St. Helens Water Pipe Severed By Landslide

ST. HELENS, Ore. — A landslide sheared off a hundred feet of pipe, and left St. Helens cut off Monday from its usual water supply.

The break apparently occurred Saturday. It was not discovered until Sunday, but there still was time to warn the 4,700 residents of this Lower Columbia River area town to store water in tubs and pans for emergency use Monday.

Pipe was being hurried to the scene of the landslide, and repairs were expected to be completed later Monday.

The city's main reservoir ran dry Sunday, and that led to discovery of the break in the pipeline. A school reservoir was available, however, to give householders a temporary supply. Residents were urged Sunday to fill tubs and otherwise store water for Monday.

**Burglar Stages Dizzy
Stunt Takes No Booty**

NEW YORK — Police and officials of the American Savings Bank pondered the "case of the mysterious burglar" today and wondered:

1. How he climbed to a fourth-floor window of the 42nd street bank, high above the ground and far from any ledges or fire escapes, and

2. Why he failed to take anything. There were no clues, and officials apparently would have been looking for the intruder last night if he had not set off a burglar alarm in opening an unlocked door inside the bank. The fourth floor window through which he gained entry was not wired with a burglar alarm.

**Retired General Offers
To Defend Ex-POW**

VAN NUYS, Calif. — Brig. Gen. Herbert C. Holdridge, retired commandant of the adjutant general's school, Ft. Washington, Md., has offered to defend Edward S. Dickenson, former Korean War prisoner.

Dickenson, 23, refused repatriation in Korea but later decided to return. The Army accused him of seeking favor with the enemy to the detriment of his fellow prisoners.

Gen. Holdridge said he has sent a telegram to Dickenson's parents that he believes the former corporal could not receive a fair trial in the present climate of emotionalism and vindictiveness.

**Rockefeller Foundation
Announces More Grants**

NEW YORK — The Rockefeller Foundation has announced grants of \$5,367,864 during the fourth quarter of 1953, largely for scientific research in the United States and abroad.

In addition, an announcement yesterday said, the foundation's General Education Board granted \$1,050,000 during the same period. All but \$200,000 of these grants went for Negro education.

The largest of the foundation's grants was 1 1/2 millions to California Institute of Technology for chemical biology research.

U. S.-Supervised Strike Vote Has Mitchell's O.K.

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Labor Mitchell Monday told Congress he thinks President Eisenhower's proposal for a government-supervised secret strike vote of employees whenever a labor dispute enters the strike stage "is a sound one."

Any such vote should be taken before a strike is called, he said, not after it has started.

Mitchell, testifying before the Senate Labor Committee, acknowledged under searching questions from Sen. Ives (R-NY) that the proposal "may be impractical" but should be tried.

The proposal was understood to have originated with Secretary of Commerce Weeks. In a speech two weeks ago Mitchell indicated Congress should give the idea careful study before adopting it.

Ives termed the proposal an "extreme interference" with the internal conduct of unions.

Opinions Not Barred
As the first witness before the committee in its study of President Eisenhower's 14-point Taft-Hartley revision program, Mitchell conceded the strike vote recommendation was a restriction of unions, if you will, but would "give individual union members the right to express their opinions" on the important strike question.

Ives asked whether Mitchell had made any study of the cost of conducting separate votes of a large group of employees, 5,000 times a year. Strikes are running at about that rate today, he said.

Mitchell said he would be glad to cooperate in any studies and indicated that state conciliation boards could handle a large part of the vote-taking.

Ives said the matter "was a pretty serious thing to experiment with."

Ives is second-ranking Republican on the Labor Committee. He is the only committee Republican to have expressed doubts about the proposal. Democratic members have indicated they don't like it.

But Mitchell kept repeating, in various forms, the statement that a strike-vote should at least be tried to see whether it could be made to work.
