Mr. Evans, accompanied by his wife, took a year to tour in South America, and brought back a very interesting collection of native workmanship. He brought trunkloads of curios to Days Creek Thursday evening and showed them as a finale to his talk.

During the regular business session Mrs. Marlen Yoder, reporting for the committee on the talent show, listed the preliminary plans for the show, which will be held March 12, at 8 p.m. The Days Creek School will hold an assembly prior to that date to determine the best selections, one from each room in the grade school and two from the high school. The Tiller Grade School is being invited to participate in the same basis.

The rest of the selections will be chosen from entrants from the various social clubs and organizations in the Days Creek-Tiller area and from individuals. Those wishing to be on the program should participate by the same basis.
