Sports Celebrities To Gather For Banquet Of Champs Feb. 4

MORGAN WINS SECOND

Chesler Morgan, Roseburg, wound up in second place in Class D singles in the state bowling tournament at Albany over the weekend, according to Glen Wellman, secretary of the local bowling association.

Morgan knocked down a very creditable 538 pins at the meet.

Roseburg Book Store, rolling in Class C team competition, came home in seventh place with a total of 2389 pins.

No competition is scheduled next weekend for Roseburg bowlers, Wellman said, but the city will be heavily represented on the following weekend.

Sports celebrities from all over the Northwest will gather here at the Columbia Athletic Club Feb. 4, to honor Oregon's greatest athletes of 1953 at the sixth annual Bill Hayward "Banquet of Champions."

Practically every college and every sport will be represented at the shindig sponsored by the Oregon Sports Writers and Broadcasters Association.

Highlight of the evening will be the presentation of the Bill Hayward trophy to the person who contributed the most to amateur athletics in the state last year. The award is named in honor of the late track coach at the University of Oregon.

Feature speaker will be color-

ful and dynamic Bill Veeck, former president of the Cleveland Indians and St. Louis Browns. The fact that in Veeck's honor neckties will not be permitted to be worn has attracted national attention to the affair.

In addition to naming the winner of the Hayward trophy, a special committee of the sports association will also bestow championship medals to the persons who distinguished themselves in their respective events last year.

In the running for what is a close race for the coveted Hayward trophy are Bruce Cudd, golfer; Harry Scarff, coach of Central Catholic's two-time state football champions; George Shaw, all-coast quarterback at the University of Oregon; Al Sehorn, AAU swimming promoter; Chet Noe basketball great and Keith DeCoursey, Princetonville and Mel Ingram, Grants Pass, high school coaches.

This is the sixth such affair sponsored by the organization and it promises to attract a capacity crowd to the Columbia Athletic Club.

Anti-Enzyme Toothpaste Claims Are Disputed

CHICAGO — The American Dental Assn. said Saturday that new evidence on the so-called "anti-enzyme" toothpastes does not support claims made for its effectiveness in preventing tooth decay.

Enzymes are organic substances which accelerate the digestive processes.

At St. Louis a spokesman for the Lambert Pharmacal Co. one of two firms which manufacture such a toothpaste said "we have never claimed our product to be an absolute cure but it is a definite scientific step forward."

He said the anti-enzyme solution sticks to the plaque or film on teeth and lasts for 12 to 24 hours thus preventing acids from causing tooth decay during that time.

Sub-Zero Freeze Grips Rocky Mountain States

MONTANA, port of entry and reservoir of the nation's cold weather for nearly two weeks, Monday had sub-zero temperatures for the 12th consecutive day.

While scattered snow accompanied readings ranging down to Great Falls' 26 below and Lewistown's and Cut Bank's 23 below, a full scale snowstorm struck to the south, in Utah.

The snowfall continued after depositing as much as 16 inches at Randolph near the Wyoming line in Northwest Utah, closing two major highways and making others dangerous to use, and posing the menace of snowslides. Earlier the storm left lesser amounts of snow through Southern Idaho and Northern Nevada.

The zero temperature area included the Dakotas and Minnesota early Monday. Freezing temperatures were prevalent as far south

Loss In Spectacular Fire Is Scaled Down

SEATTLE — A spectacular pier fire at the Pt. Wells oil "tank farm" on Puget Sound north of here early Saturday, started when a tanker sideswiped a pier, was stopped before it reached the huge tanks filled with gasoline and oil linking the shore and nearby hillsides.

Standard Oil Co. officials scaled down estimates of the loss at midday Saturday, placing the figure at approximately \$120,000, not including the petroleum products which exploded and burned.

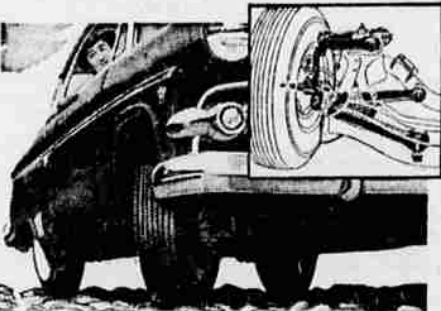
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
