J. Several New York DAR gatherings have featured this cake at meetings and the one served Saturday was the first to be sent to Oregon. The cake is made from Martha Washington's famous Mount Vernon recipe. The ingredients for this greatest of the cakes as they appear in the original hand written recipe are something to terrify a modern cook. The recipe calls for 40 eggs, four pounds of butter, four pounds of sugar, five pounds of flour and five pounds of fruit. Add to it, half an ounce of mace, one of nutmeg, half a pint of wine and some French brandy. It takes two hours to bake the cake. The cake was greatly enjoyed by the group.

Mrs. Heede was graduated in interior design and her husband was graduated in forestry. They fled from East Germany after the Russian Communist control took over that territory. She spoke to the group on German Youth and gave a graphic picture of the pressures on the youth during the Nazi control stating that propaganda being so well controlled, the common people had no information of what was happening. Then followed the Russian occupation with hardly a great town not destroyed, refugees flooding the less destroyed areas and life beginning in the streets for most of the youth as so many lost connections with their families.

She told of the great improvements coming with the help of the United States through the Marshall Plan and that rebuilding has started and a slow rise of living standards is taking place. She feels the Communists have had little effect on influencing the German Youth as they flee from that control at a large rate. She stated the program of student exchange giving the youth the opportunity to know Americans and their ways and being able to earn a dollar are the greatest help in the rehabilitation of the youth who have profound respect for the aid which is being given Germany.
