Reserve Officers Make Reports On AF Conference

Four Air Reserve officers from Roseburg's unit gave reports Wednesday night at a regional conference held last weekend at Paine AFB, near Everett, Wash. The four were Lt. Col. Theodore H. Wirak, commanding officer of the 9415th Air Reserve Squadron, which has headquarters here; Capt. R. M. Beardsley, commander of Roseburg's Flight A; Capt. Norval Eastin, squadron reserve information officer, and 1st Lt. Fayette L. Thompson of Sutherlin, squadron training officer.

Also present to report on certain phases of the conference and to talk about local training was Capt. Donald P. Hemmings Jr. of Medford, liaison officer for the 9001st Air Reserve Group.

Hemmings reported on a speech at the conference by Maj. Gen. Alfred A. Kessler Jr., commander of the 4th Air Force, Gen. Kessler told the 150 reservists present there is a very real need for an active and virile reserve.

He told of rapid progress by the Air Force and noted that the reserve forces must keep pace with that progress. He explained how different types of training are designed to fit the needs of reservists, taking into consideration the time the reservist can devote to training.

Eastin reported on activities at

an Air Reserve specialized training center, of which there are three on the West Coast. He also told of a tour of a fighter base. Thompson told of lectures pertaining to staff organization and functions and on officer and airman classification.

Wirak said the conference was very valuable to reserve officers, and that it was enjoyed by all those attending. Eight officers from the 9415th attended. Four were from Coos Bay and Coquille flights of the squadron.

The reports of the conference were made at a regular meeting at the local Air Reserve Center, 904 S. Stephens St. A meeting for staffs of the squadron and the local flight preceded the regular meeting.

The local unit will meet again next Wednesday, Jan. 27, at 8 p.m.

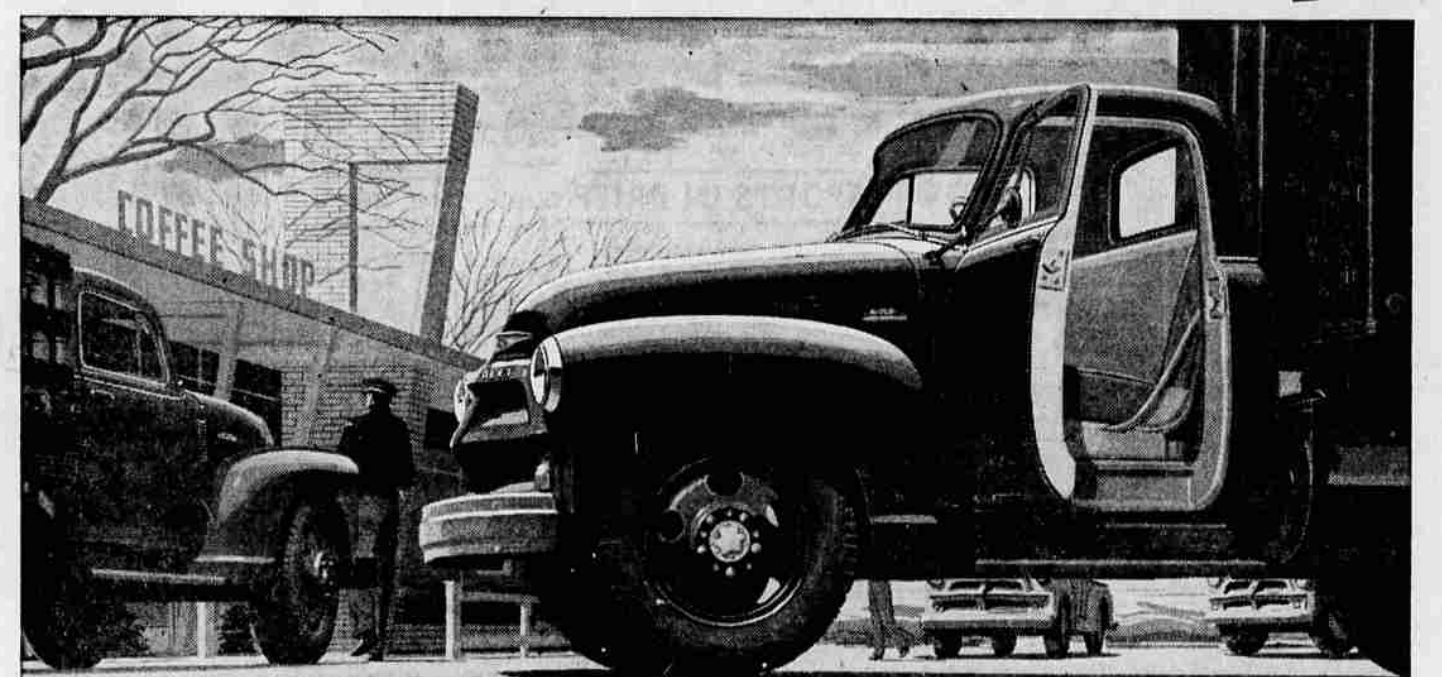
