McKay Promises Orderly Power Development

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Interior McKay said today that "we will carry on orderly development of the hydro-electric resources of the Pacific Northwest in a climate which will bring increased cooperation from local interests."

McKay spoke briefly to some 25 Interior Department officials just before Dr. William A. Pearl, former director of the institute of technology, Washington State College, was sworn in as Bonneville power administrator.

The secretary praised the Bonneville administration as "having been very successful." He cited its development of the Pacific Northwest power pool, in which the government and private utilities cooperate, and said such a program "is along the line this administration believes in."

"Bonneville must continue what it has been doing," McKay said, "as the economic future of that area is based on low-cost power." A survey team, he said, soon will study the business management set-up of Bonneville "but not the philosophy." The people of the area, he added, "need have no fear, we will carry on orderly development of the hydro-electric resources of the Pacific Northwest."

Pearl said he expected to be here the remainder of this week and possibly longer. He replaced Dr. Paul J. Raver who resigned recently to become superintendent of Seattle's municipal power system.

Higher Postal Rates Predicted

WASHINGTON (AP)—Key senators said this week Postmaster General Summerfield may well get a postal rate increase of the size he has asked for, but that it is likely to be offset by a pay boost for the 500,000 postal employees.

This was the view of some members of the Postoffice and Civil Service Committee which will have to pass on both the rate bill and the proposed pay boost. They asked not to be named.

A rate increase sufficient to cover higher pay would be in line with the controversial report of an advisory council to the Senate Committee, made public Monday. This report made many criticisms of postal operations and asserted "hundreds of millions" of dollars could be saved by more efficient methods. Meanwhile it said rate boosts should be held to a minimum except for what was needed to offset a pay hike. Summerfield replied that the claims of what could be saved were ridiculous. He also accused the council of dodging the chore of trying to wipe out the postal deficit. But he added that he had not done so and would present a financial plan to the Senate committee by the end of this month.

Registered Bulls Bring Top Prices

DENVER (AP)—One hundred sixty of the nation's top registered Hereford bulls sold for \$255,233 at the National Western Stock Show this week.

The average was \$1,845, with \$17,000 being paid for the top bull. It was the big sale of the show and lasted 15 hours, running past 1 a. m.

While the total was below the record level of the last two years, show officials pointed out that this year's champion and reserve champion bulls were not offered for sale.

The Schermerhorn Farm of Menomonie, Minn., paid \$17,000 for the top bull. It was TR Zato Heir 245th, bred and consigned by the Turner Ranch of Sulphur, Okla.

The bull was raised on the ranch of former Oklahoma Gov. Roy Turner and is a half brother of the bull which sold at the 1953 National Western for \$42,000. Another half brother, TR Zato Heir 249th, sold Tuesday for \$6,150.

Second highest price received was \$9,200, paid by Fred Cox and Son of Grass Valley, Ore., for HR Publican Anxiety. The senior bull was sold by Herschede Ranch of Hereford, Ore.

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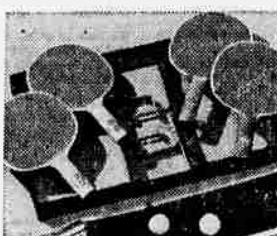
