The First Baptist Church of Roseburg, by official vote of the congregation, has extended a call to Henry I. Fox of the Calvary Baptist Church of Salem, to become the director of Christian education and music.

Fox, whose father is also a Baptist pastor in California, is a product of the Northwest schools. He attended Salem High School, Willamette University, and was graduated from Linfield College in 1948 with a B. A. degree.

In 1951 Fox was graduated from the Berkeley Baptist Divinity School, and the American Baptist Seminary, with a Bachelor of Divinity degree after a three year course of study. During and since this time, Fox has served several Baptist churches. He is director of youth and music at the Lakeland Baptist Church in Oakland, Calif., and other California churches as well as acting as assistant pastor at Calvary Baptist Church in Salem.

of war is absolutely impermissible." But the warning was mildly worded and officials said the Reds apparently had accepted the Indian commander's decision to return unrepatriated prisoners as an accomplished fact.

However, North Korea's Pyongyang radio said the action "destroys" the armistice agreement and tramples authority of the Neutral Repatriation Commission. Quoting Red correspondents at Panmunjom, the broadcast said U. S. armed troops surrounded the anti-Red camps, took the prisoners by force and then handed them to South Korean agents.

The transfer went smoothly despite minor hitches and a cold drizzling rain.

At least twice the southward flow of prisoners was interrupted. No Koreans appeared for an hour early in the evening, but there was no explanation. Earlier a dispute over a prisoner asking repatriation halted the movement of Chinese prisoners.

Father Shoots Crippled Girl, Then Kills Self

SEATTLE — The odds against Virginia Wagner's chances of enjoying normal adulthood were resolved Tuesday by her professional gambler father. He killed the crippled 11-year-old girl and himself in their plush Seattle apartment.

The father was Harry Andrew Wagner, 65, onetime card dealer in Las Vegas, Reno and Seattle gambling places. He last was seen alive feeding peaches to Virginia while the little girl, a victim of spastic paralysis, watched a television program.

That was the way Wagner's wife, Natalie, 36, left the pair when she went down to the apartment house laundry room. She returned a short while later to find Virginia lying on the couch, the father gone.

Believing the daughter was suffering from a brain hemorrhage, Mrs. Wagner called for aid and didn't learn until they reached the hospital the girl had been shot through the chest. And an hour after that she was told that Wagner's body had been found in the apartment incinerator room, a bullet through his head.

French Warships Back Up Demand

PARIS — France sent a squadron of warships Wednesday to the Mer-El-Kebir base in Algeria—within easy striking distance of Spanish Morocco—to back up her warning against any move to split the Madrid-ruled protectorate from the realm of the Sultan of Rabat.

The naval array, including a cruiser and an aircraft carrier, was ordered to the Mediterranean base after the French foreign ministry announced Spain had been warned France would resist "with all means at her disposal" any attempt to divide the Moroccan empire.

This "empire" includes both French and Spanish Morocco and the international zone of Tangier. The Sultan, whose palace is in Rabat, in the French zone, is the spiritual ruler. He also is nominally a temporal ruler but actual authority is exercised by the French and Spanish officials in the two North African protectorates.

Liquor Agents Are Reinstated On Probation

The two state liquor agents involved in a Roseburg night club fight last December have been reinstated, according to Asst. Liquor Administrator Thomas Sheridan.

The announcement came from Portland Tuesday that agents William O. Hoffer, Jr. and Dean O. Morris, both of Portland, received three month probation.

They were involved in a fight in and outside the Skyroom in Tucker, Roseburg. The incident involving the two 26-year-old agents was investigated by Lt. Gordon McHenry, OLCC enforcement man, who made a statement Dec. 14 that the two men had been suspended from their jobs pending hearings.

After their arrest by city police following the fight, the two men were charged with drunkenness, disorderly conduct and resisting arrest. They never appeared for trials and forfeited \$100 bail.

The fight among Hoffer and Morris and Tucker broke out in the Skyroom after one of the agents allegedly had called Tucker's wife a "foul" name. Police said Hoffer tried to fire from arresting officers and Morris tried to strike one of the city policemen.

Small Damage Reported From Fender Scraping

Two cars received minor damage in a fender-scraping Tuesday afternoon on Rose Street just north of Douglas, city police report.

Officers said Benjamin F. Poole, 66, 404 N. Rose St., tried to turn into a private driveway and his left rear fender hooked the fender of a car operated by Dollie Frances Murphy, 41, Roseburg. The Murphy car was backing slowly at the curb at the time of the accident. No citation was issued.

Judge Crawford To Aid Douglas Circuit Court

Circuit Judge James W. Crawford, Portland, has been assigned to Douglas County Circuit Court beginning Feb. 2 to expedite trials now pending. Assignment was made by Earl C. Latourette, chief justice of the Oregon Supreme Court.

Several cases in equity are pending, plus three cases represented by an attorney from Cottage Grove, who has asked a change in judges. Cases were to be docketed for Judge Crawford this afternoon.

Northwest States Are Shivering In Sub-Zero Weather

More bitter cold engulfed the shivering Pacific Northwest again Wednesday - it was an unofficial 27 below at Newport, Wash. - and the Weather Bureau said chances for immediate relief are "remote."

The forecast called for temperatures as low as 15 below Wednesday night in eastern Washington, eastern Oregon and Idaho which is catching the brunt of the coldest winter in two years.

A low pressure area off the British Columbia coast was expected to move in slowly toward the coast by the week. The mercury might rise with a cloud cover but this also brought a forecast of more heavy snow by Saturday or Sunday.

The 5,100 students at Washington State College didn't need much coaxing to stay indoors to study for weekend examinations. It was 22 below outside by unofficial readings, 13 officially.

Meacham, a town between Pendleton and LaGrande, was Oregon's coldest with 22 below.

A minimum of 17 above in downtown Portland was the lowest there since Feb. 3, 1950. Seattle had 16 above, Olympia 10.

In Oregon, The Dalles and Pendleton both had -5 readings while Astoria on the coast recorded 24 above. More snow was forecast for western Oregon.
