Dale Bartline, an anesthetist at Community Hospital, has been appointed to direct the Sacred Heart Hospital school of anesthesia in Spokane.

The nurse anesthetist, his wife and five children will leave Roseburg in time for Bartline to report for duty after Feb. 1. Bartline has been a member of the Community Hospital staff since December 1952. He has lived in Roseburg 14 months.

Before coming to Roseburg, Bartline had been connected as an anesthetist with a group of doctors in Spokane.

Manager Harry Sanislo at Community said he hated to lose Bartline from the staff, but he said the anesthetist deserved the promotional honor. "He has earned it through his capabilities," Sanislo said. Sanislo said no replacement has been named at Community, but applications are now being received.

Irish Call On Pentagon To Apologize For Slur

BOSTON (AP)—The Pentagon has 24 hours to apologize to the residents of South Boston—or else an invitation for armed services troops to participate in the March 17 Evacuation Day parade will be withdrawn.

Chief Parade Marshal Patrick F. Sheehan demanded the apology last night after Army officials announced no troops would parade in South Boston unless all the liquor places in the district are closed. Sheehan said, "The Pentagon has insulted our people are drunks. I demand an immediate apology, otherwise I will cancel our invitation to the armed services."

Army officials said soldiers and sailors were the targets of eggs, vegetables and stones during the parade last year.

South Boston residents observe St. Patrick's Day and Evacuation Day in a joint celebration each March 17.

Arrest Follows Eugene Robbery And Abduction

EUGENE (AP)—Police rescued Bobby Calvin Roberts, a 15-year-old service station attendant, one hour after he had been abducted by a robber Saturday.

The car carrying Roberts, Robert Lee Morris, 32, Florence, and Charles Roland Kibe, 27, Eugene, was stopped by state police at Corvallis after an unidentified witness reported that the car driving north on the highway and that something apparently was wrong.

The boy said Morris took \$52.50 from the service station after threatening him with a pistol.

Morris was booked on a charge of armed robbery and kidnapping. Kibe, who Sgt. Vern Hill said took no part in the affair, was booked on a charge of being drunk on a public highway.

Standardizing Of Costs Aim Of Hospital Meet

Representatives from both Mercy and Community Hospitals will travel to Medford Tuesday for a district meeting of the Oregon State Hospital Assn., which may standardize costs in this area for all member hospitals.

Members of the Southern Oregon district will meet to study cost of drugs, appliances, surgery and other hospital costs in an effort to standardize these hospital fees throughout the district.

The study was brought about because of inquiries made by pre-paid insurance companies. Such a wide range of costs on these items were noted that an investigation was asked.

Harry Sanislo, manager of Community Hospital, is chairman of the committee of the OSHA making the study for the district. He said the standardization process will not include hospital room charges, which he described as "personal problems."

Any standardized costs will affect all patients going to hospitals, he said, except such special patients as those on welfare.

Poleri Concert Is Slated Tonight At Junior High

David Poleri, a relatively newcomer to the entertainment field, but already highly acclaimed by noted critics, will appear in concert tonight at 8:15 p.m. on the stage of the Roseburg Junior High School. His appearance is sponsored by the Roseburg Community Concert Association.

Poleri made his New York debut only late last season, but reportedly burst onto the operatic scene with such impact and to such high acclaim that he is well on his way to becoming one of America's most successful singers.

Critic Mary Garden has called Poleri the "Crown Prince" of Grand Opera. Having scored with New York City Opera Company in "Manon" and other performances, he was invited to sing at the great Edinburgh Festival. Eugene Ormandy engaged him for his performance of Homage's "King David" with the Philadelphia Orchestra and Bruno Walter asked him to soloist during his guest season with the Chicago Symphony.

Poleri studied to be a school teacher, a specialized in languages. He only turned to voice a few years ago and made his professional debut as soloist with the Allentown, Penn., Symphony Orchestra.

After Chicago and New York appearances, television was quick to spot the young singer and he made his debut on Faye Emerson's "Wonderful Town." With opera with orchestral engagements, radio and TV encompassed, Poleri is now turning to recitals and is making his first national recital tour this season.

South Umpqua Timber Tract Sold At Auction

Round Prairie Lumber Co., Dillard, offered high bid of \$21,786.25 for 1,773,000 board feet of timber in a sale held Friday by the U. S. Forest Service, Robert Aufderheide, supervisor, reports.

The price was barely above the appraised price of \$21,710. Competition in bidding came from Umpqua Plywood Corp. In addition to the bid price, the lumber firm will pay 25 cents a thousand as a slash deposit and 80 cents a thousand for replanting.

The tract is located in the South Umpqua District of the forest above Tiller.

Bound Prairie bid \$8.95 a thousand for 1,400,000 feet of Douglas fir; \$3.20 for hemlock and other species and \$35.40 for sugar pine. The bids on the Douglas fir and hemlock were a nickel a thousand above appraised prices, while the sugar pine went for the appraised valuation.

Allies Ignore Warning Not To Free Prisoners

PANMUNJOM (AP)—Indian Lt. Gen. K. S. Thimayya told the U. N. Command again today it will violate the Korean armistice if it frees anti-Communist prisoners before their fate is decided by Allied-Red agreement or by a peace conference.

The Allies, however, went ahead with plans to free more than 22,000 Korean and Chinese anti-Red POWs as civilians by Saturday—a course the UNC says is required by the armistice terms.

Efforts to reopen preliminary talks for a peace conference got nowhere.

on the Umpqua Highway between Elkton and Reedsport, but traffic was not impaired. State police advised use of chains on the Tiller Trail Highway, where three feet of snow lay at the Jackson County line. All highways affected in the county are plowed, according to the State Highway Dept.'s division office here.

The coaxial cable service was interrupted Saturday night when water leaked into the cable housing after the landslide. Repairs were completed at about 10 a.m. Sunday. It links Portland and Salem and also carries regular telephone calls and wires leased by the Associated Press, PWT spokesman said.

The snow in Roseburg began at about 10 p.m. Saturday after an afternoon of heavy rain. The weatherman estimated that three inches lay on the ground early Sunday. The sun broke out early, though, melting it in exposed places. Some still lay on the ground Monday morning.

The storm had drifted down slowly from British Columbia, covering most of the northwestern part of the state.

More snow lay on the ground at Tiller this morning, according to Robert Aufderheide, supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest. Altitude of Tiller is 1043 feet.

Snow for the lowlands of the county is ruled out for the next 36 hours. The Weather Bureau said weather will remain mostly cloudy with more showers of rain today and Tuesday.

Precipitation since Saturday morning was 10 inches, bringing the January total to 4.69 inches. For the 48 hours ending Saturday morning, 2.39 inches of that total fell.

Above 3,000 feet, the weatherman said, snow can be expected. Snowing closed Jefferson County schools in Central Oregon Monday, and forecasters warned that more snow was on the way for Central and Eastern Oregon.

Little if any snow was forecast for Western Oregon, but icy highways were in prospect. Forecasters said there probably would be rain, followed by freezing temperatures, to glaze the roads in Northwestern Oregon, particularly in the Portland area.

Beed measured a total of 13 inches of snow on the ground Monday, but schools were operating there. Prineville had 3 inches of snow, but 30 miles east of Prineville the snow was 9 inches deep.

The snow blanketed Northwestern Oregon, but did not extend far south in the Willamette Valley. Eugene was without snow and other points also reported mild weather.

Ike Offers Govt. Health Program To Lawmakers

organizations do not now provide. But the government can and should work with them to study and devise better insurance protection to meet the public need."

Private Hospitals Praised
The President told the lawmakers:

"Even where the best in medical care is available, its costs are often a serious burden. Major, long-term illness can become a financial catastrophe for a normal American family."

He praised existing private hospitalization and medical care insurance plans, and said progress made in that field "indicates that these voluntary organizations can reach many more people and provide better and broader benefits."

Eisenhower said the government need not and should not go into the insurance business to furnish the protection which private and non-profit organizations now provide.

"But the government," the President added, "can and should work with them to study and devise better insurance protection to meet the public need."

Would Expand Facilities
"I recommend the establishment of a limited federal reinsurance service to encourage private and non-profit health insurance organizations to offer broader health protection to more families. This service would reinsure the special additional risks involved in such broader protection. It can be launched with a capital fund of 25 million dollars provided by the government, to be retired from reinsurance fees."

Calling for expanded construction of medical care facilities, the President urged:

1. Additional federal assistance in the construction of non-profit hospitals for care of the chronically ill.

2. Assistance in the building of non-profit medically supervised nursing and convalescent homes.

3. Aid in construction of non-profit rehabilitation facilities for the disabled.

4. Assistance in construction of non-profit diagnostic or treatment centers for patients who are not confined to preventive health care.

On Capitol Hill, where the House Commerce Committee is holding hearings on ways to help people meet costs of illness, a spokesman for a number of non-profit health groups said the biggest need is for preventive health care and pre-payment of doctors' bills.

Jerry Voorhis, secretary of the Cooperative Health Federation of America, said in prepared testimony much sickness that cuts heavily into the family budget could be kept away by treatment ahead of time. But it is these "first calls" upon a doctor which are most risky to health insurance from a commercial standpoint.

"At present the problem is that doctors generally receive their income only when people get sick, and the sicker the people are, the bigger the doctors' income. That is really backwards."

Voorhis said he favored groups of people attacking the problem voluntarily, through principles of risk-sharing and mutual aid, but he called for two types of government aid:

1. To medical schools, to help ease what he called a national shortage of doctors and other medical professionals.

2. Low-interest loans to voluntary health plans, to assist them in getting medical facilities.

Reds launch New Fess. The West wrangle over the site cleared up, Communist East Germany cranked up a press campaign which undoubtedly had Moscow's approval.

The Red press contended more than five million Germans had signed a petition demanding all-German representation at some point in the deliberations.

West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer ignored such tactics. The Western Powers already have assured him he would be signed constantly advised of any decisions affecting his legally elected government.

The West refuses to recognize the handpicked Soviet zone regime which has insisted it must have equal representation with more popular West Germany in any all-German regime.

The Kremlin pledged itself Sunday to work at Berlin for, the "earliest possible settlement" of the long-delayed Austrian independence treaty.

VAN NUYS, Calif. (AP)—Little Mickie Pierson's daddy built her a desk for her 11th birthday Sunday the day they were going to move into their new house. But it wasn't there when she came to see it.

Neither was the family range, refrigerator, deep freeze, automatic washer and drier, radio-phonograph, living room suite, bedroom suite, rugs or their trunks.

Thieves evidently backed up a moving van the night before the Piersons were going to move their furniture from the locked garage into their new house, and cleaned them out.

Mickie, her father George, 33, her mother Marian, and her brother Tom, 12, sat on packed cartons and stared at the one piece of furniture left, Mrs. Pierson's sewing machine.

Pierson, an aviation research engineer, said he had paid \$765 to have the furniture moved to Los Angeles from Detroit last August.

"We worked hard for it, but it was all paid for," he said. "We were out of debt. It was all we had. We put everything else into the down payment on this house."

He said he'd asked for police protection after someone snooped around the loaded garage and jimmied the lock, and he even sat in the empty house until 11 o'clock Thursday night with his .22-caliber rifle, but then left without seeing either prowlers or police.

Mrs. Pierson looked at her sewing machine and said, "Now I guess I'll have to take in sewing."

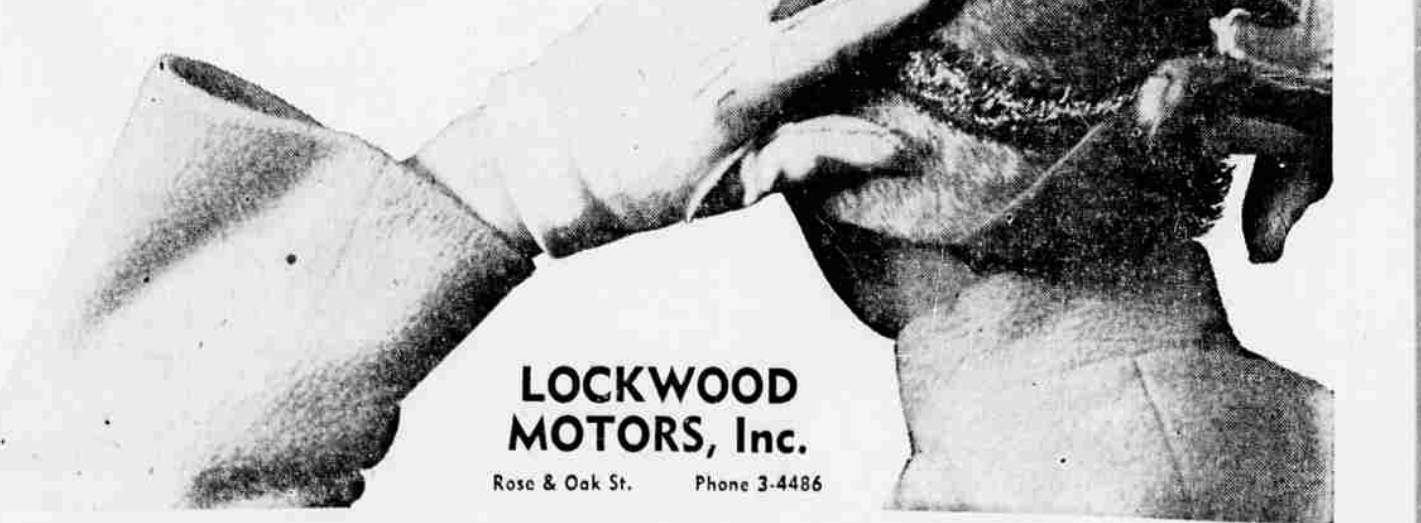
