Huff Granted Permission To Make Trip To East

SEATTLE (AP)—Henry Huff, one of five persons convicted last year of conspiracy to teach and advocate the violent overthrow of the government, Monday was granted Federal Court permission to go to New York.

Huff, at liberty on \$20,000, said he wanted to make the trip to discuss appeal of the conviction with Elizabeth Gurley Flynn, a lawyer convicted of conspiracy in 1932. Federal Judge William J. Lindberg overruled government objections that Huff could handle his business by mail, telephone or telegraph.

Cattlemen's Ex-Aide Faces Larceny Charge

SPOKANE (AP)—Frank V. Roach of Spokane, former secretary of the Washington State Cattlemen's Assn., was charged Monday with grand larceny.

Prosecutor Hugh Evans said Roach is charged with taking \$8,000 from Grant Dixon Jr. as a mortgage on registered cattle that didn't exist. He said Roach is accused of getting the mortgage with fictional registration numbers. Bond was fixed at \$5,000.

Roach, now a patient at St. Luke's Hospital here, was removed from office Jan. 8 by directors of the cattlemen's association. He had been secretary only two months.

President William Fancher said Roach was removed because of ill health and succeeded by J. K. Ford who had been secretary for five years.

Four Children Perish In Quonset Home Fire

ABINGTON, Mass. (AP)—Four children perished, another was burned and three others were rescued last night as fire swept a single-family Quonset-type home near the Rockland line.

Fire officials said two children died in a second-story room added to the small home and two others were found under a collapsed bed on the first floor.

Dead were James McDonald, 8, and his brothers, James, 6, Kevin, 3, and David, 2.
