# YOUR BODY

The examination of urine is one of the most important methods of ascertaining not merely the condition of the kidneys, but also of the body as a whole. When an organ does not function properly this fact is frequently revealed by urinalysis.

Normal urine varies in color, specific gravity, odor and reaction from a clear, transparent, pale straw liquid to a cloudy, opaque, deep yellow. It has a very characteristic odor. The precise color, odor, and reaction depend upon diet, fluid intake, etc.

The average composition of urine is 96 per cent water and 4 per cent solids, half of which is urea. In addition to solid substances in solution, the urine also contains gases — carbon dioxide, nitrogen, and oxygen in solution.

Urine examination consists of both chemical and microscopic examinations, some of the most common are albumin, sugar, bile, indican, acetone, casts, blood cells, pus, bacteria, etc.

Casts represent destroyed kidney tissue, and can be seen in the urine only by means of a microscope. Their significance depends chiefly upon their number, variety, and associated conditions. The hyaline or glassy variety may appear in normal urine and in nephritis (inflammation of the kidneys). Epithelial casts (cells from the internal lining) may mean inflammation of the tubule cells, and occur most commonly in acute toxic nephritis. Granular casts occur in acute and chronic nephritis.

The most common appearance of albumin in the urine is in organic disease of the kidney — namely, in all varieties of Bright's disease. Albumin is sometimes discovered in the urine of patients with fever and in certain diseases of the nervous system, such as apoplexy and epilepsy, and sometimes discovered in the urine during adolescence, and is known to physicians as cyclic albuminuria.

Blood may be present in the urine due to injury of any part of the urinary or genital tract. It may also occur in blood disorders and in some general diseases. Blood is usually found in kidney conditions of all varieties, especially acute inflammation from tumors, stones, kidney tuberculosis, metal poisoning or certain medications.

Pus is found in the urine in acute infections or inflammation of any part of the urinary tract. Cystitis or inflammation of the bladder is very common. Often the bladder infection is associated with infections elsewhere in the body which is also true of the kidneys. (Pd. Adv.)

Montana and Wyoming Saturday as the season's coldest weather headed for wide areas in the mid-continent.

Temperatures early Saturday were near 30 degrees below zero in parts of the cold belt. Fresh falls of snow were in prospect for many areas.

Cold wave warnings were issued for many central states. It was 28 degrees below zero Saturday in Urbank, Mont.; 24 in Monet, N. D.; 22 in International Falls, Minn., and 7 in Minneapolis.

Winter's worst storm swept over Washington and parts of Idaho and Oregon Saturday, bringing heavy snow, freezing temperatures and all of the good and bad things that go with them.

Only one traffic death was reported in safety-conscious Washington, however, despite innumerable minor accidents caused by ice-covered streets and highways.

The storm which dumped from one to more than eight inches of snow on communities throughout most of the Northwest hampered shipping, forced postponement of basketball games, and closed schools.

Greatest damage reported came off British Columbia where a million dollars worth of logs broke loose from a boom and scattered over a wide area at Keats Island, 35 miles north of Vancouver.

Snow blanketed Northern Oregon Saturday as a storm front closed in from the north.

The Weather Bureau said five inches had fallen at The Dalles and three inches at the Portland Airport at 4:30 a. m. and it was still snowing at mid-morning. Some points in the Columbia Gorge east of Portland unofficially reported more than six inches.

Sheriff's deputies were warning vehicles to stay out of the Columbia Gorge east of Troutdale. Two truck-trailer rigs went over banks on that stretch.

Snow was reported in the Willamette Valley as far south as the Salem area. It was raining at Eugene and south of there.

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# Land Classification Laws Explained To Livestockmen

Many Douglas County farmers and ranchers still are not out of the woods so far as coming under the state's land classification laws is concerned. Fred Southwick, Douglas Forest Protective Assn. district warden, told members of the Douglas County Livestock Assn. Friday in Roseburg.

Assessments on acreage for fire protection and suppression have been a thorn long stuck in the sides of farmers, but a new state law aims at clearing that up.

A land classification committee for the county has been set up to distinguish, for tax purposes, the difference between timber lands and grazing lands. Southwick says they have a lot of work ahead of them.

# Law Defines Timber Land

Originally, the law was worded so any land with literally one tree growing on it was classified as timber land. Now, a law passed by the 1951 Legislature attempts to define timber land and grazing land.

An inspection by the classification committee has been made of timber and grazing lands. Southwick says that the committee is being in the ownership of an individual.

The DFPA, Southwick explained, is authorized as a state agency to collect assessments from land owners for fire protection come within the wording of the law.

The DFPA is allowed to set a 5-cent per acre collection for protection each year, and fire suppression costs are tacked on in addition. Ranchers and farmers

he added.

"Then the political conference should begin right away—give it 90 days, that's 180 days in all. After that, something must be done.

"Our brothers are begging and pleading with us to come and help them."

Dr. Karl's statement said: "What President Rhee was trying to point out is that we can not wait forever to free the suffering people of the North from Communist tyranny. In doing so, he posed a hypothetical case in which three months would be considered a reasonable time for the preliminary talks, and another three months, as provided by the armistice agreement, for the political (peace) conference itself."

"Actually," Karl went on, "President Rhee specifically refused to set any definite date. The point that the President was trying to make is that once it becomes entirely clear that peaceful efforts are a failure, we must take action—with the help of our allies, we hope—to bring about unification by other means."
