British Resume Parliament In Face Of Crisis

LONDON (AP)—Parliament re-assembled this week in the shadow of widespread industrial unrest and was told the Conservative government planned to keep its hands off the electrical workers dispute for the present.

Minister of Labor Sir Walter Monckton explained the government's wait-and-see policy to the House of Commons. A series of unsatisfied wage claims are simmering in Britain's industrial areas, but the electricians have brought their dispute into the open.

Their Communist-led union called out 30,000 workers in a one-day strike Monday. The number that responded was not announced, but those who stayed away were locked out Tuesday by the employers in a "sit-for-it" move.

A nationwide railway strike for higher pay was barely staved off four weeks ago just as Parliament recessed for Christmas.

When the members reconvened Tuesday they found that approximately five million workers were demanding higher wages. These included skilled craftsmen such as those in the machine tool and shipbuilding industries.

The electricians dispute already has halted work for five days at five British atomic plants.

British employers have stiffly opposed wage boosts on the grounds they would increase production costs and price vital exports out of the world market.

Portlander Gets Divorce; Has To Pay \$100,000

PORTLAND (AP)—Harvey F. Dick won a contested divorce this week must pay upward of \$100,000 in behalf of his wife, who has filed a counter-suit for separate maintenance.

Circuit Judge Virgil Langry, who said that if Mrs. Dick had been "moderately pleasant" to her husband the marriage likely would have continued to exist, directed these payments: \$16,000 to meet bills run up by Mrs. Dick while shopping shortly after Dick filed suit for divorce; \$10,000 toward her attorney fees; and an \$80,000 property settlement to her.

The judge said the \$80,000 property settlement was based on Dick's testimony that his worth was \$80,000. He has been active in financial and other fields here.

Dick charged mental cruelty in his suit. His wife responded with the same charge and added he was infatuated with another woman. The judge in his decision said that while there was fault on both sides, had Mrs. Dick "been moderately pleasant and had she not provoked arguments during the years when plaintiff was devoting himself to her and the marriage, this court believes that the marriage would in fact exist today. The court further believes that plaintiff would not then have commended his friendship with the other woman." The "other woman" was not named.
