn. 24-tournament tour, attracted 13 professionals and a large assortment of leading amateurs.

Price To Bow Out At End Of Season

BERKELEY, Calif. — Clarence Merle (Nibs) Price, the little giant of Pacific Coast basketball, rings down the curtain at the end of this season on a 30-year career as head coach at the University of California.

The automatic retirement age of 65 will have caught up with Nibs. One of Price's fondest hopes is that he will produce another player of All America stature to close out his university tenure.

His big gun is Bob Matheny, an agile guard who has the qualifications to become a professional star. Matheny stands 5 feet 11 and can do about everything with the ball except swallow it whole. He's an artist with either hook or outside shots both left and right-handed. He sets up plays and is tremendous defensively.

Because of his sensational performances in the double upset wins over UCLA last weekend, Matheny was named Player of the Week by the Northern California Basketball Writers and Sportscasters Assn. Saturday night he scored 18 points, passed to another 20, stole the ball twice and put on a defensive show.

Price has been coaching at California in some capacity since 1919. He is the last man who has been head coach in football and basketball at the same time. He was the top kick in football from 1926 through 1930.

Matthews Ponders Feb. 9 Return To Fistic Wars

SPOKANE — Heavyweight Harry (Kid) Matthews, idle since he lost to British champion Don Cockell last summer, may return to the ring here Feb. 9.

Promoter Tex Hager said Wednesday Jack Hurley, the Seattle Kid's manager, has agreed to a fight here on that date if Hager can find a suitable opponent.

Hager said possible opponents include Ted Lowry of Detroit or Ray Layne of Salt Lake City. The latter lost to Matthews by a decision in a previous meeting.

The fight would be a tuneup for a possible rematch with Cockell.

International Orioles' Head Goes To Texas

BALTIMORE — Don Heffner, former New York Yankee infielder and the last manager of the old Baltimore Orioles in the International League, is managing at San Antonio again.

Heffner was named yesterday by General Manager Art Elders to pilot the Texas League farm team of the new American League Orioles.

The 42-year-old manager retired from baseball after steering San Antonio to the league pennant in 1950, then returned to the game in 1952 with the old Orioles.

Silverton Boxer Wins Decision

PORTLAND — Harold Kottre of Silverton, Ore., won an unpopular decision over Bill Boatman of Longview, Wash., in the 10-round main event of a boxing card here Thursday night.

Some of the crowd booed when Referee Freddie Steele, the only judge, awarded the fight to Kottre. Boatman staggered Kottre with heavy blows in the ninth round and had him hanging on in the tenth but the young light heavyweight had piled up the winning points in the first six frames. Kottre weighed 173, Boatman 175.

It was Kottre's last fight before entering military service.

SYDNEY — Lewis Hoad, Australian Davis Cup star, today became Pvt. Lewis Hoad of the 13th National Service Training Battalion as he traded his racket for a rifle.

Hoad, who defeated both Tony Trabert and Vic Seixas in the recent Davis Cup Challenge Round, said he was looking forward to army training as a welcome break from tennis.

He'll do 98 days of basic infantry training, then two years of part time service. There was no indication of how much the army service would affect his tennis playing.

Saturday night Willamette, leading league play with three wins and no losses, plays at Linfield.

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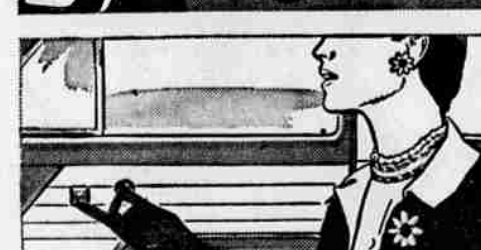
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
