Yellow Stop Signs Will Be Replaced With Red — PORTLAND (AP) — The familiar yellow stop signs on posts will begin turning red in about two weeks in Oregon.

W. C. Williams, assistant state highway engineer, said the state has ordered the new signs as part of an agreement among states to make all highway signs uniform. Red was adopted for the stop sign. The word "stop" will be in white.

Williams said the change-over would be slow. He estimated it would take three to five years for the state and counties to replace all stop signs with new ones.

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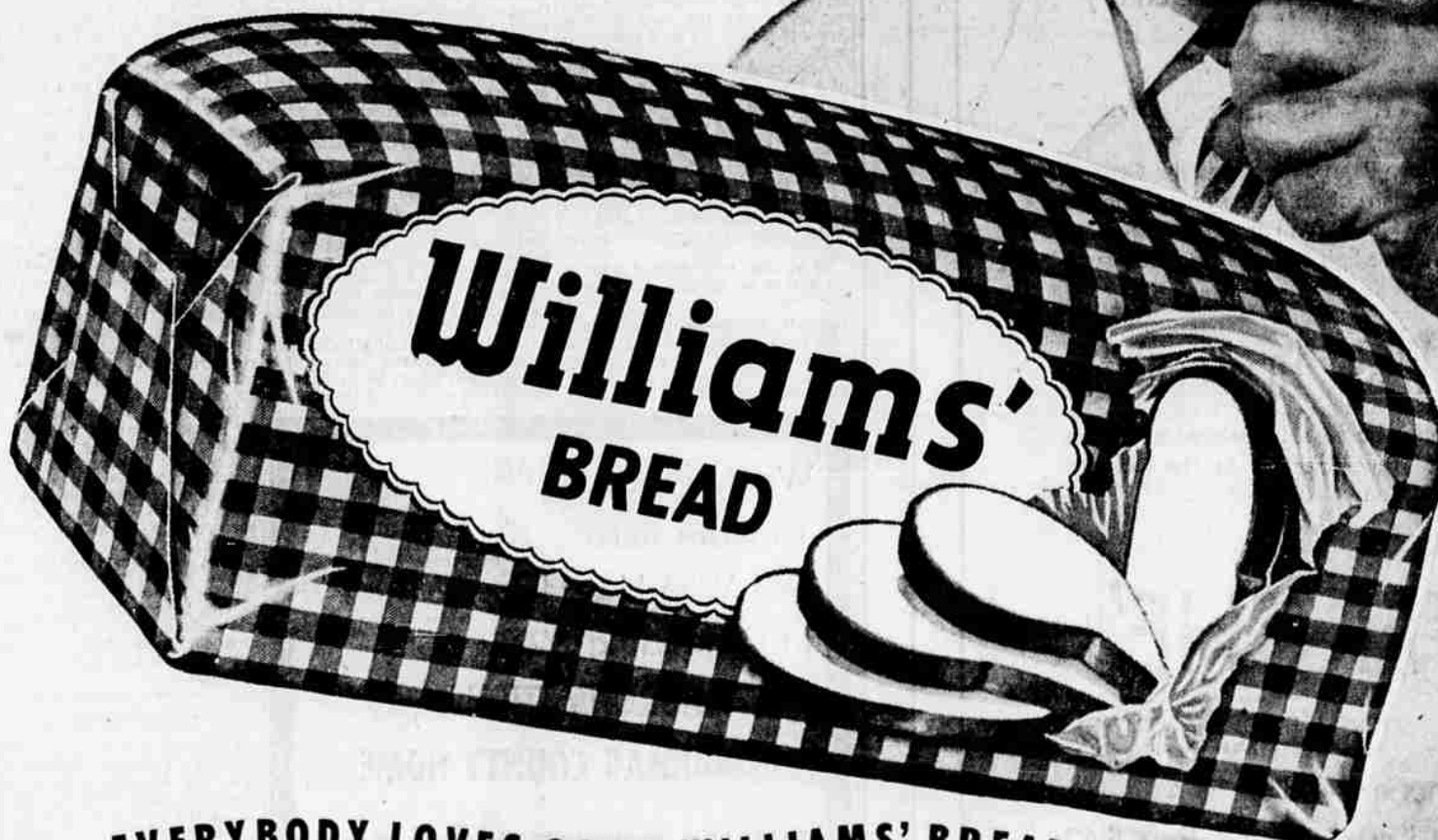
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
